On Thursday April 23rd @ 8:00 pm, MPD Officers responded 400 block of N. Ramunno Dr. regarding disorderly subjects, possibly armed with weapons. Officers were advised by witnesses that a male subject had displayed a firearm. The male subject, who was a juvenile and taken into custody. Recovered was a 9mm Taurus and 13 rounds. The male juvenile was charged with Aggravated Menacing and associated weapon offenses and was released after posting \$26,000.00 bail.

Middletown Medical Center***

On Thursday April 23rd @ 6:55 pm, MPD Officers were contacted by Constables of the Medical Center of a Suspicious Person incident. The investigation revealed that **Prince Onukogu, male 22**, had followed the victim from Pennsville, NJ, by vehicle to the WAWA on Middletown Odessa Rd. Onukoga took several photos and video of the victim as she entered/exited the WAWA. Onukoga then followed the victim to the Medical Center and entered the victim's vehicle as she entered the Medical Center. Constables approached the vehicle and observed Onukoga exit from the back seat of the victim's vehicle. Onukoga was taken into custody and charged with Stalking and Burglary 3rd and given \$5,000.00 secured bail

LOW-SPEED MOTORIZED SCOOTERS IN DELAWARE
Delaware law treats low-speed motorized scooters similar to bicycles.
Operators are afforded all the rights and privileges, and are subject to all the duties, of a bicycle.

YOU CAN RIDE WHERE BICYCLES ARE ALLOWED
Streets & roadways, Bike lanes & bikeways, Multi-use paths, Road shoulders

YOU CANNOT RIDE ON
Sidewalks (including those converted to use as bike lanes), Natural surface trails designated as non-motorized*, Rental scooters are not allowed.

AGE & HELMET RULES
You must be at least 14 years old to operate a low-speed motorized scooter.
All operators and passengers under 18 must wear an approved, properly fitted, and fastened bicycle helmet.
* "Approved helmet" has the meaning provided in Delaware law (S-4118)(a).

IMPORTANT RULES TO KNOW
No driver's license, registration, title, insurance, OHV registration, or license plates are required for low-speed motorized scooters.
Do not tamper with or modify your scooter to change its speed capability or motor engagement. If modified, the label must be replaced with the correct information.
Starting January 1, 2026, scooters must have a permanent label with the classification number, top assisted speed, and motor power (posted in Arial font, at least 9-point type).
Scooters must comply with U.S. Consumer Product Safety Commission (CPSC) safety requirements for electrically operated toys (16 C.F.R. Part 1505).
Never ride under the influence of alcohol or drugs.
Be respectful and responsible. Do not ride in a way that endangers, disturbs, or annoys others, or causes damage to property.

RIDE SMART, RIDE SAFE.
 Obey traffic signs and signals.
 Look before you go and watch for cars, pedestrians, and others.
 Stop when you ride unpredictably.
 Use lights at night and in low visibility.
 Keep both hands on the handlebars.
 One rider at a time—no passengers.
 Wear bright clothing and be seen!
