1	Chairman Masters called the meeting to order at 5:00 p.m.

3	Certification of compliance with open meetings law:
	Weier verified the meeting was properly posted on 10/15/24. The agenda and proposed 9/24/24 minutes were
	emailed to the Dodgeville Chronicle, Darlington Republican Journal, Iowa and Lafayette County Clerks.
4	Approval of the October 22, 2024 Agenda:
	Motion by Reilly and seconded by Cockeram to accept the agenda. Aye: 6; Nay: 0. Motion carried.
5	Approval of the September 24, 2024 Meeting Minutes:
	Motion to approve the minutes of the September 24, 2024 meeting by Gill and seconded by Reilly. Aye: 6; Nay: 0.
	Motion carried.
6	Reports From Board Members and an Opportunity for Members of the Audience to Address the Board. No action
	will be taken: Discussion about the Senior handout from the county meeting per Paul. Gill mentioned visiting the
	Benton meal site and that it was enjoyable. Nankee mentioned News and Views and its valuable information. He
	noted that November is caregiver's month. He also mentioned Elderfest coming up in Grant County.
7	Arena Site Management. Maintenance, and Rental Agreement: Per Baird, he met with Arena Manor Board. The
	current rent is \$75, which hardly covers the costs of SUN being there. The Manor Board will waive our rent for 6
	months to help in hopes that after 6 months there may be congregate monies to help buy more updated appliances.
	Per Schmidt there are about 20 participants each day. Currently 2 of the refrigerators and 2 freezers that need
	updating are SUN's. The program is good socialization for the participants. Ludlum speculated about SUN contributing
	toward additional charges that are incurred. Gill suggested Community Fund grants to help purchase new appliances.
	The Manor storage room housing the appliances needs more venting to mitigate the heat generated from them. Per
	Masters SUN has plans to keep going. Schmidt will keep in contact with Baird as information comes in on purchasing
	appliances.
8	Aging & Disability Resource Center & County Aging Reports:
	a. Lafayette County – Harcus presented. There are dementia presentations/trainings coming up. Peer Place will
	be the new data input system for the state and goes live November 6th. There is a transportation public
	meeting coming up. Medicare Part D is currently open. The Caregiver Renewal Day will be hosted at Iowa
	County.
	b. lowa County – Hiltbrand presented. Medicare Part D plan binders seem to have glitches the first week, so
	they are just now running those. Dementia 101 will be at Cobb Library. Free rides to the polls will be offered
	on November 5 or before for early voting.
9	Monthly Reports- possible action:
	a. Cash Flow Statement & CD Review- September 2024— Per Baird, there is \$54,000 in liquid assets and \$35,000
	in CD's.
	b. Financial Reports, Profit & Loss, Bill Pay- September 2024. Per Baird, Iowa Co actuals are showing at a
	positive \$24,000 overall. Iowa County is expected to be positive \$4,000 at year's end. Lafayette will be down
	at least \$6000 at the end of the year.
	c. Monthly Participant Numbers- September 2024 – Reports provided. Per Baird, there are increased
	congregate numbers and lower home delivery. The count overall is lower, but contributions have increased.
10	Approval of Meal Prioritization of Iowa County Home Delivered Meals: Per Baird, this is very important so that we
10	can prioritize the wait list for lowa County. Removing the waitlist currently would cause a deficit without additional
	monies coming in, so he proposes options. The first option would be 2 meals per week for low risk participants, 5
	meals per week for moderate risk, and 5 meals per week for high risk. Local community members have offered \$2500
	to help fund this option. The next option would be to remove low risk participants from home delivered meals entirely

remove the low risk, offer 3 meals per week for moderate risk, and 5 meals per week for high risk. Per Slaney, after the meeting with GWARA, SUN is non-compliant because of the wait list. Slaney delivered a letter to Baird to that effect and will be withholding any further payments to SUN until we are compliant. Per Mumm, assessments are to be done within 120 days and be updated yearly. Dane County handles meals for moderate risk people based on budget and offers a range that varies. Relily asked if lowa County handles meals for moderate risk people based on budget and offers a range that varies. Relily asked if lowa County hand more money that they could give SUN, Slaney said likey not. Masters agreed that he would not be optimistic that it would happen. The prioritization went active in July so then the wait list became non-compliant per Slaney. Weier darified generally what the different risk categories may represent. Ranges would help reduce the budget risks. Per Baird, another option as mentioned Mumm would be to remove low risk, serve what we can afford to moderate risk and the 5 meals per week to high risk. Ludium clarified that the wait list does not affect Lafayette County. The low risk could also be offered a range. Per Slaney, the range would be a good idea and can be evaluated at a later date to see how lits working, it would give flexibility to continue to serve some people. Motion by Gill and seconded by Relly to prioritize and serve meals to low risk 0-2 meals per week, moderate risk 2-5 meals per week, and high risk 5 meals per week.
