RESOLUTION NO. 7-322

RESOLUTION ESTABLISHING A PUBLIC-PRIVATE PARTNERSHIP TO FACILITATE THE DEPLOYMENT OF AFFORDABLE, RELIABLE, HIGH-SPEED INTERNET SERVICES THROUGHOUT THE COUNTY

- WHEREAS, access to affordable, reliable, high-speed broadband services, including for residential, commercial, and governmental use, provides enhanced educational possibilities, furthers workforce development opportunities, and stimulates economic development within the County; and
- WHEREAS, the County's residents increasingly depend on their ability to access affordable, reliable, high-speed broadband services to improve their economic and financial position, to enhance their social networking capabilities, and to meet their basic consumer needs; and
- WHEREAS, the County's businesses rely on their ability to access affordable, reliable, high-speed broadband services to effectively compete in a global economy; and
- **WHEREAS**, the County's ability to timely deliver cost-effective governmental services to its residents, including emergency medical services and law enforcement protection, is enhanced by its ability to access affordable, reliable, high-speed broadband; and
- WHEREAS, the County, along with its residents and businesses, desire expanded access to affordable, reliable, high-speed broadband services to effectively deliver basic services to its residents, to more fully engage in commerce, and to better compete in a global economy; and
- WHEREAS, the County's topography and population density has made it cost-prohibitive for private sector development of a reliable, affordable, high-speed broadband network throughout the County; and
- WHEREAS, as a result, many areas of the County have limited or no access to affordable, reliable, high-speed broadband services; and
- WHEREAS, the County desires to develop and implement a plan to facilitate the provision of reliable, affordable, high-speed broadband services to residents and businesses throughout the County; and
- **WHEREAS**, the County believes that cooperation with private-sector partners is necessary for the development of a county-wide broadband network that meets the needs of the County, its residents, and its businesses; and
- WHEREAS, MH Telecom, LLC, doing business as MHTC, is an ISP with experience providing reliable, affordable, high-speed broadband services to underserved and unserved communities throughout Wisconsin for commercial, governmental, and emergency response purposes; and

WHEREAS, MHTC is able to and desires to assist the County with the development of a plan to facilitate the deployment of reliable, affordable, high-speed broadband services throughout the County; and

WHEREAS, the County believes that the economic activity and public benefits likely to occur as a result of the development and deployment of a reliable, affordable, high-speed broadband network throughout the County constitutes a valid public purpose; and

WHEREAS, the Parties desire to work together for the mutual benefit of the County's residents, businesses, government, and emergency responders by jointly developing a plan to facilitate the provision of reliable, affordable, high-speed broadband services throughout the County.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, the Iowa County Board of Supervisors authorizes and directs the Chairman of the Board of Supervisors, or his designee, to enter into a Public-Private Partnership agreement, in accordance with Iowa County Policy 309, by executing a Memorandum of Understanding ("MOU"), attached as **Exhibit A**, with MHTC expressing the Parties' desire and intent to develop a plan to construct, develop, and deploy high-speed internet infrastructure to facilitate the provision of affordable, reliable, high-speed internet services throughout the County.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, the Iowa County Board of Supervisors authorizes and directs staff to immediately enter into negotiations with MHTC to develop a comprehensive plan, including all necessary agreements and other documentation, setting forth all relevant aspects necessary for the parties to jointly, or in partnership, construct, develop, and deploy high-speed internet infrastructure throughout the County.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, the Iowa County Board of Supervisors authorizes and directs staff to immediately take steps to develop and prepare not later than March 17, 2022, a complete Broadband Expansion Grant Application, or similar grant application, as appropriate, including all necessary agreements and other documentation, in partnership with MHTC, for anticipated joint submission to the Public Service Commission of Wisconsin not later than March 17, 2022.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, all plans, applications, and Agreements referenced herein shall not become effective unless and until each has received approval by the Board of Supervisors in accordance with Iowa County's General Code of Ordinances and/or as otherwise required by law.

MEMORANDUM OF UNDERSTANDING BETWEEN IOWA COUNTY, WISCONSIN AND MHTC ESTABLISHING A PUBLICPRIVATE PARTNERSHIP TO FACILITATE THE DEPLOYMENT OF AFFORDABLE, RELIABLE, HIGH-SPEED INTERNET THROUGHOUT THE COUNTY

This MEMORANDUM OF UNDERSTANDING ("MOU") is made and entered into this 15th day of March, 2022, by and between IOWA COUNTY, WISCONSIN (the "County"), a political subdivision of the State of Wisconsin with its principal office located at 222 North Iowa Street, Dodgeville, Wisconsin, 53533; and MH Telecom, LLC, doing business as MHTC, a Wisconsin corporation certified by the Public Service Commission of Wisconsin as an Alternative Telecommunications Utility to provide telecommunications service in Wisconsin with its principal office located at 305 North Iowa Street, Dodgeville, Wisconsin, 53533 (collectively, the "Parties").

RECITALS

WHEREAS, the County, a certified Broadband Forward! Community, seeks to promote the development of affordable, reliable, high-speed broadband service within its boundaries for the public purpose of supporting its residents' desired quality of life and its businesses' need to compete in a global economy; and

WHEREAS, the County believes that the economic activity and public benefits likely to be generated by studying, analyzing, developing, and, ultimately, providing reliable, affordable, high-speed broadband services throughout the County constitutes a valid public purpose; and

WHEREAS, the County has areas that are underserved or unserved by affordable, reliable, high-speed broadband service; and

WHEREAS, the County desires to expand its residents' and businesses' access to affordable, reliable, high-speed broadband service; and

WHEREAS, the County has requested to partner with MHTC, in accordance with Iowa County Policy 309, to establish a Public-Private Partnership agreement to produce and implement a plan that will result in the development and deployment of affordable, reliable, high-speed broadband service throughout the County (the "Project"); and

WHEREAS, MHTC is an ISP with experience providing reliable, affordable, high-speed broadband access to underserved and unserved communities throughout Wisconsin for commercial, governmental, and emergency response purposes; and

WHEREAS, the parties intend that the County, with MHTC as its private-sector partner, may develop and submit, not later than March 17, 2022, a complete Broadband Expansion Grant Application, or similar application, to the Public Service Commission of Wisconsin (the "PSC") in furtherance of the expansion of broadband service throughout the County; and

WHEREAS, the County desires to enter into negotiations with MHTC to develop and implement a plan to provide affordable, high-speed broadband service throughout the County (the "Broadband Expansion Plan"), subject only to those limitations under the County's ordinances and Wisconsin and federal law; and

WHEREAS, the Parties acknowledge that this MOU is merely a representation of the Parties' desire to develop, construct and provide broadband services throughout the County and does not constitute an authorization, express or otherwise, for the County to construct, own, or operate any facility for providing video service, telecommunications service, or broadband service, directly or indirectly, to the public; and

WHEREAS, the Parties acknowledge that the terms of this MOU may be subject to modification in order to assure compliance with the County's ordinances, state regulatory agencies' guidance and rules, and Wisconsin and federal law.

The Parties to this MOU acknowledge the foregoing recitals and agree to participate in and perform the following actions:

GENERAL PROVISIONS

- I. <u>Preliminary Agreement</u>. This MOU is a preliminary agreement between the Parties and, unless expressly stated otherwise, is not intended to create a binding agreement to finance, provide, maintain, develop, construct, or otherwise obligate the Parties to build or operate a broadband network within the County.
- II. <u>Parties' Support for the Project.</u> Notwithstanding any law, rule, guidance, ordinance, or conflicting provision contained herein, the Parties do hereby express support for the provisions contained within this MOU. The Parties acknowledge that the Project may not materialize despite their best efforts.
- III. Good Faith Negotiations. The Parties agree to identify and pursue all reasonable alternatives to effect the intent of this MOU and, where possible, take affirmative steps to implement those alternatives. The Parties further agree to voluntarily comply with the provisions of this MOU and, upon approval of the Broadband Expansion Plan by both Parties' respective governing bodies, negotiate in good faith to finalize and adopt a Final Broadband Expansion Plan Agreement that is separate and distinct from this MOU and which authorizes the Parties to construct and operate an affordable, reliable, high-speed broadband network throughout the County.
- IV. <u>Preliminary Costs.</u> The Parties agree that unless otherwise expressly agreed to in writing, each Party will be responsible for its own expenses incurred in furtherance of this MOU.
- V. <u>Public Purpose.</u> The Parties acknowledge that the expansion of broadband service throughout the County will provide a public benefit to the County, its residents, and its businesses. Accordingly, the Parties agree to cooperate with one another, and diligently undertake all reasonable actions and execute all reasonable efforts to secure funding to advance the Project.

OBLIGATIONS OF THE PARTIES

- VI. <u>Preliminary Preparations</u>. The Parties shall make all reasonable efforts to independently and collaboratively engage all stakeholders necessary to study, analyze, and execute the provisions of this MOU, including, but not limited to, the PSC, industry stakeholders, telecommunications providers, financial advisors, legal counsel, and other professionals, as necessary to realize the Project.
- VII. <u>Broadband Expansion Grant Application</u>. The Parties agree to work collaboratively to jointly prepare a complete Broadband Expansion Grant Application, or similar application, with the intent to submit the completed Broadband Expansion Grant Application (the "Application") to the PSC no later than March 17, 2022.
- VIII. <u>Preliminary Broadband Expansion Plan.</u> The Parties shall make all reasonable efforts to develop a Preliminary Broadband Expansion Plan, the purpose of which shall be to describe, locate, develop, and deploy reliable, affordable, high-speed broadband service throughout the County. The Parties agree to work together to jointly develop the Preliminary Broadband Expansion Plan and the complete Application.
- IX. <u>Preliminary Broadband Expansion Plan Approval.</u> After developing the Preliminary Broadband Expansion Plan and complete Application, the Parties shall submit the Preliminary Broadband Expansion Plan and complete Application to their respective governing bodies for consideration and approval.
- X. <u>Broadband Expansion Plan Agreement.</u> Should both Parties' respective governing bodies approve the Preliminary Broadband Expansion Plan and complete Application, the Parties shall submit the complete Application to the PSC. Should the PSC award the Parties' the requested grant amount, the Parties shall use reasonable efforts to negotiate the specific terms of the Preliminary Broadband Expansion Plan in a Broadband Expansion Plan Agreement. Development, approval, and execution of the Broadband Expansion Plan Agreement shall be separate and distinct from this MOU and shall be subject to and conditioned upon successful negotiations between the Parties and approval by both Parties' respective governing bodies.
- XI. <u>Costs.</u> Parties acknowledge that all costs borne by the Parties in executing this MOU shall be the sole liability of the Party that incurred the costs, unless otherwise agreed to in writing.

MISCELLANEOUS PROVISIONS

XII. <u>Duration and Termination.</u> The Parties are entitled to terminate this MOU immediately upon written notice to the other Party. Unless one or both Parties, or a court of law, terminates or invalidates this MOU, this MOU shall remain in full force and effect until the Parties' obligations described hereunder are completed.

- XIII. Non-Binding Effect. The Parties acknowledge that unless expressly stated otherwise, this MOU is not a binding agreement, and the obligations and rights of the Parties are yet to be negotiated and memorialized through the adoption of the Broadband Expansion Plan Agreement. The Broadband Expansion Plan Agreement shall not become effective unless and until it is approved by both Parties' respective governing bodies.
- XIV. <u>Disclaimer</u>. The Parties acknowledge that this MOU does not obligate either Party to provide, construct, finance, or develop a broadband network within the County or to execute a Broadband Expansion Plan Agreement. The Parties further acknowledge that the provisions of this MOU shall not be relied upon nor construed as an inducement for either party to take any action(s) or incur any costs not explicitly set forth by this MOU.
- XV. Representations and Warranties. The Parties acknowledge that this MOU does not create a financial obligation between the Parties. The Parties further acknowledge that this MOU does not guarantee completion of the Broadband Expansion Plan or execution of a Broadband Expansion Plan Agreement. Nor does this MOU represent a financing guarantee between a potential lender and a potential buyer. Any financing terms referenced in this MOU shall become effective only upon the development and ratification of the Broadband Expansion Plan Agreement by both Parties' respective governing bodies. The Parties acknowledge that the Broadband Expansion Plan Agreement is separate and distinct from this MOU.
- XVI. <u>Confidentiality</u>. Because of the competitive nature of the broadband industry, the County acknowledges that certain information MHTC provides to the County may be proprietary and, if specified as such, should be treated by the County as confidential and shall not be disclosed to third parties unless required by law.
- XVII. <u>Amendments</u>. This MOU may not be amended or modified, except in writing, by mutual agreement of the Parties.
- XVIII. <u>Governing Law.</u> This MOU is intended to be performed in the State of Wisconsin and shall be construed and enforced by the laws of the State of Wisconsin.
- XIX. <u>Counterparts.</u> This MOU may be executed in one or more counterparts, each of which shall be an original, and all of which together shall be one and the same instrument.

IN WITNESS WHEREOF, the Parties hereto have caused the execution of this MOU by the authority of their respective governing bodies and/or authorized signatory as an expression of the Parties' formal intent.

RESOLUTION SUPPORTING PUBLIC SERVICE COMMISSION OF WISCONSIN BROADBAND GRANT APPLICATIONS AND MATCHING FUNDS COMMITMENT FOR BROADBAND PROJECTS

WHEREAS, the Iowa County Board of Supervisors has declared that the economic activity and public benefits likely to occur as a result of the development and deployment of a reliable, affordable, high-speed broadband network throughout Iowa County constitutes a valid public purpose; and

WHEREAS, Iowa County, a certified Broadband Forward! Community, seeks to promote the development of high-speed broadband services to unserved and underserved areas within its boundaries and believes that cooperation with private-sector partners is necessary for the development of a county-wide broadband network that meets the needs of the County, its residents, and its businesses; and

WHEREAS, on March 15, 2022, Iowa County entered into a Memorandum of Understanding with MH Telecom, LLC, doing business as MHTC, establishing a public-private partnership ("PPP") to facilitate the deployment of affordable, reliable, high-speed internet service throughout Iowa County ("MOU"); and

WHEREAS, attached as Exhibit A is the Preliminary Broadband Expansion Plan, which includes Grant Applications for three separate projects ("Grant Application Projects 1, 2, and 3") that MHTC and Iowa County staff have developed to further Iowa County's goal of improving broadband access throughout the County; and

WHEREAS, the Grant Applications require that PPP partners make a commitment of matching funds for their proposed broadband projects; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to the MOU and in furtherance of the Grant Application Projects, MHTC, with Iowa County as its public partner, have been preparing grant applications to submit to the Public Service Commission of Wisconsin ("PSCW"); and

WHEREAS, MHTC estimates that portion of Project 1 geographically located in Iowa County will cost \$7,972,400.00 ("Estimated Project Cost"). MHTC intends to request 75% of the Estimated Project Cost in its application to the Grant Program for Project 1. MHTC estimates that the Estimated Project Cost for Project 2 will be \$1,220,810.00. MHTC intends to request 60% of the Estimated Project Cost in its application to the Grant Program for Project 2. MHTC estimates that the Estimated Project Cost for Project 3 will be \$260,132.62. MHTC intends to request 50% of the Estimated Project Cost in its application to the Grant Program for Project 3. MHTC will fund, or obtain funding through partners, consumers, and matching funding, for the remaining funding for each project not covered by the Grant Program.

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Iowa County Board of Supervisors that Iowa County's commitment of matching funds to support the Grant Applications shall be realized as follows:

- 1. In the Grant Applications, Iowa County's share of the matching contribution will be in an amount not to exceed the following for the County:
 - a. Grant Application Project 1, if the project is awarded by the PSCW, lowa County agrees to fund \$597,930.00 towards the portion of the project geographically located within lowa County;
 - b. Grant Application Project 2, if the project is awarded by the PSCW, Iowa County agrees to fund \$146,497.00; and
 - c. Grant Application Project 3, if the project is awarded by the PSCW, lowa County agrees to fund \$38,117.00.
- 2. Iowa County shall pay to MHTC the amount described above within 30 days of all the following conditions being met:
 - a. MHTC is awarded a grant for the Projects from the PSCW Grant Program;
 - b. MHTC completes construction of the Projects by the end of the 2025 calendar year; and
 - c. MHTC provides to the County a statement from a person authorized by MHTC to do so that the each Project, as installed, has been successfully tested, that the Project is capable of providing speeds of up to 1 gigabyte, and the Project is available to offer service to any and all locations in the Project area.
- 3. Iowa County and MHTC both agree to provide and share with each other, on a timely basis, the necessary reporting information required to justify and use, or be reimbursed by, the PSCW grant funding or any other funding source.
- 4. Additional terms and conditions between the parties will be included in a separate Broadband Expansion Plan Agreement, to be developed and executed after the successful awarding of the PSCW grant.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Iowa County Administrator is hereby authorized to review, modify, and approve any further Grant Application revisions necessary to complete the Grant Applications so that they may be timely filed with the PSCW.

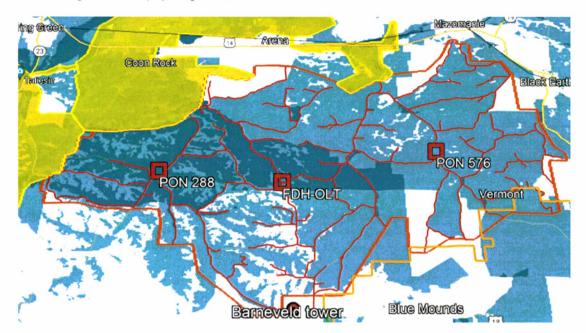

The below map identifies unserved/underserved areas per PSC mapping:

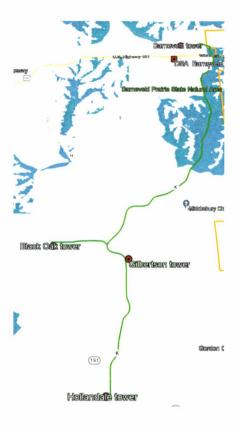
- The dark blue shaded area is unserved territory

INITIAL RESOLUTION APPROVING REVENUE BOND FINANCING FOR BUG TUSSEL 1, LLC

INTRODUCED BY: Executive Committee

INTENT & SYNOPSIS: To provide approval of an Initial Resolution of Iowa County to participate with other counties in accordance with an Intergovernmental Agreement pursuant to which Fond du Lac County, Wisconsin will serve as the conduit bond issuer for Revenue Bond Financing for Bug Tussel 1, LLC to finance a project for acquisition, construction and installation of certain telecommunications infrastructure, for the purpose of providing wireless internet and telephone communication services to businesses, governmental units and residents of rural communities where such service is currently unavailable or prohibitively expensive (the "Project"), which includes Project costs located in Iowa County in an amount not to exceed \$10,500,000.

FISCAL NOTE: None.

WHEREAS, Section 66.1103 of the Wisconsin Statutes (the "Act") authorizes municipalities to authorize the issuance and sale of bonds to construct, equip, re-equip, acquire by gift, lease or purchase, install, reconstruct, rebuild, rehabilitate, improve, supplement, replace, maintain, repair, enlarge, extend or remodel industrial projects; and

WHEREAS, Bug Tussel 1, LLC, a Wisconsin limited liability company (the "Company"), and/or one or more of its affiliates (including, without limitation, Bug Tussel Wireless, LLC, Hilbert Communications, LLC and Cloud 1, LLC), whether existing on the date hereof or to be formed and whether owned directly or indirectly by the Company, desires to finance a project consisting of the acquisition, construction and installation of certain telecommunications infrastructure that includes, among other things (i) acquisition of tower sites by purchase or lease of land and equipping such sites with towers and electronics to provide broadband, high speed cellular, emergency communications and point to point (P2P) data communications; (ii) constructing fiberoptic data transmission facilities (cable and electronics) between towers, key community facilities, businesses and residential aggregation points; (iii) where appropriate, connecting individual premises into the broadband network including the cost of Consumer Premise Equipment (CPE); (iv) payment of capitalized interest; (v) funding of a debt service reserve fund; (vi) payment of such project costs located in Iowa County in an amount not to exceed \$10,500,000; and (vii) payment of professional fees (collectively, the "Project"), all of which will be for the purpose of providing wireless internet and telephone communications services to businesses, governmental units and residents of rural communities where such service is currently unavailable or is prohibitively expensive; and

WHEREAS, Iowa County, Wisconsin is a political subdivision of the State within whose boundaries a portion of the Project is located; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to Sections 66.1103 and 66.0301 of the Wisconsin Statutes, individual counties or two or more counties, each a "Participating County", acting pursuant to an Intergovernmental Agreement may serve as the conduit issuer for such financing; and

WHEREAS, (i) the aggregate cost of the Project in Iowa County and the Participating Counties is presently estimated to be not greater than \$240,000,000, (ii) the aggregate amount of the Project proposed to be financed with one or more issues or series of tax-exempt or taxable revenue bonds does not exceed \$240,000,000 (the "Bonds") to be issued by Fond du Lac County, Wisconsin (the "Issuing County") acting pursuant to intergovernmental powers, and (iii) the portion of the Project located in Iowa County does not exceed \$10,500,000; and

WHEREAS, Section 66.1103(3)(f) of the Wisconsin Statutes provides that a municipality also may finance an industrial project which is located entirely outside the geographic limits of the municipality, but only if the revenue agreement for the project also relates to another project of the same eligible participant, part of which is located within the geographic limits of the municipality; and

WHEREAS, the Project includes necessary infrastructure for essential services by and for Iowa County and local units of government in Iowa County and is in furtherance of the public purposes set forth in the Act; and

WHEREAS, the proposed Project is a multi-jurisdictional project which is located in multiple counties to be identified, and the Company has requested that each of the Participating Counties approve an initial resolution (the "Initial Resolution") providing for the financing of the Project in an aggregate amount not to exceed \$240,000,000; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to the Intergovernmental Agreement, Fond du Lac County shall be the Issuing County of said revenue Bonds, and it shall be determined at a future date which county or counties shall be Participating Counties; and

WHEREAS, the Issuing County has heretofore on December 16, 2021, issued the first tranche of conduit revenue bonds for a portion of the Project, in the aggregate amount of \$70,000,000; and

WHEREAS, the Company has requested that Iowa County and other Participating Counties who will directly benefit from the Project to each provide a limited guaranty to enhance the collateral position of the Company in an amount equal to the pro rata portion of the Project costs incurred and essential services benefits derived in such Participating County; and

WHEREAS, the Company will have the primary obligation to make all scheduled principal and interest payments when due on the Bonds, and Iowa County's Guaranty will apply only

in the event that the Company does not make the required payments due on the Bonds; and

WHEREAS, in return for Iowa County's Guaranty, Iowa County shall receive an annual guaranty fee of 40 basis points (0.40%) (based upon the amount of its Guaranty), and the Company will pay all costs to Iowa County and all expenses by Iowa County related to the bond issue; and

WHEREAS, as further security for its Guaranty, Iowa County shall receive a first mortgage on all land, buildings, and improvements of the Company located in Iowa County which are financed with proceeds of the Bonds.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Iowa County Board of Supervisors as follows:

- 1. Iowa County hereby approves that Fond du Lac County, as the Issuing County, acting pursuant to the Intergovernmental Agreement, shall:
 - (a) Finance the Project in an aggregate amount not to exceed \$240,000,000 which includes Project costs located in Iowa County in an amount not to exceed \$10,500,000; and
 - (b) Acting pursuant to the Intergovernmental Agreement by and among one or more Participating Counties, Fond du Lac County shall issue industrial development revenue bonds in one or more issues or series of tax-exempt or taxable bonds in an aggregate amount not to exceed \$240,000,000 in order to finance costs of the Project located in the Participating Counties, pursuant to Section 66.1103(3)(f) of the Wisconsin Statutes.
- 2. The aforesaid plan of financing contemplates, and is conditioned upon, the following:
 - (a) The Bonds shall be limited obligations of the Issuing County, acting pursuant to the Intergovernmental Agreement, and are payable solely from revenues provided by the Company and are secured in part by the limited Guaranty of Iowa County;
 - (b) The Bonds shall never constitute an indebtedness of Iowa County, the Issuing County or the Participating Counties within the meaning of any state constitutional provision or statutory limitation;
 - (c) The Project shall be subject to property taxation in the same amount and to the same extent as though the Project were not financed with industrial development revenue bonds;
 - (d) The Company shall find a purchaser for all of the Bonds; and

- (e) All out-of-pocket costs, including but not limited to legal fees, incurred by Iowa County in connection with the issuance and sale of the Bonds shall be paid by the Company, whether or not the Issuing County or another Participating County ultimately issues the Bonds; and
- (f) Iowa County shall be paid an annual guaranty fee of 40 basis points (0.40%) (based upon the amount of Iowa County's Guaranty).
- 3. The aforesaid plan of financing shall not be legally binding upon Iowa County nor be finally implemented unless and until:
 - (a) The details and mechanics of the bond financing are authorized and approved by a further resolution of Fond du Lac County, as the Issuing County, by a vote of at least three-fourths of the members-elect (as defined in Section 59.001(2m) of the Wisconsin Statutes) of the Board of Supervisors. Such approval shall be solely within the discretion of the Issuing County, acting pursuant to the Intergovernmental Agreement and approval of the Board of Supervisors of the Issuing County;
 - (b) Said approval and Guaranty are further conditioned upon terms and conditions of one or more written agreements between Iowa County and the various parties involved, ensuring that all of the proceeds from the sale of the Bonds shall be administered by a duly appointed independent trustee, that the bond proceeds shall be used exclusively for the development of the Project and for no other purpose, and that the project funds shall be paid over to the Company by the trustee only as they become needed for completion of the Project;
 - (c) The County Clerk of Iowa County shall cause notice of adoption of this Initial Resolution, in the form attached hereto as Exhibit A, to be published once in a newspaper of general circulation in Iowa County, and the electors of Iowa County shall have been given the opportunity to petition for a referendum on the matter of the aforesaid bond issue, all as required by law;
 - (d) Either no such petition shall be timely filed or such petition shall have been filed and said referendum shall have approved the bond issue;
 - (e) The county clerks of Iowa County and the Participating Counties shall each have received an employment impact estimate issued under Section 238.11 of the Wisconsin Statutes;
 - (f) The Bonds shall be limited obligations of the Issuing County, acting pursuant to the Intergovernmental Agreement and are payable solely from revenues provided by the Company and secured in part by a limited guaranty of each Participating County;
 - (g) All Participating Counties have entered into the Intergovernmental Agreement and identified Fond du Lac County as the Issuing County;

- (h) All Participating Counties shall approve their respective guaranties by a vote of at least three-fourths of the members-elect of their respective County Board of Supervisors; and
- (i) All documents required to consummate the financing have been duly authorized and delivered.
- 4. Pursuant to the Act, all requirements that the Project be subject to the contracting requirements contained in Section 66.1103 are waived, the Company having represented that it is able to negotiate satisfactory arrangements for completing the Project and that Iowa County's interests are not prejudiced thereby.
- 5. The County Clerk of Iowa County is directed following adoption of this Initial Resolution (i) to publish notice of such adoption not less than one time in the official newspaper of Iowa County, such notice to be in substantially the form attached hereto as Exhibit A and (ii) to file a copy of this Initial Resolution, together with a statement indicating the date the Notice to Electors was published, with the Wisconsin Economic Development Corporation within twenty (20) days following the date of publication of such notice.
- 6. This Initial Resolution is an "initial resolution" within the meaning of the Act and official action toward issuance of the Bonds. Furthermore, it is the reasonable expectation of Iowa County that proceeds of the Bonds may be used to reimburse expenditures made on the Project prior to the issuance of the Bonds. The maximum principal amount of debt expected to be issued for the Project on the date hereof is \$240,000,000.
- 7. Iowa County Officers and Corporation Counsel shall forthwith negotiate and confer with all interested parties, draft, edit, or approve and deliver the contracts or other documents necessary to carry out the provisions of this Initial Resolution; provided, however, that such Officers and Corporation Counsel shall present the same to the Board of Supervisors for the Board's final review, ratification, and approval of all of the specific terms and conditions contained in said documents prior to the issuance of the Bonds on behalf of the Company.

NOTICE TO ELECTORS OF IOWA COUNTY, WISCONSIN

TAKE NOTICE that the Board of Supervisors of Iowa County, Wisconsin ("Iowa County"), at a meeting held at the Iowa County Courthouse, 222 North Iowa Street, Dodgeville, Wisconsin, on March 15, 2022, adopted an initial resolution (the "Initial Resolution") pursuant to Section 66.1103 of the Wisconsin Statutes, as amended, expressing the intention to issue not to exceed \$240,000,000 of industrial development revenue bonds (the "Bonds") on behalf of Bug Tussel 1, LLC, a Wisconsin limited liability company (the "Company"), and/or one or more of its affiliates (including, without limitation, Bug Tussel Wireless, LLC, Hilbert Communications, LLC and Cloud 1, LLC), to finance a project consisting of the acquisition, construction and installation of certain telecommunications infrastructure that includes, among other things (i) acquisition of tower sites by purchase or lease of land and equipping such sites with towers and electronics to provide broadband, high speed cellular, emergency communications and point to point (P2P) data communications; (ii) constructing fiberoptic data transmission facilities (cable and electronics) between towers, key community facilities, businesses and residential aggregation points; (iii) where appropriate, connecting individual premises into the broadband network including the cost of Consumer Premise Equipment (CPE); (iv) payment of capitalized interest; (v) funding of a debt service reserve fund; (vi) payment of project costs located in Iowa County in an amount not to exceed \$10,500,000; and (vii) payment of professional fees (collectively, the "Project"), all of which will be for the purpose of providing wireless internet and telephone communications services to businesses, governmental units and residents of rural communities. The Company has represented that the net number of full-time equivalent jobs which will be created in Iowa County is 1.

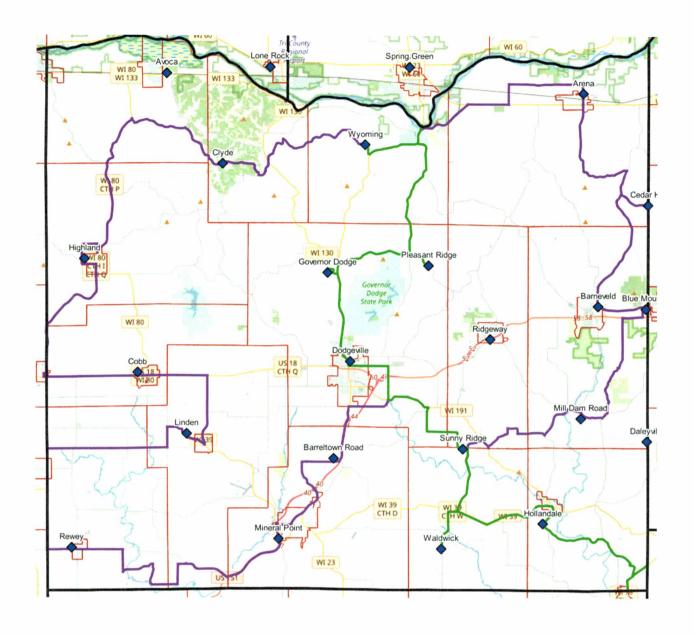
Pursuant to the terms of Section 66.1103 of the Wisconsin Statutes, all requirements that the Project be subject to the contracting requirements contained in Section 66.1103 are waived, the Company having represented that it is able to negotiate satisfactory arrangements for completing the Project and that Iowa County's interests are not prejudiced thereby.

THE BONDS SHALL NEVER CONSTITUTE AN INDEBTEDNESS OF IOWA COUNTY, NOR SHALL THE BONDS GIVE RISE TO ANY PECUNIARY LIABILITY OF IOWA COUNTY, NOR SHALL THE BONDS BE A CHARGE AGAINST THE GENERAL CREDIT OR TAXING POWERS OF IOWA COUNTY. RATHER, THE BONDS SHALL BE PAYABLE SOLELY FROM THE REVENUES AND OTHER AMOUNTS TO BE DERIVED PURSUANT TO THE REVENUE AGREEMENT RELATING TO SAID PROJECT TO BE ENTERED INTO BETWEEN THE ISSUING COUNTY OR ISSUING COUNTIES AND THE COMPANY.

The Initial Resolution may be inspected in the office of the Iowa County Clerk at 222 North Iowa Street, Dodgeville, Wisconsin, during business hours.

TAKE FURTHER NOTICE THAT THE ELECTORS OF IOWA COUNTY MAY PETITION FOR A REFERENDUM ON THE QUESTION OF THE BOND ISSUE. Unless within thirty (30) days from the date of the publication of this Notice a petition signed by not less than five percent (5%) of the registered electors of the Iowa County is filed with the County Clerk requesting a referendum on the question of the issuance of the Bonds, the Issuing County will issue the Bonds without submitting the proposition for the electors' approval. If such petition is filed as aforesaid, then the Bonds shall not be issued until approved by a majority of the electors of Iowa County voting thereon at a general or special election.

DATE: March 15, 2022

This memo serves to introduce a few changes to the Iowa County Committee Structure and Committee Appointments. These changes have been approved by the Executive Committee and are reflected on the attached, updated Iowa County Committees, Commissions, and Boards Structure document.

- Iowa County must appoint someone to the <u>Ludden Lake District Commission</u>. State Statute 33.28 requires that this person be a member of the Land Conservation Committee. The Land Conservation Committee must nominate one of their members to the County Board for appointment. (FYI)
- 2. <u>Wisconsin River Rail Transit</u> and the <u>Pecatonica Rail Transit</u> Commissions are governed by state statute 59.58(3) and 66.0301. Both Commissions currently have an appointment of two citizen members and one supervisor for a total of three to each Commission. Would the Board be open to modifying those appointments to remove the Supervisor and replace it with a management position within the Highway Department? By assigning this to staff, we could set up the Public Works Committee to receive a staff report quarterly from the appointed employee.
- 3. When Iowa County was negotiating with Upland Hills Health for the merger of our nursing homes, a new Nonprofit was created called "Scenic Hills". The organization has an annual meeting in January of each year. The County Administrator shall contact Upland Hills Health and let them know that Iowa County desires to discontinue this nonprofit. Absent a merger, it no longer has a purpose.
- 4. The <u>Tri County Airport Commission</u> is still on our books for appointments. It shall be removed from our list of Committees.
- 5. Traditionally, Iowa County has appointed a County Supervisor to the Iowa <u>County Fair Board</u>. There are many changes occurring within this organization, including the hiring of an Executive Director and ongoing budget work. I would like Iowa County to consider changing the appointment of a Supervisor to the appointment of a paid staff member. I would like to appoint the Finance Director or his/her designee to participate on the County's behalf and to do quarterly reports back to the General Government Committee. This would help improve communications between our two entities, take another meeting off the shoulders of our County Supervisors, and perhaps assist the Fair Board with additional budgeting knowledge.
- 6. The Tax Deed Committee typically meets twice per year. These duties have been moved to the General Government Committee.

IOWA COUNTY COMMITTEES, COMMISSIONS & BOARDS STRUCTURE

Pursuant to Wisconsin State Statutes Chapter 59, counties are authorized to organize under one of three forms of County government: 1) Executive; 2) Administrator; or 3) Administrative Coordinator. Specific statutes define the relationship between the legislative and executive roles of county government. Iowa County is organized under the County Administrator form (Wis. Stat. § 59.18) to insure clarity in roles and appropriate delegation of authority under the powers given a County Board. Committees created by the County Board are organized pursuant to Wis. Stat. § 59.13(1). Some committees are authorized under separate statutes and are referenced later in this document. Committees, Commissions, and Boards establish priorities.

Supervisors serve primarily a legislative function. The legislative function is largely limited to policymaking, lawmaking, budgetary approval, and cooperative decision making. No operational control resides with individual supervisors. Supervisors' authority is collective versus individual. Direction and decision-making by the Board of County Supervisors shall occur as a Board. Individual members of the Board shall not attempt to exercise independent authority over the County Administrator, director, official, or employee thereof. When elected to a committee chair position, a supervisor has the authority to set the agenda for committee meetings, preside at meetings, and make reports and recommendations on the committee's behalf.

The County Administrator presents the budget based on established priorities. A County Board has overall budget approval authority. The role of a County Board is that of being "visionary." Standing committees have policy oversight for departments, offices, and other entities. They monitor performance, review and participate in development of the budget, and draft ordinances and resolutions. Standing committees develop policy which in turn is recommended to the County Board for action. Standing Committee chairs shall report to the County Board at least every other month.

Department heads and/or other staff members provide input, make recommendations, and serve as a resource for committees. They do not vote. Staff members should be allowed an opportunity to provide input or clarify in a committee meeting, but it is not an appropriate role for staff to engage in committee debate or for a committee member or Board members to assign tasks to a staff member. As a collective body, a committee/board/commission may assign tasks to a department head/staff member.

Standing Committees: The following standing committees shall be reappointed after each spring election:

- 1) General Government County Board 1st Vice Chair serves as Committee Chair; Committee elects a Vice Chair and Secretary
- 2) Health & Human Services Chair, Vice Chair and Secretary elected by this committee
- 3) Public Safety Chair, Vice Chair and Secretary elected by this committee
- 4) Public Works Chair, Vice Chair and Secretary elected by this committee

Standing committees shall have not less than three nor more than eight supervisors serving as members. A five member standing committee is preferred. Standing committees shall have a supervisor appointed by the County Board Chair as an alternate, and that person is only compensated for attending a meeting if they are filling in for an absent member.

Committees/Boards/Commissions Align with Standing Committees: Wisconsin statutes mandate the existence of certain Committees/Boards/Commissions, and these shall be identified as such when constituted. The statutes spell out the responsibilities. Further, Wisconsin statutes provide counties with autonomy so that they may appoint committees that meet local needs and interests. Iowa County is involved in multi-county or regional arrangements, and usually a member of the County Board or a citizen is appointed to represent the County. Other boards may represent a specific interest, optional involvement may result from a commitment of resources, and usually a the County Board or citizen а is appointed. Each committee/board/commission shall align with a standing committee.

Assessment of Committees, Boards, and Commissions: Annually, committee members shall review the purpose, accomplishments, and issues. Assessment shall serve as a means to determine how the purpose and functioning might be improved. Additionally. this is time when а the group determines the committee/board/commission continues, is modified, or has completed its work. The County Administrator, supervisors, and staff provide input into the discussion.

Committee on Appointments

Purpose: The purpose of the Committee on Appointments is to assist the County Board Chair in selecting supervisors for all County Committees. The County Board Chair retains veto authority for all appointments. Additionally, input is made to the County Administrator for the committee members to be appointed by that position as outlined in the Wisconsin Statutes. Vice Chairs assist and assume an advisory role. The County Board Chair in consultation with Vice Chairs appoints board members to special committees when the need arises. The preferred length of term to serve on a specific committee, board, or commission shall be six (6) years, however, longer tenure may occur.

- a. Size of the Committee: 3 (Elected Chair, 1st Vice Chair and 2nd Vice Chair)
- b. Frequency of Meetings: As needed
- c. Assessment of the Committee: County Board

Executive Committee

Purpose: The purpose of the Executive Committee is to act on matters for which no other committee has jurisdiction or, where committee jurisdiction is in question or in conflict, on the recommendation of the County Board Chair, the Chair of the Committee and/or the County Administrator. The Executive Committee is empowered to investigate, report, and act on problems or issues that are brought to its attention. This body provides leadership for the hiring and assessment of the county administrator, establishing performance goals and providing feedback. The Executive Committee

provides oversight for the County Board Rules with changes requiring approval by the full County Board. The Executive Committee may also act in emergencies requiring immediate authorization with required subsequent approval of the Board. The Executive Committee has responsibility for the County's real property. The Executive Committee collaborates with the County Administrator and Finance Director to develop and monitor the budget. If a Committee, Board, or Commission better fits with a different Standing Committee, the Executive Committee shall recommend a change to the County Board for action. The Executive Committee is responsible to see that all resolutions and policies are implemented.

- a. Size of the Committee: 7 or less. The Executive Committee shall consist of the Chair of the County Board who shall serve as chair of the Executive Committee, the 1st Vice Chair, the 2nd Vice Chair and the Chair of each standing committee. Vice Chairs of each of the standing committees shall serve as an alternate to the Executive Committee in the event the Committee chair is unavailable or already serves on this committee. The 1st Vice Chair shall serve as the Chair of the General Government Standing Committee.
- b. Frequency of Meetings: Monthly and/or as needed
- c. Assessment of the Committee: County Board

Departments reporting to this committee include:

- a) County Administrator
- b) Corporation Counsel
- c) Finance

THE FOLLOWING COMMITTEES/ COMMISSIONS/BOARDS OF IOWA COUNTY ALIGN WITH THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE –

Long-Range Planning Committee

Purpose: This committee creates, recommends, and monitors a long-range plan that involves analysis of space, building, and service needs of county departments and agencies as well as planning for future growth/contraction of county services.

- a) Size of the Committee: 5 Supervisors
- b) Frequency of Meetings: At least quarterly and as needed
- c) Assessment of the Committee: Annual peer review by the Executive Committee with input from supervisors and staff

Appointment to Standing and Other Committees, Boards, and Commissions: The County Board Chair shall make appointment of all Supervisors to Committees created under County Board Rules, subject to confirmation by the County Board. Where Wisconsin statutes provide that other appointments shall be made by the County Board or by the chairperson of the County Board, those appointments to boards and commissions shall be made by the county administrator and shall be subject to the confirmation of the County Board. The preferred length of term to serve on a specific committee, board, or commission shall be six (6) years, however, longer tenure may occur.

GENERAL GOVERNMENT Standing Committee

Purpose: The General Government Standing Committee provides policy oversight and direction to departments and entities with functions, duties and powers that align with this standing committee. Members of this committee should be engaged with and knowledgeable of programs and services offered by involved departments and committees. The function of this committee shall be to assist in priority setting, policy development, identifying unmet service needs and opportunities, economic development, facilities maintenance, recommending budget in support of priorities, promoting collaborative relationships regionally and within Iowa County, assessing effectiveness and continuation of services and programs, and communicating the value of services and programs to the Board and the public. Furthermore, the Committee is responsible for the sale of property that has not paid taxes, in accordance with state statutes.

Size of the Committee: 3 - 8 supervisors (five is preferred)

- a) Frequency of Meetings: Monthly and /or as needed
- b) Assessment of the Committee: Annual peer review by the Executive Committee with input from supervisors and staff

Departments and agencies reporting to this committee include:

- a) County Clerk
- b) Economic Development
- c) Employee Relations
- d) Environmental Services
- e) Information Technology
- f) Register of Deeds
- g) Treasurer

THE FOLLOWING COMMITTEES/ COMMISSIONS/BOARDS OF IOWA COUNTY ALIGN WITH THE GENERAL GOVERNMENT STANDING COMMITTEE –

Iowa County Ethics Board

Purpose: This board reviews and makes recommendations and referrals regarding ethics complaints filed. The Ethics Board primarily focuses on conflict of interest issues.

- a) Size of the Committee: 5 -- individuals from the Iowa County community
- b) Frequency of Meetings: As needed
- c) Assessment of the Board: Annual peer review by the General Government Standing Committee with input from supervisors and staff

Tax Deed Committee

Purpose: The Tax Deed Committee assumes responsibility for the sale of property that has not paid taxes in accordance with state statues.

- a) Size of the Committee: 3-5 Supervisors
- a) Frequency of Meetings: At least quarterly and as needed
- b) Assessment of the Committee: Annual peer review by the General Government Standing Committee with input from supervisors and staff

The General Government Standing Committee has three clusters and the goal is to have these clusters communicating around areas of common interest. Clusters include: a) Economic Development, b) Education and c) Recreation & Tourism. Additionally, it will be helpful to have one County Board member serving on one of the committees in a specific cluster. Committees, commissions and/or boards in a cluster will be encouraged to meet at least annually around issues of mutual interest.

CLUSTER - Economic Development

Southwest Wisconsin Housing Region (Required for Participation in Program)

Iowa County Fair Association Board

Purpose: <u>lowa County hereby appoints the Finance Director or his/her designee as the official County representative on the lowa County Fair Association Board. Should the Finance Director be unable to attend a Fair Board Meeting, the County Administrator shall attend as an alternate and have complete voting authority in place of the Finance Director or designee. This board has overall responsibility and oversight for the lowa County Fairgrounds including the annual fair and other activities that occur throughout the year. The Board provides oversight for operation, improvements, maintenance, priority setting, identifying unmet needs and opportunities, budget development in support of priorities, maintenance of collaborative relationships with the people, businesses, and communities throughout lowa County, staffing decisions and communicating the value of services and programs to the public.</u>

Southwest Wisconsin Library Board (Wis. Stat. §§ 43.19(1)(b)1 & 43.58)

Ludden Lake District Commission (Wis. Stat. §§ 33.28 & 66.30)

The Tri-County Airport Commission provides oversight for improvements, operation, and maintenance of the airport as well as for the budget. This Commission provides jurisdiction for the Airport Land Use Plan as part of the Iowa County zoning ordinance. The Sauk County Department of Conservation, Planning and Zoning provides the administrative support for the tri-county airport.

- a) Size of the Commission: 7—Two Supervisors from each County and one regular airport user
- a) Frequency of Meetings: Monthly and/or as needed
- b) Assessment of the Commission: Annual peer review with input from supervisors and staff

Wisconsin River Rail Transit Commission (Wis. Stat. § 59.968)

Purpose: Crawford, Dane, Grant, Iowa, Richland, Rock, Sauk, Walworth, and Waukesha Counties are served and therefore are members of this commission. The purpose of this commission is to oversee operations and maintain as much right-of-way and rail as possible. A branch from Madison to Prairie du Chien with spurs to Mazomanie and Lone Rock is included.

- a) Size of the Commission: Three commissioners from each county for staggered three year terms and one staff member from the Iowa County Highway Department may be a Supervisor
- b) Frequency of Meetings: Monthly and/or as needed
- c) Assessment of the Commission: Annual peer review with input from supervisors and staff

IOWA COUNTY BOARD OF SUPERVISORS RESOLUTION 10-322

A RESOLUTION DIRECTING CERTAIN JUSTICE, EQUITY, DIVERSITY, AND INCLUSION (JEDI) EFFORTS

WHEREAS, the Iowa County Board of Supervisors would like to increase the diversity of Iowa County employee base, labor pool, and county population; and

WHEREAS, the County Administrator has developed a plan of specific ideas to move lowa County in the direction of greater justice, equity, diversity and inclusion (JEDI) to help lowa County Board, staff, and residents develop a welcoming community for new residents.

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, by the lowa County Board of Supervisors that the following actions be taken as a means to encourage greater cultural sensitivity, greater diversity, and support for minority populations:

- 1. The County Administrator, all County Department Heads, and the lowa County Board shall receive 5 hours of Cultural Sensitivity, Diversity, and Inclusion training in 2022 and 5 additional hours in 2023.
- 2. In 2023, the County Administrator shall establish the position of Social Worker in the Sheriff's Office to assist with communications and follow up with former inmates in an effort to reduce recidivism. This position will increase interdepartmental and community communications, as well as open the door to more staff training opportunities.
- 3. The County Administrator and Sheriff shall begin a relationship and series of discussions with the School Districts of Iowa County to determine how Iowa County and the JEDI effort can help with their diversity efforts.
- 4. Beginning in 2023, lowa County will specifically budget to place additional employment opportunity advertisements in periodicals, newsletters, or websites that are specifically geared toward minority populations not currently represented in the workforce to grow area diversity.

NOW BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, by the lowa County Board of Supervisors that: It is understood that an educated populace and an educated workforce will help fight discrimination and fear of differences. Iowa County is committed toward making our community one in which people who are different are accepted, assimilated, and welcomed.
