Award General Conditions:

1. Wisconsin Deflection Initiative

What is Deflection?

- ▶ Connects individuals struggling with substance use disorders or mental health disorders to treatment services, recovery support, mental health services, and community resources
- ▶ Linkage to treatment or support services occurs prior to or at the beginning of criminal justice system involvement
- ▶ Targets low-level, non-violent offenders suffering with a substance use disorder or mental health disorder

Deflection Pathways in Wisconsin



Overdose and Crisis Response (Naloxone Plus): First responders refer individuals following an overdose or mental health crisis.



Active Outreach: First responders and program staff identify and refer individuals in need of treatment, mental health services, or community resources.



Self-referral: Individuals, friends, family, and other community members contact law enforcement or program staff about participation in the deflection program prior to or after arrest.



Community Response: Teams often made up of behavioral health professionals respond to calls for service where they mediate low-level conflict, de-escalate crises and refer individuals to the deflection program.



First Responder and Officer Referral: First responders refer individuals to the deflection program during routine activities.



Officer Intervention: During situations where charges might otherwise be filed, law enforcement refers eligible individuals to the deflection program. Charges are either not filed or held in abeyance until completion of the program, or law enforcement issues a non-criminal citation to complete the program.

Objectives and Performance Measures



Reduce Recidivism and Limit Exposure to the Justice System

- ▶ Re-arrest: The percentage of participants who commit a new offense that resulted in a new arrest
- ▶ Re-charge: The percentage of participants who commit a new offense that resulted in new charges
- ▶ Re-conviction: The percentage of participants who commit a new offense that resulted in a new conviction and sentence to jail, prison, or probation



Improved Linkages to Substance Use Disorder Treatment Services and Treatment Compliance

- ▶ Number of referrals: Total number of individuals referred to the deflection program
- ▶ Admission rate: The percentage of individuals screened for the deflection program who are found eligible for the program
- ▶ Frequency of treatment services: The frequency of participant attendance at treatment services between admission and discharge
- ▶ Discharge: The percentage of participants discharged from the program by discharge type (graduation, administrative, termination)



Improvement in Housing, Education, and Employment

- ▶ Housing: Change or improvement in a participant's housing status from referral to discharge in the program
- ▶ Employment: Change or improvement in a participant's employment status from referral to discharge in the program
- ▶ Education: Change or improvement in a participant's education status from referral to discharge in the program



Sobriety or Reduced Substance Use

- ▶ Sobriety: The average total drug and alcohol tests that are returned positive for illegal, banned, or unapproved substances
