## One-Page Comparison of Parliamentary Procedure Options December 2, 2025

<b>Issue / Feature</b>	<b>Robert's Rules of Order (current)</b>	<b>Rosenberg's Rules of Order</b>	<b>Informal / "Chair Decides" Approach</b>
<b>Length of the rule book</b>	~700 pages	~30 pages	1 sentence in Bylaws
<b>Originally written for</b>	Large legislative bodies & private organizations (1876)	California public agencies (post-AB 1234 ethics law)	Small volunteer boards that operate by consensus
<b>Level of formality</b>	High – many motion types, seconds required, strict debate limits	Moderate – streamlined motions, seconds not required, easier debate rules	Very low – Chair runs the meeting like a business meeting
<b>Most common motions used</b>	Motion, second, debate, amend, previous question, lay on table, etc.	Only three basic motions: Main motion, Amend, Adjourn	Chair asks "Any objection?" or "All in favor?"
<b>Seconding required?</b>	Yes (almost always)	No	No
<b>Can the Chair make motions?</b>	Generally no (except in small boards <12)	Yes (same as any member)	Yes
<b>Limits on debate</b>	Strict (usually 10 min/person/topic, speak twice)	Chair may set reasonable limits; no automatic 10-min rule	Chair uses common sense
<b>Typical use in California cities/commissions</b>	Rare for small commissions	Very common (Sacramento, Folsom, Roseville, El Dorado County, etc.)	Common in very small or low-volume volunteer bodies

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<b>Learning curve</b>	Steep	Gentle (most staff & commissioners can learn in 15 minutes)	None
<b>When it shines</b>	Highly contentious meetings, parliamentary maneuvers	Normal public meetings with occasional debate	Light agendas, collaborative boards
<b>Recommended for Placerville PC?</b>	Works fine but rarely needed	<b>Staff's alternate preference</b> – simple, California-specific, widely used locally	Acceptable if Commission prefers maximum simplicity
