Petition Summary: This is a request to enlarge an existing B-2 Hwy Bus lot, create a C-1 Conservancy lot and create an AB-1 Ag Bus lot.

#### Comments/Recommendations

- 1. The uses of the existing B-2 lot have exceeded the lot boundaries. thus the proposal to enlarge it.
- 2. The proposed C-1 lot is planned to be sold for continued agricultural use. It cannot remain A-1 as it does not meet the minimum 40-acre lot size for the A-1 district.
- 3. If approved, the B-2 lot would be eligible only for the uses approved by conditional use permit. The C-1 lot would be eligible for open space uses but no development. The AB-1 lot would be eligible only for the uses approved by conditional use permit, plus ag cropping.
- 4. The preliminary certified survey map has not been submitted for review.

Town Recommendation: The Town of Arena feels the proposal is consistent with its comprehensive plan and recommends approval as follows:

1. The enlarged B-2 lot to be permitted by conditional use permit a deer farm, petting zoo, hay rides, brat stand, farm market, equipment storage, and craft fair.

- 2. The AB-1 lot to be permitted by conditional use permit Agritainment including corn mazes, hay rides, sleigh rides, on-farm tours, and haunted.
- 3. Approval of the C-1 lot.

**Staff Recommendation:** Staff recommends approval with the following conditions:

- 1. The deer farm use on the B-2 lot must comply with all state licensing requirements.
- 2. No parking is allowed within a public right of way.
- 3. The County shall have the authority to require portable toilets if a planned event may exceed the capacity of the onsite septic system. The associated certified survey map be duly recorded within 6 months of the County Board approving the zoning change.

Petition Summary: This is a request to create a 16.219-acre lot by rezoning from A-1 Ag to AR-1 Ag Res.

#### Comments/Recommendations

- 1. The applicant proposes to divide his property, selling approximately 30-31 acres to an adjacent landowner to the west, leaving the 16.219 acres. The A-1 district requires a minimum 40-acre lot size so it is being petitioned to be zoned AR-1 Ag Res.
- 2. The land to be sold to the adjacent neighbor will need to be consolidated by deed with the neighbor's existing land. It is all zoned
- 3. If approved, the AR-1 lot would be eligible for one single family residence, accessory structures and limited ag uses, including up to 8 livestock type animal units.
- 4. The preliminary certified survey map has not been submitted for review. It will eliminate the existing 1-acre Lot 1 of CSM 320 by encompassing it within.

# IOWA COUNTY ALL-TERRAIN and UTILITY TERRAIN VEHICLE ROUTE ORDINANCE

#### **SECTION 1.0: INTRODUCTION**

#### 1.1 NAME

This Ordinance shall be called the Iowa County All-Terrain and Utility-Terrain Vehicle Route Ordinance.

#### 1.2 INTENT

Following due consideration of the recreational and economic value to connect trail opportunities and weighted against possible dangers, public health, liability aspects, terrain involved, traffic density and history of automobile traffic, this ordinance has been created pursuant to County Board authority under Wis. Stat. §§ 59.02, 23.33(4)(d)3.b., 23.33(11)(a) and (am), and 23.33(8)(b) as amended.

#### 1.3 DEFINITIONS

- A. <u>All-Terrain Vehicle ("ATV")</u> has the meaning specified within Wis. Stat. § 340.01 (2g).
- B. <u>ATV/UTV Route</u> shall mean a highway or sidewalk designated for use by all-terrain and utility-terrain vehicle operators by the governmental entity having jurisdiction.
- C. <u>Utility-Terrain Vehicle ("UTV")</u> has the meaning specified within Wis. Stat. § 23.33 (1), (ng).

#### 1.4 SEVERABILITY

The provisions of this Ordinance shall be deemed severable and it is expressly declared that lowa County would have passed the other provisions of this Ordinance irrespective of whether or not one or more provisions may be declared invalid. If any provision of this Ordinance or the application to any person or circumstance is held invalid, the remainder of this Ordinance and the application of such provisions to other persons and circumstances shall not be deemed affected.

#### 1.5 SAVING CLAUSE

This Ordinance shall in no way be deemed to supplant or otherwise invalidate any provision of state statutes relating to the subject matter hereof. Any person entrusted with the enforcement of this Ordinance may, in the exercise of his or her discretion, proceed under applicable state statutes.

#### **SECTION 2.0: ATV/UTV ROUTES AND OPERATION**

#### 2.1 DESIGNATION

All requests for new or revised ATV/UTV route designations shall first be submitted to the lowa County Traffic Safety Commission for review at its November quarterly meeting. The lowa County Traffic Safety Commission shall review such requests for county trunk highway route designations and make a recommendation to the lowa County Public Works Committee. The Public Works Committee shall review designation of ATV/UTV routes, including appropriate criteria for making a designation, and make a recommendation to the lowa County Board of Supervisors. County highways designated as ATV/UTV routes shall be approved by the lowa County Board of Supervisors by amendment of Sec. 2.4 of this Ordinance.

A copy of ATV/UTV routes, along with a map showing their location, shall be kept on file at the Highway Department. The Iowa County Highway Department shall file ATV/UTV routes adopted by this Ordinance with the Department of Natural Resources Conservation Warden for Iowa County and with the Madison, Wisconsin, Office of the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources. The Iowa County Highway Commissioner shall have the authority to temporarily close or terminate any ATV/UTV route enacted by this Ordinance for a period of ninety (90) days due to emergency situation or condition. Closures for duration of greater than ninety (90) days shall be reviewed by the Public Works Committee.

#### 2.2 RULES OF OPERATION

- A. All ATV/UTVs shall operate only on the paved portion of the roadway. Operation on the gravel shoulders, grassy in-slope, ditches, or other highway right-of-way area is prohibited and illegal.
- B. No ATV/UTV shall be operated at a speed greater than 30 miles per hour (MPH), or the posted speed limit, whichever is lower.
- C. No ATV/UTV may be operated on any designated route between the hours of 1:00 AM and 5:00 AM daily.
- D. All ATV/UTV operators shall ride in single file on the extreme right hand side of the paved portion of the highway except that left turns may be made from any part of the roadway which is safe given prevailing conditions.
- E. All ATV/UTV operators shall have their headlight and taillight illuminated, while operating on a county highway.

- F. Except as otherwise authorized by State law, all operators
  - a. of ATV's who are at least 12 years of age and who are born on or after January 1, 1988 shall possess a valid state-issued ATV Safety Certification.
  - b. of ATV's between the age of 12 and 15 must be accompanied by a parent or legal guardian or a person at least 18 years of age who is designated by the parent or guardian at all times when operating on a roadway designated as an ATV route or when operating on roadways of highways that are ATV trails.
  - c. of UTV's must be 16 years of age or older.
  - d. of UTV's who are at least 16 years of age and who are born on or after January 1, 1988 must possess a valid state-issued Safety Certificate.
  - e. of ATV/UTV's and their passengers under 18 years old shall wear protective headgear while operating on route-designated county highways.
- G. Mandatory Use of Seatbelts during Operation of a UTV. ALL occupants riding in, or operating a UTV, shall be required to wear a seatbelt when travelling on any trail or route within Iowa County.
- H. Possession of Open Intoxicants in an ATV or UTV while in Operation. It shall be unlawful for any person to possess any bottle or receptacle containing alcohol beverages if the bottle or receptacle has been opened, the seal has been broken, or the contents of the receptacle have been partially removed, while operating or as a passenger on an ATV or UTV on any road or road route in Iowa County.
- I. ATV/UTV operation shall be subject to all provisions of WI Stats. § 23.33, which is adopted as a part of this ordinance by reference.

#### 2.3 SIGNAGE OF ATV ROUTES

- A. Routes shall be marked with uniform all-terrain vehicle route signs in accordance with s. NR 64.12(7), Wisconsin Administrative Code. No person may do any of the following in regard to signs marking ATV/UTV routes:
  - 1) Intentionally remove, damage, deface, move, or obstruct any uniform ATV/UTV route or trail sign or standard or intentionally interfere with the effective operation of any uniform ATV/UTV route or trail sign.
  - 2) Possess any uniform ATV/UTV route or trail sign or standard of the type established by the department for the warning, instruction or information of the public, unless he or she obtained the uniform ATV/UTV route or trail sign or standard in a lawful manner. Possession of a uniform ATV/UTV route or trail sign or standard creates a rebuttable presumption of illegal possession.

- B. All required designated route signs shall be paid for by an ATV/UTV club, with approval, installation, and maintenance of the signs by the Iowa County Highway Department.
- C. The quantity and location of signage shall be reviewed and approved by the Iowa County Highway Commissioner, where appropriate, placed at the beginning of an all-terrain vehicle route within the county and at such locations and intervals deemed necessary to enable the ATV/UTV operators to follow the route.
- D. No sign may be mounted on any existing County sign post or telephone post/pole. Posts shall be suitably sized for mounting the necessary amount of signs at the location
- E. No person shall operate an ATV/UTV contrary to any authorized and official posted sign.

#### 2.4 DESIGNATION OF ROUTES

The following routes shall be considered as legal routes to be signed for usage through the adoption of this Ordinance:

- i. CTH A, from the intersection of Ogden Road to the intersection of Cook-McFall Road, in the Town of Mifflin, Secs. 3 and 10; T4N; R1E; a total distance of 0.25 miles-more or less.
- ii. CTH B, from the intersection with Sunny Slope Road and the intersection with Sunny Slope Road, in the town of Linden, Sec 3 and 4; T5N; R2E; a total distance of 0.25 miles.
- iii. CTH B, from the intersection with CTH J to the intersection with CTH G in the town of Eden, Sec. 36; T6N; R1E; a total distance of 1.0 miles.
- iv. CTH C, from the driveway to Fire #6279 at the Spring Valley Inn west of the intersection with STH 14 to the intersection with High Point Road all in the Town of Arena, Sec. 21; T8N; R4E; a total distance of 1.04 miles.
- v. CTH CC, from the intersection with STH 14 to the intersection with CTH C all in the Town of Arena, Sec. 21; T8N; R4E; a total of 0.43 miles.
- vi. CTH DD, from the intersection with Walnut Hill Road and the intersection with CTH K, in the towns of Waldwick and Moscow, Secs 12, 13, 7, 17 and 18; T4N; R 4&5 E; a total distance of 2.30 miles-more or less.
- vii. CTH E, from intersection with Shepherd Road to intersection with Keough Springs Road, in the town of Linden, Sec 29 and 32; T5N; R2E; a total distance of 0.40 miles.
- <u>viii.</u> CTH E, from the intersection of Lower Mifflin Road westerly to the Iowa County Highway Shop, in the Town of Mifflin, Sec.34; T5N; R1E; a total distance of 0.4 miles-more or less.
- <u>viii.ix.</u> CTH E, from the intersection with STH 80 in the village of Livingston easterly to Enloe Road, in the Town of Mifflin, Secs. 18 and 19; T5N; R1E; a total distance of 1.25 miles.

- ix.x. CTH F, from the Lafayette County line to the intersection of Horseshoe Bend Road and the Lafayette County line in the town of Moscow, Secs. 16 and 17; T4N; R5E; a total distance of 1.0 miles more or less.
- xi. CTH F, from the intersection with Mounds View Road south to the intersection with Clay Hill Road in the Town of Brigham, Secs. 3 and 10; T5N; R5E; a distance of 1.25 miles.
- \*\*xii. CTH G, from the intersection with Elm Street in the Village of Cobb southerly to the intersection with Roaster Road in the Town of Eden Sections 25, 26, 35, and 36; T6N; R1E; a distance of +/- 1.5 miles and in the Towns of Linden and Mifflin; Sec 1 and 2; T5N; R1E; a distance of +/- 1.0 miles.
- <u>xiii.</u> CTH G, from the intersection of Lower Mifflin Road to the intersection of CTH A in the village of Rewey, within the Town of Mifflin, Sec. 5; T4N; R1E; a total distance of 1.0 miles-more or less.
- xi.xiv. CTH G, from the intersection with Enloe Road south to the intersection of CTH E, within the Town of Mifflin, Secs. 22 and 27; T5N; R1E; a distance of 1.80 miles.
- xii.xv. CTH H, from the intersection of Roberts Road to Fire #5304 near the Hyde Store in the unincorporated area of Hyde in the Township of Arena Sections 12, 13, and 14; T7N; R4E; and the Township of Ridgeway Section 23; T7N; R4E; a total distance of 1.92 miles.

This Ordinance and subsequent amendments to it shall be effective on the date after publication. Ordinance No. 600.18B was adopted by the lowa County Board of Supervisors on July 16, 2013, and amended at the following sessions of the County Board: April 21, 2015; April 19, 2016; December 20, 2016; December 19, 2017; March 20, 2018; March 19, 2019.

# Supporting Increased County Child Support Funding

- WHEREAS: Iowa County administers the Child Support Enforcement Program on behalf of the state, providing services to Iowa County residents including paternity establishment, obtaining child support and health insurance orders for children, and enforcing and modifying those orders; and
- **WHEREAS:** Our children's well-being, economic security and success in life are enhanced by parents who provide financial and emotional support; and
- WHEREAS: Iowa County Child Support Agency ensures that parents take responsibility for the care and well-being of their children, supports the involvement of parents in their children's lives and provides services to both custodial and noncustodial parents; and
- WHEREAS: The Child Support Enforcement Program is an effective investment in Wisconsin's future as child support increases self-sufficiency, reduces child poverty, and has a positive effect on children's well-being; and
- **WHEREAS:** Wisconsin's Child Support Enforcement Program is ranked 2<sup>nd</sup> in the nation for collecting current support; and
- WHEREAS: Wisconsin's Child Support Enforcement Program is incredibly cost-effective, collecting an average of \$5.56 in support for every dollar invested in the program; and
- WHEREAS: County child support agencies collected \$934 Million in child support during 2017, 95% of which went directly to families while 5% reimbursed public assistance programs; and
- WHEREAS: Child support agencies help save taxpayer dollars by establishing health insurance orders for 97% of cases, which reduces state Medicaid costs by moving children from public assistance to private insurance; and
- WHEREAS: State funding for county child support services has not increased above the 2007 funding level while county agency costs have steadily increased due to growing caseloads, inflation and new federal regulations; and
- WHEREAS: Wisconsin's strong performance in child support is at risk without additional state funding. Diminished performance would result in reduced federal funding to Wisconsin; and
- **WHEREAS:** Decreased federal funding would lead to less funding for Iowa County Child Support Agency.

- WHEREAS: New state investments in child support are amplified by a generous federal match. Every \$1 of state GPR invested in the Child Support Program generates \$2 in federal matching funds.
- NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the IOWA COUNTY Board of Supervisors respectfully requests that state funding for county child support agencies be increased by \$1.5 million GPR in each fiscal year of the 2019-21 Wisconsin state budget, which will generate approximately \$3 million in additional federal funding each year. This investment will ensure that counties can continue to effectively provide economic support to our children.
- IT IS FURTHER RESOLVED that a copy of this resolution be forwarded by the County Clerk to the Governor of the State of Wisconsin, State Senators and State Representatives representing IOWA COUNTY, the Secretary of the Wisconsin Department of Administration, and the Wisconsin Counties Association for consideration.



lowa County adopted via resolution a "Committee, Commission, and Boards Structure". The attached draft Resolution makes changes to the structure as noted on the resolution:

- A The resolution eliminates the Revolving Loan Fund Committee. The Revolving Loan Fund Committee handled the management of the Iowa County CDBG Revolving Loan Fund. The State of Wisconsin is requiring that the Revolving Loan Fund be closed and the dollars put to use for other purposes. It is my intent to utilize the funds to support an lowa County Broadband initiative. The guidelines for the use of the funds are dictated in the CDBG-CLOSE program at the Wisconsin Department of Administration. The other major Committee responsibility is approving County Structure Grants to local municipalities. I am proposing for 2019 that that responsibility go to the General Government Standing Committee. Ultimately it is anticipated that Iowa County Structure Grants would discontinue in 2020.
- B The local TIF Districts section of the document does not reflect action taken by the County Board assigning the duties of representing Iowa County to the County Administrator and County Treasurer.
- C The Iowa County Library Board is listed in the document as having 12 members. This resolution reduces that to "7-9 members".

# Resolution No. 9-0319

# RESOLUTION AMENDING THE IOWA COUNTY COMMITTEES, COMMISSIONS & BOARDS STRUCTURE

WHEREAS, the Iowa County Board of Supervisors operates under a committee structure established by the Wisconsin State Statutes and the Iowa County Board Rules; and

**WHEREAS**, pursuant to Resolution No. 10-1015, the Iowa County Board established the Iowa County Committees, Commissions, and Boards Structure to establish Committee Structure for Iowa County; and

**WHEREAS,** the Executive Committee has reviewed the Committees, Commissions, and Boards Structure and has updated the document; and

**NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED** that the lowa County Board of Supervisors hereby amends the Committees, Commissions, and Boards Structure as follows:

- A. Economic Development Cluster: Eliminate the Revolving Loan Fund Committee and transfer any of their remaining duties to the General Government Standing Committee.
- B. Modify the Language under the Local TIF Districts as follows:
  - a. Purpose: Iowa County hereby appoints the County Administrator as the official County representative on all local Tax Increment Districts. Should the County Administrator be unable to attend a Joint Review Board Meeting, the County Treasurer shall attend as an alternate and have complete voting authority in place of the County Administrator.
- C. Iowa County Library Board is hereby reduced from 12 members to 7-9 members. The library Director from each Library located wholly in Iowa County shall be permanent members.
- D. Public Safety Standing Committee: Add:

Crime Prevention Funding Surcharge Board (Wis. Stat. § 59.54(28), Iowa County Resolution 4-0416)

**Purpose:** Since passage of Resolution 4-0416, the Iowa County Circuit Court has assessed a \$20 crime prevention surcharge for each criminal conviction that occurs in Iowa County criminal cases. That surcharge is collected by the Iowa County Clerk of Courts and is to be transmitted to the Iowa County Treasurer. The Crime Prevention Funding Surcharge Board is tasked with distributing the amounts collected in the form of grant payments to private nonprofit organizations and law enforcement agencies within Iowa County for crime prevention purposes. The Crime Prevention Funding Surcharge Board also is to produce an annual report on its activities to the Clerk of Court, the County Board, and the legislative bodies of each Iowa County municipality. That annual report is to identify all entities that received a grant, the purpose of the grants, and an accounting of the funds disbursed.

- a) Size of Committee: 7 members, consisting of the circuit court judge (or judge's designee); the district attorney (or D.A.'s designee); the sheriff (or sheriff's designee); the county administrator (or administrator's designee); the chief elected official of the largest municipality in the county, as determined by population (or that official's designee); a person chosen by a majority vote of the sheriff and all of the chiefs of police departments that are located wholly or partly within the county; and a person chosen by the county's public defender's office.
- b) Frequency of Meetings: as needed, no less than annually
- c) Assessment of the Committee: annual peer review with input from supervisors and staff

# IOWA COUNTY COMMITTEES, COMMISSIONS & BOARDS STRUCTURE

Pursuant to Wisconsin State Statutes Chapter 59, counties are authorized to organize under one of three forms of County government: 1) Executive; 2) Administrator; or 3) Administrative Coordinator. Specific statutes define the relationship between the legislative and executive roles of county government. Iowa County is organized under the County Administrator form (Wis. Stat. § 59.18) to insure clarity in roles and appropriate delegation of authority under the powers given a County Board. Committees created by the County Board are organized pursuant to Wis. Stat. § 59.13(1). Some committees are authorized under separate statutes and are referenced later in this document. Committees, Commissions, and Boards establish priorities.

Supervisors serve primarily a legislative function. The legislative function is largely limited to policymaking, lawmaking, budgetary approval, and cooperative decision making. No operational control resides with individual supervisors. Supervisors' authority is collective versus individual. Direction and decision-making by the Board of County Supervisors shall occur as a Board. Individual members of the Board shall not attempt to exercise independent authority over the County Administrator, director, official, or employee thereof. When elected to a committee chair position, a supervisor has the authority to set the agenda for committee meetings, preside at meetings, and make reports and recommendations on the committee's behalf.

The County Administrator presents the budget based on established priorities. A County Board has overall budget approval authority. The role of a County Board is that of being "visionary." Standing committees have policy oversight for departments, offices, and other entities. They monitor performance, review and participate in development of the budget, and draft ordinances and resolutions. Standing committees develop policy which in turn is recommended to the County Board for action. Standing Committee chairs shall report to the County Board at least every other month.

Department heads and/or other staff members provide input, make recommendations, and serve as a resource for committees. They do not vote. Staff members should be allowed an opportunity to provide input or clarify in a committee meeting, but it is not an appropriate role for staff to engage in committee debate or for a committee member or Board members to assign tasks to a staff member. As a collective body, a committee/board/commission may assign tasks to a department head/staff member.

**Standing Committees:** The following standing committees shall be formed after the spring election:

- General Government County Board 1<sup>st</sup> Vice Chair serves as Committee Chair; Committee elects a Vice Chair and Secretary
- 2) Health & Human Services Chair, Vice Chair and Secretary elected by this committee
- 3) Public Safety Chair, Vice Chair and Secretary elected by this committee
- 4) Public Works Chair, Vice Chair and Secretary elected by this committee

Standing committees shall have not less than three nor more than eight supervisors serving as members. A five member standing committee is preferred. Standing committees shall have a supervisor appointed by the County Board Chair as an alternate, and that person is only compensated for attending a meeting if they are filling in for an absent member.

Committees/Boards/Commissions Align with Standing Committees: Wisconsin statutes mandate the existence of certain Committees/Boards/Commissions, and these shall be identified as such when constituted. The statutes spell out the responsibilities. Further, Wisconsin statutes provide counties with autonomy so that they may appoint committees that meet local needs and interests. Iowa County is involved in multi-county or regional arrangements, and usually a member of the County Board or a citizen is appointed to represent the County. Other boards may represent a specific interest, optional involvement may result from a commitment of resources, and usually a of member the County Board or а citizen appointed. is Each committee/board/commission shall align with a standing committee.

Assessment of Committees, Boards, and Commissions: Annually, committee members shall review the purpose, accomplishments, and issues. Assessment shall serve as a means to determine how the purpose and functioning might be improved. Additionally, this is a time when the group determines if the committee/board/commission continues, is modified, or has completed its work. The County Administrator, supervisors, and staff provide input into the discussion.

# **Committee on Appointments**

**Purpose:** The purpose of the Committee on Appointments is to assist the County Board Chair in selecting supervisors for all County Committees. The County Board Chair retains veto authority for all appointments. Additionally, input is made to the County Administrator for the committee members to be appointed by that position as outlined in the Wisconsin Statutes. Vice Chairs assist and assume an advisory role. The County Board Chair in consultation with Vice Chairs appoints board members to special committees when the need arises. The preferred length of term to serve on a specific committee, board, or commission shall be six (6) years, however, longer tenure may occur.

- a. Size of the Committee: 3 (Elected Chair, 1st Vice Chair and 2nd Vice Chair)
- b. Frequency of Meetings: As needed
- c. Assessment of the Committee: County Board

# **Executive Committee**

**Purpose:** The purpose of the Executive Committee is to act on matters for which no other committee has jurisdiction or, where committee jurisdiction is in question or in conflict, on the recommendation of the County Board Chair, the Chair of the Committee and/or the County Administrator. The Executive Committee is empowered to investigate, report, and act on problems or issues that are brought to its attention. This body provides leadership for the hiring and assessment of the county administrator, establishing performance goals and providing feedback. The Executive Committee provides oversight for the County Board Rules with changes requiring approval by the full County Board. The Executive Committee may also act in emergencies requiring

immediate authorization with required subsequent approval of the Board. The Executive Committee has responsibility for the County's real property. The Executive Committee collaborates with the County Administrator and Finance Director to develop and monitor the budget. If a Committee, Board, or Commission better fits with a different Standing Committee, the Executive Committee shall recommend a change to the County Board for action. The Executive Committee is responsible to see that all resolutions and policies are implemented.

- a. Size of the Committee: 7 or less. The Executive Committee shall consist of the Chair of the County Board who shall serve as chair of the Executive Committee, the 1<sup>st</sup> Vice Chair, the 2<sup>nd</sup> Vice Chair and the Chair of each standing committee. Vice Chairs of each of the standing committees shall serve as an alternate to the Executive Committee in the event the Committee chair is unavailable or already serves on this committee. The 1<sup>st</sup> Vice Chair shall serve as the Chair of the General Government Standing Committee.
- b. Frequency of Meetings: Monthly and/or as needed
- c. Assessment of the Committee: County Board

Departments reporting to this committee include:

- a) County Administrator
- b) Corporation Counsel
- c) Finance

Appointment to Standing and Other Committees, Boards, and Commissions: The County Board Chair shall make appointment of all Supervisors to Committees created under County Board Rules, subject to confirmation by the County Board. Where Wisconsin statutes provide that other appointments shall be made by the County Board or by the chairperson of the County Board, those appointments to boards and commissions shall be made by the county administrator and shall be subject to the confirmation of the County Board. The preferred length of term to serve on a specific committee, board, or commission shall be six (6) years, however, longer tenure may occur.

# GENERAL GOVERNMENT Standing Committee

**Purpose:** The General Government Standing Committee provides policy oversight and direction to departments and entities with functions, duties and powers that align with this standing committee. Members of this committee should be engaged with and knowledgeable of programs and services offered by involved departments and committees. The function of this committee shall be to assist in priority setting, policy development, identifying unmet service needs and opportunities, economic development, facilities maintenance, recommending budget in support of priorities, promoting collaborative relationships regionally and within Iowa County, assessing effectiveness and continuation of services and programs, and communicating the value of services and programs to the Board and the public.

- a) Size of the Committee: 3 8 supervisors (five is preferred)
- b) Frequency of Meetings: Monthly and /or as needed
- c) Assessment of the Committee: Annual peer review by the Executive Committee with input from supervisors and staff

Departments and agencies reporting to this committee include:

- a) County Clerk
- b) Economic Development
- c) Employee Relations
- d) Environmental Services
- e) Information Technology
- f) Register of Deeds
- g) Treasurer

# **Iowa County Ethics Board**

**Purpose:** This board reviews and makes recommendations and referrals regarding ethics complaints filed. The Ethics Board primarily focuses on conflict of interest issues.

- a) Size of the Committee: 5 -- individuals from the Iowa County community
- b) Frequency of Meetings: As needed
- c) Assessment of the Board: Annual peer review by the General Government Standing Committee with input from supervisors and staff

# **Long-Range Planning Committee**

**Purpose:** This committee creates, recommends, and monitors a long-range plan that involves analysis of space, building, and service needs of county departments and agencies as well as planning for future growth/contraction of county services.

- a) Size of the Committee: 5 Supervisors
- b) Frequency of Meetings: At least quarterly and as needed
- c) Assessment of the Committee: Annual peer review by the General Government Standing Committee with input from supervisors and staff

### **Tax Deed Committee**

**Purpose:** The Tax Deed Committee assumes responsibility for the sale of property that has not paid taxes in accordance with state statues.

- a) Size of the Committee: 3-5 Supervisors
- b) Frequency of Meetings: At least quarterly and as needed
- c) Assessment of the Committee: Annual peer review by the Economic Development & Property Standing Committee with input from supervisors and staff

The General Government Standing Committee has three clusters and the goal is to have these clusters communicating around areas of common interest. Clusters include: a) Economic Development, b) Education and c) Recreation & Tourism. Additionally, it will be helpful to have one County Board member serving on one of the committees in a specific cluster. Committees, commissions and/or boards in a cluster will be encouraged to meet at least annually around issues of mutual interest.

# **CLUSTER - Economic Development**

# **Revolving Loan Fund Commission**

**Purpose:** This Commission has the authority to review, select, and recommend loan applications and make policy recommendations to the County Board for administration of the program including fees. Members shall consist of representatives of broad community interest, and have special expertise and knowledge of commercial lending, accounting, management, business law, and economic development.

- a) Size of the Commission: 5-7 members from the community
- b) Frequency of Meetings: As needed
- c) Assessment of the Commission: Annual peer review by members of the Commission and input from supervisors and staff

# Southwest Wisconsin Housing Region (Required for Participation in Program)

**Purpose:** Eleven (11) counties created what has become the Southwest Wisconsin Housing Region to provide adequate housing for limited resource households. Programs such as down payment assistance and repair assistance may be available to limited resource households.

- a) Size of the Region: 11 -- one member from each of the 11 counties; staff member
- b) Frequency of Meetings: As needed
- c) Assessment of the Consortium: Annual peer review by members of the Consortium and input from supervisors and staff

# Southwest Wisconsin Workforce Development Board

**Purpose:** The Southwest Wisconsin Workforce Development Board (SWWDB) is a private, non-profit corporation dedicated to promoting innovation and providing quality local workforce development programs and services to businesses and residents in Southwest Wisconsin.

- a) Size of the Board: 32 members A majority of the Board members are from private sector businesses and include business owners, chief executives, or operating officers with optimum policy-making or hiring authority. The remainder of the board is from public sector organizations and agencies – one Supervisor/ county
- b) Frequency of Meetings: At least quarterly and/or as needed
- c) Assessment of the Board: Annual peer Review by the Board with input from supervisors and staff

# Southwestern Wisconsin Regional Planning Commission (Wis. Stat. § 66.0309)

**Purpose:** The Southwestern Wisconsin Regional Planning Commission collaborates with communities and organizations to build capacity within southwestern Wisconsin, serving as advocates for its residents. Regional Planning create opportunities and develop dynamic solutions to the challenges facing the region. This agency fosters growth by supporting innovative endeavors that provide tangible benefits to those served. The SWWRPC believe in the bold vision of southwestern Wisconsin and works to build the region's future. Counties involved include: Grant, Green, Iowa, Lafayette, and Richland.

 a) Size of the Commission: 15 -- 3 from each county (County Board Chair or their designee as approved by the County Board, 1 is appointed by the Governor and County Board, and another appointed by the Governor

- b) Frequency of Meetings: At least quarterly and/or as needed
- c) Assessment of the Commission: Annual peer review by the Commission with input from supervisors and staff

### **Local TIF Districts**

**Purpose:** Nine communities (Arena, Avoca, Barneveld, Dodgeville, Highland, Livingston, Mineral Point, Muscoda, Ridgeway) have a Tax Increment Financing (TIF) district that includes a County Board appointment. A TIF is the main vehicle used by Wisconsin Cities and Villages to improve areas of the city/village to attract residential, commercial and industrial growth. A TIF district does not increase or decrease property taxes to residents. A TIF District is set up with contiguous parcels of property and the purpose of a TIF district is generally for infrastructure improvements to attract development.

- a) Size of the Board: Determined by the Municipality
- b) Frequency of Meetings: As needed
- c) Assessment of the Board: Annual peer review by the Board with input from supervisors and staff

# **CLUSTER - Education**

# **Iowa County Fair Association Board**

**Purpose:** This board has overall responsibility and oversight for the lowa County Fairgrounds including the annual fair and other activities that occur throughout the year. The Board provides oversight for operation, improvements, maintenance, priority setting, identifying unmet needs and opportunities, budget development in support of priorities, maintenance of collaborative relationships with the people, businesses, and communities throughout lowa County, staffing decisions and communicating the value of services and programs to the public.

- a) Size of the Board: 12 members and may include one Supervisor
- b) Frequency of Meetings: Monthly and/or as needed
- c) Assessment of the Board: Annual peer review by the Board with input from supervisors and staff

# Southwest Wisconsin Library Board (Wis. Stat. §§ 43.19(1)(b)1 & 43.58)

**Purpose:** This Board has oversight for policies, budget and finances, and services to member public libraries in Crawford, Grant, Iowa, Lafayette, and Richland Counties.

- a) Size of the Board: Approximately 15 -- there is one representative from each County Board of Supervisors and Resource Library Representatives.
- b) Frequency of Meetings: At least 6 times each year and as needed
- c) Assessment of the Board: Annual peer review by members and input from supervisors and staff

# lowa County Library Board (Wis. Stat. § 43.11 and Act 150)

**Purpose:** This Board develops a county wide library plan, makes revisions to an existing plan, or makes changes to the boundaries of a public library system. The goal is to provide for library services for all residents of the county.

a) Size of the Board: Approximately 12 members including one member of the County Board

- b) Frequency of Meetings: At least quarterly
- c) Assessment of the Board: Annual peer review by members and input from supervisors and staff

# **Local Library Boards**

**Purpose:** Three of the libraries in Iowa County (Barneveld, Dodgeville, Mineral Point) have a board that requires a County Board appointment. These Boards have responsibility for policy making as it relates to use, management, regulation, budgeting, and preservation of the public library system as provided in Wisconsin Statutes, Chapter 43.

- a) Size of the Board: Varies with at least one County Board appointment
- b) Frequency of Meetings: Established by the local Board
- c) Assessment of the Board: Annual peer review by members

# <u>CLUSTER – Recreation & Tourism</u>

# Hidden Valley Committee (Bylaws)

**Purpose:** Nine counties collaborate to promote tourism in the Hidden Valley region of Wisconsin. This committee provides oversight and support for promotion activities that occur both regionally and within a county.

- a) Size of the Committee: 12-16 -- each county represented by a Supervisor and at least one volunteer who is engaged in the tourism industry
- b) Frequency of Meetings: Monthly and/or as needed

# Tri-County Trail Commission (formerly Cheese Trail Commission (Bylaws)

**Purpose:** This commission provides oversight for maintaining and managing the Monroe to Mineral Point railroad right-of-way for use as an all year, all-purpose public recreation corridor.

- a) Size of the Commission: 11 -- 6 Supervisors (Green County), 4 Supervisors (Lafayette County), 1 Supervisor (Iowa County)
- b) Frequency of Meetings: Monthly and/or as needed
- c) Assessment of the Commission: Annual peer review by the Committee with input from supervisors and staff

# HEALTH & HUMAN SERVICES Standing Committee

Purpose: The Health & Human Services Standing Committee provides policy oversight and direction to departments and entities with functions, duties and powers that align with this standing committee. Members of this commission are engaged and knowledgeable of the programs and services offered. The Commission also serves as the fiduciary agent for segregated funds such as the Campbell fund and any others that are created for specific needs.

- c) Assessment of the Committee: Annual peer review with input from supervisors and staff

# Board of Health (Wis. Stat. § 251.04)

**Purpose:** The Committee on Health provides policy direction and oversight with respect to Chapter 250-255 of the Wisconsin Statutes relating to public and environmental health matters. Members of this committee should be engaged and knowledgeable of the programs and services offered through the Department of Health. Assist in priority setting, identifying unmet service needs and opportunities, budget development in support of priorities, development of collaborative relationships within Iowa County and

regionally, assess services and programs, and communicating the value of services and programs to all members of the Board and public.

- a) Size of the Committee: 7 -- 3-4 Supervisors and 3-4 community members
- b) Frequency of Meetings: Quarterly and/or as needed
- c) Assessment of the Committee: Annual peer review with input from supervisors and staff

# Extension & Agriculture Education Committee (Wis. Stat. § 59.56(3)(b))

**Purpose:** The Committee on Agriculture and Extension Education is to provide oversight and program direction to the UW-Extension Staff. Be engaged and knowledgeable of the programs offered by UWEX, promoting collaborative relationships regionally and within Iowa County. Conduct UWEX staff performance reviews, assist in budget development, participate in interviews for new staff when positions become vacant, communicate the value of UWEX to Iowa County residents and participate in the statewide WI Association of County Extension Committees (WACEC).

- a) Size of the Committee 5 Supervisors (Fair Board representative serves on this committee)
- b) Frequency of Meetings quarterly and/or as needed
- c) Assessment of the Committee Annual peer review with input from supervisors and staff

# **Veterans Service Commission (Wis. Stat. § 45.81(1))**

**Purpose:** The Veterans Service Commission provides oversight for programs and services for the men and women who have served our country in the Armed Forces of the United States. Programs and services are extended to those serving in times of peace, as well as in times of war, and include those who have served in the National Guard and the Reserves.

- a) Size of the Commission: 3 -- staggered three year terms, no supervisors
- b) Frequency of Meetings: As needed
- c) Assessment of the Commission: Annual peer review with input from supervisors and staff

THE FOLLOWING COMMITTEES/ COMMISSIONS/BOARDS INVOLVE ONE OR MORE OTHER COUNTIES AND IOWA COUNTY'S PARTICIPATION ALIGNS WITH THE HEALTH & HUMAN SERVICES STANDING COMMITTEE:

Aging and Disability Resource Center, Southwestern, WI Regional Board (Bylaws) Purpose: Grant, Green, Iowa, and Layette Counties constitute the ADRC SWW. This Committee has oversight for services and programs with adults and families who are affected by aging, disability, mental health or substance abuse issues so that their quality of life might be enhanced. Collaborative efforts are valued and reports directly to State of Wisconsin.

- a) Size of Committee: 12 (one Supervisor per county and an advocate for each of the purposes)

# Marsh Country Health Alliance Board (Agreement)

The purpose of forming MCHA is to provide financial resources to offset Dodge County for the inequitable losses Dodge County incurs due to caring for residents from other counties that have specialized physical and mental health needs. Dodge County is financially accountable because it provides the majority of funding and has effective control over the operation of the facility.

- a) Size of the Board: 14-16 -- Official representative must be a County Board Supervisor
- b) Frequency of Meetings: As needed, the County Executive Commissioners meet yearly.
- c) Assessment of the Board: Annual peer review with input from supervisors and staff

# Seniors United for Nutrition Board (S.U.N.) (Bylaws)

**Purpose:** The Seniors United for Nutrition Program, Inc. (SUN) Board provides oversight for services and programs that support and assist seniors 60 and over by providing hot nutritious meals, home delivered or in a group setting, to promote fellowship, reduce isolation, and to provide prevention programming to assist in maintaining independence and involvement in their community. Iowa and Lafayette Counties have a collaborative program.

- a) Size of the Committee: 6 -- three Supervisors from each county
- b) Frequency of Meetings: Monthly or as needed
- c) Assessment of the Board: Annual peer review with input from supervisors and staff

# Southwestern Community Action Program Board (SWCAP) (Agreement with state and federal government)

- b) Frequency of Meetings: Monthly or as needed

# Unified Board of Grant and Iowa Counties (Wis. Stat. § 51.42)

The natural resource experts will provide testimony helping to make the case before the Commission that the proposed Cardinal-Hickory Creek transmission line will have significant, long-lasting detrimental impacts on the unique scenic Driftless Area and its natural and cultural resources.

#### The Natural Resources Expert Team members are:

Terry Ingram is the President of the Eagle Nature Foundation. Mr. Ingram has devoted his life to saving the natural world, which includes bald eagles and honeybees, as well as other birds, animals and insects. He has studied the bald eagle for decades, and received several awards for his work. Mr. Ingram's testimony focuses on impacts to bald eagles and other animal species.

Dr. Curt Meine is a Conservation Biologist, Environmental Historian and Writer. Mr. Meine is an adjunct faculty member at UW-Madison, a Senior Fellow with the Center for Humans and Nature, a Senior Leopold Fellow with the Aldo Leopold Foundation, and a research associate with the International Crane Foundation. Mr. Meine has written and edited several books on Aldo Leopold, conservation, and environmental history. He is coeditor of The Driftless Reader (2017). Mr. Meine's testimony will focus on the importance of the Driftless Area and the harmful impacts of the proposed transmission line on natural and cultural resources.

George Meyer is the Executive Director of Wisconsin Wildlife Foundation. Mr. Meyer served as the Secretary of the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources ("DNR") from 1993 to 2001, after having served in other capacities at DNR starting in 1970. Mr. Meyer's testimony will address the harmful impacts of the proposed transmission line on natural resources and environmental impact statement issues.

ELPC has retained the Center for Renewables Integration, GridPolicy, Rakon Energy and Strategen Consulting to provide expert witness consulting and testimony in PSCW Case No. 5-CE-146 involving the application of the American Transmission Company, ITC Midwest, and Dairyland Power Cooperative for a certificate of public convenience and necessity to build the proposed Cardinal-Hickory Creek transmission line and exert eminent domain to take private land. The Energy Expert Team will provide testimony helping to make the case before the Commission that the proposed Cardinal-Hickory Creek transmission line is unneeded for reliability, not cost-effective, and that there are better, cheaper, cleaner, more flexible and more environmentally-friendly distributed clean energy generation and alternative transmission solutions.

The Energy Expert Team will address the following issues:

- 1. The extent to which ATC et al. have overstated the benefits of the transmission line.
- 2. The extent to which ATC et al. have understated the costs of the transmission line.
- 3. A critique of ATC's "non-transmission alternative" portfolio and the development of one or more portfolios of Alternative Transmission Solutions, including distributed solar and wind generation and energy storage technologies, and energy efficiency and demand response, that can fulfill the same functions as a "wires-based" solution at a lower overall cost.
- 4. Analysis of how an Alternative Transmission Solutions portfolio can fulfill the same transmission objectives as the proposed transmission line, and thus should receive the same cost allocation under existing Federal Energy Regulatory Commission rules and case law.

## The Energy Expert Team members are:

If necessary, DNR will hold separate hearings on its water permits or other DNR regulatory actions discussed in this draft EIS.

# **Executive Summary**

On April 30, 2018, American Transmission Company LLC, ITC Midwest LLC, and Dairyland Power Cooperative (together, applicants) filed an application with the Public Service Commission of Wisconsin (Commission) under Wis. Stat. § 196.491 and Wis. Admin. Code § PSC 111.53 for authority to construct new transmission facilities. The applicants are seeking the Commission's approval of the project and the issuance of a Certificate of Public Convenience and Necessity (CPCN). The primary focus of the proposed Cardinal-Hickory Creek Transmission Line Project (Cardinal-Hickory Creek) is to install a new 345 kilovolt (kV) transmission line from the Hickory Creek Substation in Dubuque County, Iowa to the Cardinal Substation in Dane County, Wisconsin. Depending on approvals and possible route alternatives selected by the Commission, the new Cardinal-Hickory Creek 345 kV transmission line would be between 84 and 105 miles long. The Cardinal-Hickory Creek project also includes construction of a new intermediate Hill Valley Substation in Grant County, as well as perform a variety of modifications at substations in northeast Iowa and southwest Wisconsin.

# PROPOSED CARDINAL-HICKORY CREEK PROJECT

In Wisconsin, the proposed Cardinal-Hickory Creek 345 kV transmission line would begin by crossing the Mississippi River in Cassville, travel northeast to Montfort to connect to the proposed Hill Valley Substation, and end at the Cardinal Substation in Middleton (Figure ES-1). In this EIS, the applicants' proposed route subsegments have been combined into several route alternatives that have then been grouped into four distinct routing areas to facilitate the Commission's evaluation of the proposed project. These four routing areas provide an organizational tool for presenting and analyzing information about the ecological and socioeconomic impacts of the proposed project for each proposed route alternative. The distinct geographic routing areas and their associated chapters within this EIS are the:

- Mississippi River Routing Area (Chapter 6),
- Western Routing Area (Chapter 7),
- Eastern Routing Area (Chapter 8), and
- Dane County Routing Area (Chapter 9).

The proposed project must cross the Mississippi River to get from the Hickory Creek Substation (Dubuque County, IA) to the Cardinal Substation (Dane County, WT). The applicants have proposed two different areas where it could cross the Mississippi River in Cassville, WI, either connecting to the Stoneman Substation (existing crossing) or the Nelson Dewey Substation (new crossing). Each route alternative contains common subsegments that would be shared by either route alternative, and have been included in the quantification of impacts for each route alternative throughout the tables in this EIS.

The route alternatives within each routing area that are being evaluated in this EIS include the following (Figure ES-1):


- Mississippi River Routing Area
  - 1. Nelson Dewey-North
  - 2. Nelson Dewey-South
  - 3. Stoneman-North
  - 4. Stoneman-South

- Western Routing Area
  - 1. Western-North
  - 2. Western-South
- Eastern Routing Area:
  - 1. Eastern-North
  - 2. Eastern-South
- Dane County Routing Area
  - 1. Black Earth Creek-North
  - 2. Black Earth Creek-South

The proposed route alternatives would cross the counties of LaFayette, Grant, Iowa, and Dane, and potentially involve 38 municipalities and townships. In Wisconsin, if the project is approved by the Commission a new 345kV transmission line would be constructed that is approximately 84 to 105 miles long with an average right-of-way (ROW) width of 150 feet.


The Cardinal-Hickory Creek project would also include construction of a new intermediate substation in Grant County (i.e. Hill Valley Substation), as well as perform a variety of modifications at substations in northeast Iowa and southwest Wisconsin including the Hickory Creek, Turkey River, Stoneman, Nelson Dewey, Eden, Wyoming Valley, and the Cardinal Substations.

The proposed project would also include approximately 14 miles of 345kV transmission facilities in Iowa before it reaches Wisconsin. This portion of the applicants' project starts at the Hickory Creek Substation in Clayton County, Iowa, travels north through the Upper Mississippi River National Wildlife and Fish Refuge (Refuge), and then east across the Mississippi River into Wisconsin (Figure ES-2).

In addition to the proposed route alternatives, the applicants have provided information on additional project options that are under consideration by the U.S. Department of Agriculture-Rural Utilities Services (RUS). RUS is the lead agency coordinating the development of the federal environmental impact statement (EIS) for the Cardinal-Hickory Creek project as a result of DPC requesting financial assistance as a partial owner of the proposed project. During its review of DPC's application for financial assistance, RUS is also responsible for reviewing the engineering purpose and need, feasibility, alternatives, and cost of the proposed project. The applicants are not proposing these additional project options as siting alternatives for the Commission in this proceeding.

The majority of the transmission line structures proposed for this project would be self-supporting tubular steel monopoles that would range from 120 to 175 feet tall with spans of 750 to 1,100 feet between structures. At the crossing of the Mississippi River, the proposed steel H-frame structures would be between 173 and 198 feet tall with a minimum wire to ground clearance between 91 and 94 feet.

The overall cost of the Cardinal-Hickory Creek Project would range between \$474 million to \$560 million, depending on the final route alternatives selected. These costs are estimated in 2023 dollar costs, which is the projected in-service year for the project. The estimated project cost includes substation modifications, the new Hill Valley Substation, distribution line relocations, land acquisitions, precertification, and allowance for funds used during construction (AFUDC) for ITC and DPC.

There are numerous intervenors in the Cardinal-Hickory Creek docket including utilities, individual landowners, a number of municipal government offices, and environmental advocacy groups. The primary issues of contention, based on comments received during the scoping process, include:

- 1) the need for the proposed project;
- 2) fair evaluation of non-transmission/local renewable energy resources;
- 3) aesthetics of the proposed project;
- 4) impacts to tourism and local businesses;
- 5) individual hardships and property impacts, and
- 6) impacts to the Driftless Area.

## NEED FOR THE PROPOSED PROJECT

Commission staff's analysis of project need is on-going and will be covered in greater detail in the final EIS. The need for the proposed Cardinal-Hickory Creek project is and will continue to be a subject of scrutiny throughout the Commission's review process including during the public and technical hearings.

The applicants' stated purposes for the Cardinal-Hickory Creek transmission line project are to:

- Provide economic benefits to Wisconsin customers;
- Avoid the expenditure on reliability and asset renewal projects that would be needed if the proposed project were not constructed;
- Increase the transfer capability of the electric system between northeastern Iowa, and southwest
  and southcentral Wisconsin, ease congestion and improve generator competition;
- Allow the transfer of wind energy from the west to Wisconsin;
- Support wind energy resources that have requested interconnection in Iowa and areas west of Wisconsin;
- Eliminate the need for three MISO system operating guides in southwest and southcentral Wisconsin currently requiring load shedding and/or other operational actions under certain contingencies; and
- Create other reliability and public policy benefits stemming from a more robust and flexible electric transmission system in the state.

The analysis of need provided in the project application relied heavily on the planning process of the Midcontinent Independent System Operator (MISO). This stated need could be summarized under the following three categories of benefits that MISO's multi-value (MVP) projects are required to provide: 1) improve electric system reliability locally and regionally; 2) deliver economic savings for Wisconsin utilities and electric consumers; and 3) expand infrastructure to support the public policy of greater use of renewables. More information about the MISO process and purpose of the proposed project is included in Chapter 3.

## **Existing Transmission Resources**

The southwest and southcentral Wisconsin area is served by a network of 161 kV and 69 kV lines along with some 138 kV lines. The Badger Coulee 345 kV project (docket 5-CE-142) connects the Briggs Road Substation in Onalaska on the west end to the North Madison Substation in Vienna and the Cardinal Substation in Middleton on the east end.

The existing Eden 138/69 kV Substation near Montfort, Wisconsin does not have any transmission facilities above the 138 kV voltage level. The existing Hickory Creek 345/161 kV Substation is connected to the Hazleton-Salem 345 kV line.

The applicants state that there is need to improve west to east power flow capability in order to relieve transmission system congestion. They believe that the proposed Cardinal-Hickory Creek project would increase the transfer capability of the electric system between northeastern Iowa, and southwest and southcentral Wisconsin by approximately 1,300 Megawatts (MW). The applicants also state that the project would provide an outlet for approximately 25 Gigawatts (GW) of wind energy resources in Iowa and areas west of Wisconsin. In addition, the applicants state that the project would eliminate the need for three transmission system operating guides in southwest and southcentral Wisconsin, which currently require load shedding and/or other operational actions under certain contingencies due to reliability concerns in the area.

## SYSTEM ALTERNATIVES

The applicants considered several non-transmission and transmission alternatives to the proposed project. These non-transmission and transmission alternatives are described further in Section 3.9 of the EIS.

The non-transmission alternatives that were evaluated and considered by the applicants include:

- Energy efficiency and load reduction: This alternative considers reduced energy consumption and peak load, above that achieved historically by Focus on Energy.
- Generation: This alternative studies if additional generation resources would mitigate the need for the proposed project. These new generation sources include new natural gas, wind, and solar resources.
- No-build alternative: The applicants used the No-Build Alternative as a reference case for evaluating the proposed Cardinal-Hickory Creek project, other transmission, and non-transmission system alternatives considered.

In addition to the non-transmission alternatives, a number of transmission alternatives were also described in the application including:

- Low-voltage alternative (LVA): This alternative would consist of construction and upgrades
  to multiple 138 kV transmission facilities and construction of a new 345 kV transmission line
  from Hickory Creek Substation in New Vienna, Iowa to an expanded Nelson Dewey Substation
  in Cassville, WI. The LVA has a total project cost estimate of \$356 million in year-ofoccurrence dollars and the present value (discounted to year 2018) of the change in net
  transmission charges to Wisconsin transmission network customers is estimated to be
  \$220.6 million.
- Other transmission alternatives: The applicants assert that any substitute transmission
  alternative to the proposed project should meet the main criteria of the MVP in the MISO 2011
  MVP portfolio. They state that the Wisconsin portion of any 345 kV transmission alternative

must begin in Cassville. At the northern end, the applicants point out that there are a number of potential endpoints that would meet the required criteria. These locations include:

- Existing Cardinal Substation
- Existing North Madison Substation
- Existing Rockdale Substation
- New Kitty Hawk Substation
- o New Paddock Substation

The applicants state that they performed a full evaluation of each transmission system alternative by comparing all identified benefits and costs for each alternative, both quantitative and qualitative. Further discussion of the applicants' system alternatives analyses and results are detailed Section 3.9.4.

Commission staff is currently reviewing the transmission system alternatives provided by the applicants and various other transmission system alternatives that would be more limited in scope and cost as compared to the proposed project. In addition, staff is evaluating the need for the entire scope of the proposed project as described by the applicants.

# **Proposed Project and Route Alternatives**

In Wisconsin, the proposed Cardinal-Hickory Creek 345 kV transmission line would begin by crossing the Mississippi River in Cassville, Wisconsin, travel northeast to Montfort, Wisconsin to connect to the proposed Hill Valley Substation, and end at the Cardinal Substation in Middleton, Wisconsin. If approved and depending on the route alternatives selected by the Commission, the new 345 kV transmission line would be between 84 and 105 miles long.

If approved, ATC would own 45.5 percent, ITC would own 45.5 percent, and DPC would own 9 percent of the Cardinal-Hickory Creek project. ITC would be the construction manager for the portion of the transmission line between Hickory Creek Substation (Dubuque, Iowa), across the Mississippi River, and to the new Hill Valley Substation (Grant County, Wisconsin). ATC would be the construction manager for the portion of the transmission line between the Hill Valley Substation (Grant County, Wisconsin) and Cardinal Substation (Dane County, Wisconsin). ATC would construct the new Hill Valley Substation, as well as for any modifications approved at the Cardinal, Eden, Nelson Dewey, and Wyoming Valley Substations. DPC would construct any approved modifications at the Stoneman Substation.

## Mississippi River Routing Area

This routing area is located near Cassville, Wisconsin, and lies entirely within Grant County. The proposed project provides two separate locations (Nelson Dewey or Stoneman) for crossing the Mississippi River in Cassville, Wisconsin. There are existing 161kV and 69kV electric transmission lines that cross the Mississippi River connecting at the Stoneman Substation. A new Mississippi River crossing has been proposed that would connect the Wisconsin portion of the proposed project at the Nelson Dewey Substation, just north of the Stoneman Substation. Each of these crossing options includes two separate route alternatives (North and South) that connect to route alternatives in the Western Routing Area.

The route alternatives under consideration in this routing area are:

- 1. Nelson Dewey-North which only connects to Western-North
- 2. Nelson Dewey-South which only connects to Western-South
- 3. Stoneman-North which only connects to Western-North
- 4. Stoneman-South which only connects to Western-South

The only exception to the Commission having the primary siting authority for the proposed project in Wisconsin would be where it crosses property that is owned by a federal agency or encumbered with federal easement. The applicants would need a federal easement in the Upper Mississippi River National Wildlife and Fish Refuge (Iowa) prior to crossing the Mississippi River to get from the Hickory Creek Substation (Iowa) to the Cardinal Substation (Wisconsin). If the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service and the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers approve a ROW location within the Refuge that differs from the Commission's decision in the Mississippi River Routing Area, the location of the federal easement approved by the federal agencies would be the one that is constructed.

## Western Routing Area

This routing area is located in Grant, Iowa, and Lafayette Counties. The Western Routing Area is comprised of two main route alternatives (North and South) that connect the Mississippi River Routing Area and the Eastern Routing Area. The Western-North route alternative travels northeast from the village of Cassville to the village of Montfort. The Western-South route alternative travels east from the village of Cassville to the city of Platteville and then north to the village of Montfort. Before entering the proposed Hill Valley Substation, both route alternatives would connect to common route subsegments before entering the substation.

The route alternatives under consideration in this routing area are:

- 1. Western-North
- 2. Western-South

## Eastern Routing Area

This routing area is located within Iowa and Dane Counties. The Eastern Routing Area is comprised of two main route alternatives that connect the Western Routing Area near Montfort, Wisconsin and the Dane County Routing area near Cross Plains, Wisconsin. The Eastern-North route alternative generally travels north and east from the proposed Hill Valley Substation (Montfort) to Cross Plains. The Eastern-South route alternative generally travels east and north from Montfort to Cross Plains.

The route alternatives under consideration in this routing area are:

- 1. Eastern-North
- 2. Eastern-South

## Dane County Routing Area

This routing area is located entirely within Dane County, and connects the Eastern Routing Area near Cross Plains, Wisconsin to the Cardinal Substation near Middleton, Wisconsin. The Dane County Routing Area starts near Cross Plains, Wisconsin and follows common route subsegments east until Cleveland Road where it separates into two route alternatives (North and South) near Black Earth Creek. From here it travels east along common route subsegments until it terminates at the Cardinal Substation in Middleton, Wisconsin.

The route alternatives under consideration in this routing area are:

- 1. Black Earth Creek-North
- 2. Black Earth Creek-South

# POTENTIAL ENVIRONMENTAL AND SOCIAL IMPACTS

The proposed Cardinal-Hickory Creek project traverses southwestern Wisconsin from the Mississippi River to Middleton, Wisconsin, which is well-known and often referred to as the Driftless Area. Wisconsin's Driftless Area has not been glaciated for at least the last 2.4 million years and consists of significant topographic variation and unique ecological communities found nowhere else in the state. Southwestern Wisconsin contains areas of steep forested ridges and deeply dissected river valleys with numerous of spring-fed and cold-water trout streams.

In addition to the unique ecology of the Driftless Area, its social and economic significance is often considered unquantifiable to those who live and visit the area. Many have recognized the Driftless Area as a unique resource worthy of ecological, cultural, and economic importance; and thus, this area is the focus of several government, non-profit, and private partnerships and organizations that are solely focused on the conserving, restoring, and enjoying this unique area in the state. Concerns for the impacts the proposed Cardinal-Hickory Creek project could and would have on the Driftless Area are a common theme found throughout the hundreds of comments received on the project as well as the parties intervening in the proceeding for the proposed project.

### Mississippi River Routing Area

The route alternatives in this routing area range from approximately 1.08 to 1.83 miles long starting at either the existing Mississippi River crossing (Stoneman Substation) or a new Mississippi River crossing (Nelson Dewey Substation).

The following contains a bulleted list of potential impacts of the proposed ROWs, identifying which routes would have the greatest or the least amount of impacts for a given resource. None of the route alternatives within this routing area would impact properties enrolled in the Managed Forest Law program (MFL) or are expected to cause impacts to wetlands within the proposed ROW. Refer to Chapter 6, Chapter 10, and Appendix B for additional information on these impacts by proposed route alternatives and route subsegments.

#### Nelson Dewey-North

- o Greatest amount of grassland areas within the proposed ROW (9.80 acres).
- o Least amount of residences within 300 feet of the proposed ROW (0 houses).
- o Least amount of waterways crossed by proposed ROW (0 waterways).
- Least amount of archaeological and historic resources potentially impacted by the proposed ROW (0 sites).
- o Greatest amount of avian risk areas identified within the proposed ROW (2.71 miles).
- o Greatest amount of endangered resources potentially impacted by the proposed ROW (62).

#### Nelson Dewey-South

- o Greatest amount of new proposed ROW (90 percent).
- o Greatest amount of total agricultural land within the ROW (5.49 acres).
- o Greatest amount of forested lands requiring clearing within the proposed ROW (16.84 acres).

#### • Stoneman-North

- o Greatest amount of residences within 300 feet of the proposed ROW (20 houses).
- O The proposed ROW would be within 150 feet of two schools and one daycare; the same as Stoneman –South.
- o Greatest amount of waterways crossed by proposed ROW (2 waterways).

- Greatest amount of archaeological and historic resources potentially impacted by the proposed ROW (8 sites).
- O Least amount of avian risk areas identified within the proposed ROW (0 miles).

#### Stoneman-South:

- O Least amount of new proposed ROW (62 percent)
- Least amount of total agricultural land within the ROW (2.51 acres).
- Least amount of grassland areas within the proposed ROW (3.60 acres).
- O Least amount of forested lands requiring clearing within the proposed ROW (16.84 acres).
- Would have the second greatest amount of residences within 300 feet of the proposed ROW (18 houses).
- O The proposed ROW would be within 150 feet of two schools and one daycare; the same as Stoneman –North.
- Greatest amount of archaeological and historic resources potentially impacted by the proposed ROW (8 sites).
- o Least amount of avian risk areas identified within the proposed ROW (0 miles).
- O Least amount of endangered resources potentially impacted by the proposed ROW (35).

#### Western Routing Area

The route alternatives in this routing area range from approximately 32.54 miles (Western-North) to 50.42 miles (Western-South). Both route alternatives would have approximately the same amount of new proposed ROW (65 percent); however, the terrain along Western-North is steeper and more remote making construction potentially more difficult along this route alternative. Western-South primarily follows existing utility infrastructure and roads along its corridor through more open terrain. Although not always reflected in the impact tables, Western-North would have greater potential to impact more unique ecological resources and communities because it is sited in less disturbed, more remote locations.

The following contains a bulleted list of potential impacts of the proposed ROWs, identifying which route alternative would have the greatest amount of impacts for a given resource. There are no schools, daycares, or hospitals identified by the applicants within 300 feet of the proposed ROW in this routing area. Refer to Chapter 7, Chapter 10, and Appendix B for additional information on these impacts by proposed route alternatives and route subsegments.

#### Western-North

- O Greatest amount of forested lands requiring clearing within the proposed ROW (95.59 acres).
- o Greatest amount of MFL properties (11 properties).
- Greatest amount of wetland areas within the proposed ROW (16.70 acres).
- o Greatest amount of avian risk areas identified within the proposed ROW (2.55 miles).

#### Western-South

- o Greatest amount of total agricultural land within the ROW (517.04 acres).
- o Greatest amount of grassland areas within the proposed ROW (227.26 acres).
- Greatest amount of residences within 300 feet of the proposed ROW (37 houses).
- O Greatest amount of waterways crossed by proposed ROW (88 waterways).
- O Greatest amount of archaeological and historic resources potentially impacted by the proposed ROW (9 sites).
- o Greatest amount of endangered resources potentially impacted by the proposed ROW (37).

#### Eastern Routing Area

The route alternatives in this routing area range from approximately 46 miles (Eastern-North) to 48.72 miles (Eastern-South). Eastern-North would primarily travel cross-country along new ROW with steep terrain making construction potentially more difficult along this route alternative. Eastern-South primarily follows existing roads and transmission facilities along its corridor through more open and flat terrain. Although not always reflected in the impact tables, Eastern-North would have greater potential to impact more unique ecological resources and communities because it is sited in less disturbed, more remote locations.

The following contains a bulleted list of potential impacts of the proposed ROW's, identifying which route alternative would have the greatest amount of impacts for a given resource. Refer to Chapter 8, Chapter 10, and Appendix B for additional information on these impacts by proposed route alternatives and route subsegments.

#### · Eastern-North

- o Greatest amount of new proposed ROW (84 percent).
- o Greatest amount of forested lands requiring clearing within the proposed ROW (355.06 acres).
- o Greatest amount of MFL properties (97 properties).
- o Greatest amount of wetland areas within the proposed ROW (45.38 acres).
- o Greatest amount of avian risk areas identified within the proposed ROW (1.3 miles).

#### Eastern-South

- o Greatest amount of total agricultural land within the ROW (362.34 acres).
- o Greatest amount of grassland areas within the proposed ROW (266.16 acres).
- O Greatest amount of residences within 300 feet of the proposed ROW (89 houses and 74 apartment units). Two of these homes are located within 25 feet of the proposed centerline, and one of these homes are located within 50 feet of the proposed centerline.
- o There is one school located just beyond 300 feet of the proposed ROW.
- o Greatest amount of waterways crossed by proposed ROW (63 waterways).
- O Greatest amount of archaeological and historic resources potentially impacted by the proposed ROW (8 sites).
- o Greatest amount of endangered resources potentially impacted by the proposed ROW (50).

#### Dane County Routing Area

The Dane County Routing Area is the only routing area that contains several common subsegments for a significant length of the route where there is no other route option. For the purposes of the executive summary, all of the impacts for the common subsegments in the Dane County Routing Area have been included in the quantification of impacts for Black Earth Creek-North and Black Earth Creek-South, as applicable.

The total length of the proposed ROW in this routing area would be between 4.47 and 4.57 miles. Both route alternatives would have the same amount of new proposed ROW (64 percent), the same number of residences within 300 feet of the proposed centerline (11 houses), and the same amount of avian risk areas identified within the proposed ROW (0.26 miles). There are no schools, daycares, or hospitals identified by the applicants within 300 feet of the proposed ROW.

The following contains a bulleted list of potential impacts of the proposed ROWs, identifying which route alternative would have the greatest amount of impacts for a given resource. Refer to Chapter 9, Chapter 10, and Appendix B for additional information on these impacts by proposed route alternatives and route subsegments.

#### Black Earth Creek-North

o Greatest amount of total agricultural land within the ROW (27.27 acres).

o Greatest amount of forested lands requiring clearing within the proposed ROW (21.8 acres).

o Greatest amount of wetland areas within the proposed ROW (5.5 acres).

o Greatest amount of archaeological and historic resources potentially impacted by the proposed ROW (2 sites).

## Black Earth Creek-South

O Greatest amount of grassland areas within the proposed ROW (15 acres).

O Greatest amount of MFL properties (1 property).

0 Would have the same number of residences within 300 feet of the proposed centerline (11 houses) as Black Earth Creek-North; however, this route alternative has one house within 25 feet of the proposed centerline.

Greatest amount of waterways crossed by proposed ROW (10 waterways).

o Greatest amount of endangered resources potentially impacted by the proposed ROW (18).

The applicants anticipate dividing ownership of the proposed project as follows: ATC 45.5 percent, ITC 45.5 percent and DPC 9 percent (Table 1-2).

## 1.1.5. Proposed Construction Schedule

Provided the project is granted a CPCN by the Commission and all state and federal approvals and permits are granted, the applicants anticipate construction to start on the substations in October 2020 and on the transmission line in October 2021. Their expected in-service date for the project is December 2023.

As stated in Table 1-2, ITC would be the construction manager for the portion of the transmission line between Hickory Creek Substation (Dubuque, Iowa), across the Mississippi River, and up to the new Hill Valley Substation (Grant County, Wisconsin). ATC would be the construction manager for the portion of the transmission line between the Hill Valley Substation (Grant County, Wisconsin) and Cardinal Substation (Dane County, Wisconsin). ATC would be the construction manager for the new Hill Valley Substation, as well as for any modifications approved at the Cardinal, Eden, Nelson Dewey, and Wyoming Valley Substations. DPC would construct any approved modifications at the Stoneman Substation.

The Commission has the final authority to certify whether and how the project may be built (see Section 1.2). If approved, construction must start within one year of a Commission Order.

## ROLE OF THE PUBLIC SERVICE COMMISSION OF WISCONSIN

# 1.2.1. Approval, denial, or modification of this proposed project

Under Wis. Stat. § 196.491 (3), the Commission has the authority to approve, deny, or modify any and all facilities proposed in the Cardinal-Hickory Creek project CPCN application. If the project is approved,

the Commission would select the route and design for the proposed transmission line as well as the site and layout of the proposed substation modifications and construction.

#### 1.2.2. Commission considerations

Compared to other state agencies, the regulatory interests of the Commission in reviewing this proposed transmission project are quite broad. These interests cover the need for the project, the project cost and electrical performance, and the project's short- and long-term environmental and socioeconomic impacts, other than those specifically regulated by the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources.

## 1.2.2.1. Certificate of Public Convenience and Necessity law

Wisconsin Statute (Wis. Stat.) § 196.491(3) requires the Commission to make all of the following determinations before approving construction of a major transmission line:

- Under Wis. Stat. § 196.491(3)(d)2, the proposed facilities must satisfy the reasonable needs of the public for an adequate supply of electric energy.
- Under Wis. Stat. § 196.491(3)(d)3, the facilities must be in the public interest, considering: alternative sources of supply, alternative locations or routes, individual hardships, engineering factors, economic factors, safety, reliability, and environmental factors.
- Under Wis. Stat. § 196.491(3)(d)3r, if the high-voltage transmission line is proposed to increase the
  transmission import capability into this state, existing ROW must be used to the extent practicable,
  and the routing and design must minimize environmental impact in a manner that is consistent with
  achieving reasonable electric rates.
- Under Wis. Stat. § 196.491(3)(d)3t, the 345 kV line must provide usage, service, or increased regional reliability benefits to the wholesale and retail customers or members in this state, and the benefits of the line must be reasonable in relation to the cost of the line.
- Under Wis. Stat. § 196.491(3)(d)4, the facilities must not have undue adverse impact on environmental values such as, but not limited to: ecological balance, public health and welfare, historic sites, geological formations, aesthetics of land and water, and recreational use.
- Under Wis. Stat. §§ 196.491(3)(d)5. and196.49(3)(b), the facilities must not substantially impair the
  efficiency of the applicants' service or reasonably exceed the applicants' probable future
  requirements, and the value or available quantity of service the facilities provide must be
  proportionate to their cost.
- Under Wis. Stat. § 196.491(3)(d)6, the facilities must not unreasonably interfere with the orderly land
  use and development plans for the area involved.
- Under Wis. Stat. § 196.491(3)(d)7, the facilities must not have a material adverse impact on competition in the relevant wholesale electric service market.

## 1.2.2.2. Required priorities for meeting energy demands

In addition to the above statutory determinations, the Commission must address the priorities in Wis. Stat. §§ 1.12 and 196.025. These laws require the Commission to give priority to specific methods of meeting energy demands to the extent these methods are "cost-effective and technically feasible." The Commission must consider options based on the following priorities, in the order listed, for all energy-related decisions:

- Energy conservation and efficiency
- Noncombustible renewable energy resources
- Combustible renewable energy resources

- Advanced nuclear energy using a reactor design or amended reactor design approved after December 31, 2010, by the U.S. Nuclear Regulatory Commission
- Nonrenewable combustible energy resources, again in the order listed:
  - o Natural gas
  - Oil or coal with a sulfur content of less than one percent
  - o All other carbon-based fuels

If the Commission finds that any of these statutorily preferred options, or a combination of these options, constitutes a cost-effective and technically feasible alternative to the project, the Commission must reject all or a portion of the project as proposed.

# 1.2.2.3. Required priorities for siting electric transmission projects

Wisconsin Stat. § 1.12(6) also directs the Commission to consider corridor sharing opportunities when reviewing transmission facility projects. The statute states that, when siting new electric transmission facilities, it is the policy of the state to attempt to share existing corridors to the greatest extent feasible. When selecting existing corridors to share, the Commission must determine that corridor sharing is consistent with economic and engineering considerations, reliability of the electric system, and protection of the environment. When feasible, corridors should be utilized in the following order of priority:

- Existing utility corridors
- · Highway and railroad corridors
- Recreational trails, to the extent that the facilities may be constructed below ground and that the
  facilities do not significantly impact environmentally sensitive areas
- New corridors
