ORDINANCE NO. 25-14

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING AND SUPPLEMENTING CHAPTER 17 (STREETS, SIDEWALKS AND SANITATION) & CHAPTER 25 (ZONING AND LAND DEVELOPMENT) OF THE REVISED GENERAL ORDINANCES OF THE CITY OF OCEAN CITY AS THEY PERTAIN TO CURB OPENINGS AND PARKING

BE IT ORDAINED by the Mayor and Council of the City of Ocean City, County of Cape May, State of New Jersey, that the Administrative Code of the City of Ocean City is hereby revised to read as follows:

SECTION 1.

§ 17-2.4. Curbs and Gutters.

[Ord. #26-79, § 3; Ord. #94-19, § 3; Ord. #11-10, § 5]

The construction, reconstruction, repair or alteration of any curb shall conform to the following requirements:

- a. Workmanship. All workmanship will be done in a professional manner.
- b. Construction Details. Curbs shall be a minimum of eight (8") inches wide at the base, six (6") inches of wide at tope and eighteen (18") inches in depth. Open joints shall be provided in intervals of ten (10') feet and one-half (1/2") inch bituminous expansion joints every twenty (20') feet. At locations where a concrete curb abuts Portland cement concrete pavements, joints in the curb shall be placed to match the adjacent cement joints. A vertical front face shall be a minimum of six (6") inches and not to exceed eighty (8") inches. The rear top corner of this curb shall have a radius of one-half (1/2") inch and the front top corner shall have a radius of one and one-half (1 1/2") inches. Concrete gutter shall be required when the slope of the road is less than one-half of one percent (0.5%) as determined by the City Engineer. When concrete gutter is required, the gutter shall be a minimum of eighteen (18") inches wide, eight (8") inches thick and joints in the gutter shall be placed to match the curb. Curb and two (2) pour curb and gutter cross-sections shall be as shown in Figures 1 and 2. Monolithic curb and sidewalk with all other design standards to remain the same may be permitted at the approval of the City Engineer or his designee.
- c. Materials and Methods of Construction. Curb shall be constructed of Class B concrete having a maximum slump of four (4") inches at time of placement. Cement shall be Type I-air entrained. Fine and coarse aggregate shall conform to the Standard Specifications. Coarse aggregate shall be three-fourth (3/4") inch or five-eighth (5/8") inch size. Methods of construction shall conform to Section 605 of the above noted specification.
- d. New Curbing. All new curbing shall be constructed adjoining full street and avenue frontage of new residential or commercial development.
- e. Curb Opening. Curb opening shall be permitted at the discretion of the City Engineer and in accordance with Subsection 25-1700.11.11. Permit request shall include a scale drawing of the proper curb opening and driveway area. No curb openings shall be permitted <u>for new development</u> where a lot <u>has acan provide</u> vehicular access to <u>off-street parking areasle access</u> from a rear public alley without the prior formal approval of the Ocean City Zoning Board of Adjustment <u>or except as permitted by Ordinance</u>. Curb openings shall be depressed to a point one and one-half (1 1/2") inches above the street surface.
- f. Care of Adjacent Paving. Care of adjacent asphalt or concrete gutter shall be the sole responsibility of the owner and/or contractor. Any required repairs to adjacent paving must be performed in accordance with § 17-1 of this chapter. Restrictions related to road openings detailed in § 17-1 shall also apply to the installation of curb and two (2) pour curb and gutter.

It is recognized that there currently exist a number of curb openings which are no longer used or necessary within the City of Ocean City. The City Engineer shall have authority to inspect existing curb openings and determine their utility. If the City Engineer decides that any existing curb opening no longer serves a useful purpose and the access established by the curb opening is no longer necessary, he shall notify the adjoining property owner and request the curb opening to be closed. In the event the adjoining property owner refuses to close the curb opening, the construction for same may be undertaken by or on behalf of the City of Ocean City pursuant to the requirements established in Subsection 17-2.10 below.

SECTION 2.

§ 25-300.1. Encroachments in Front Yards, Rear Yards and Side Yards.

- a. No encroachments shall be permitted within the minimum required front yard, side yard or rear yard setback areas except as follows:
 - 1. Front Yard. The following front yard encroachments shall be permitted:
 - (a) Steps and landings, or terraced walkways providing access only to the lowest floor, shall be permitted to extend to within six inches (6") of the front property line or right-of-way, but shall not extend past the nearest edge of the existing sidewalk or sidewalk line established for the subject block. A terraced walkway shall:
 - (1) Be constructed of brick, stone or other maintenance-free material. Concrete and unfaced concrete block is not permitted.
 - (2) Have not more than two (2) risers between landings.
 - (3) Provide landings extending at least three feet (3') in the direction of travel.
 - (b) Flagpoles.
 - (c) Awnings provided they project not more than five feet from the building except in the On-Boardwalk Zone where the projection of a retractable awning may be up to 10 feet. The bottom of the awning shall be a minimum seven feet and not higher than 12 feet above grade. Awning supports are not permitted within the required yard, or in the public right-of-way. No signs, merchandise, banners, flags or other material shall be attached to the bottom of an awning. [Amended 12-12-2019 by Ord. No. 19-15]
 - (d) Porte Cocheres. These may be constructed across the sidewalks in front of any hotel, motel or apartment house containing fifty (50) rooms or more provided they do not exceed twelve feet (12') in length or width along the curbline and have a clearance of at least seven feet (7') above the sidewalk grade.
 - (e) Roof eaves and gutters provided they do not exceed eighteen inches (18") in width.
 - (f) Parking in all single-family and two-family zones when the rear yard does not abut a public alley, except for dwellings existing prior to the effective date of this ordinance where, although the lot abuts an alley, the rear yard is inaccessible by a motor vehicle due to the location of the principal building.
 - (g) Ramps for handicapped access to the first floor, built to current UCC and ADA standards not to exceed four feet (4') in width, shall be permitted to extend to a point that is six inches (6") from the front property line or right-of-way, but shall not extend past the nearest edge of the existing sidewalk or sidewalk line established for the subject block. Said ramps and/or landings shall be constructed and landscaped so as to be visually compatible with the existing streetscape.
 - (h) Fences as permitted by § 25-1700.14 of this Ordinance.
 - (i) Architectural projections such as bay windows may extend into the required front yard not more than eighteen inches (18"), and shall not exceed a total length that is one-third (1/3) of the width of the front facade, except in the Gardens 75/4500 Zone where the projection shall be limited to a length of fifteen feet (15') or one-third (1/3) of the width of the front facade, whichever is less. Said architectural projections shall not be permitted to extend from a garage.
 - (j) Driveways.
 - (k) Garden arbors, where permitted shall comply with the following requirements:
 - (1) Garden arbors shall not exceed a height of ten feet (10') or a footprint greater than twenty (20) square feet.

- (2) Garden arbors shall be setback a minimum of four feet (4') from the front property line.
- (3) Garden arbors shall be anchored as required by code.
- (4) A building permit is not required for a Garden arbor; however, a Zoning Permit is required.
- (5) Garden arbors are not permitted in the rear yard of bayfront, lagoon or oceanfront lots.
- (l) Platforms and steps providing access to elevated electrical meters.

SECTION 3.

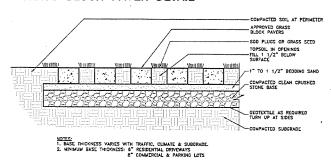
§ 25-300.12.4. Off-Street Parking. [Ord. #90-18, § 1; Ord. #94-16, Appx. A; Ord. #02-19; Ord. #08-12, § 5; Ord. #09-28, § 3; Ord. #11-21, § 6; Ord. #12-20, § 3; Ord. #13-12, § 10; Ord. #13-36, § 6; Ord. #14-04 § 8]

- a. General. Off-street parking spaces shall be provided as further specified in this ordinance. All off-street parking spaces, except for those accessed from an alley, including passageways, driveways and turning areas shall be provided with a dustless, durable, all-weather parking surface clearly marked for parking spaces and adequately drained in accordance with § 25-1700.22 of this ordinance. Parking spaces accessed from an alley may utilize crushed stone, crushed shell, porous paving, paver blocks or other materials as may be found suitable by the City. Driveway aprons are required pursuant to Subsection 25-1700.11.9 and § 25-1700.12 of this ordinance. [Amended 6-11-2020 by Ord. No. 20-08]
- b. Exemptions. None of the off-street parking facilities as required in this Ordinance shall be required for any existing building or use not now conforming to these requirements, unless said building or use shall be enlarged by creating additional living space, additional dwelling units, additional commercial space or by changing the use as defined herein of the building in which case the provisions of this Ordinance shall apply.
- c. Illumination of Commercial Parking Spaces. All parking areas and appurtenant passageways and driveways serving commercial uses shall during their season or period of operation be illuminated as required by § 25-1700.19 of this Ordinance during the hours between sunset and sunrise. After 10:00 p.m. throughout the entire lot, forty percent (40%) of lights in parking areas shall remain lighted until sunrise. Adequate shielding shall be provided by commercial uses to protect adjacent residential zones from the glare of such illumination and from that of automobile headlights.
- d. Parking in Required Yards and Open Spaces.
 - 1. No parking of motor vehicle shall be permitted within the front yard and other open interior spaces for lots having a rear yard access except in the DB Drive-In Business District. For dwellings existing prior to the effective date of this ordinance where, although the lot abuts an alley, the rear yard is inaccessible by a motor vehicle due to the location of the principal building and Ffor residential lots having no rear yard access, such as lagoon lots, beach front lots or other lots not accessible by alley due to its configuration, parking in the front yard setback and and/or the side yard of corner lots, shall be permitted, provided a minimum of eighteen feet (18') is available between the front property lot-line and any structure to provide sufficient space for vehicles to park without overhanging the public sidewalk, and further provided the buffer provisions contained in Subsection 25-1700.11.5, and the setback requirements contained in Subsection 25-300.12.4.e are met. These provisions notwithstanding, no camper, RV, travel trailer, house trailer, mobile home, or self-propelled housing unit shall be parked in any front yard.
 - 2. One (1) single boat or sailboat may be parked in the front yard on any lot in the residential zone district which has no rear yard access such as lagoon lots, beach front lots, or lots not accessible by alley. Parking of boats and sailboats in these areas, however, shall be subject to the following restrictions:
 - (a) They must be at least four feet (4') from any side property line;

- (b) They must be at least four feet (4') from any structure;
- (c) They must be parked or stored perpendicular to the curbline;
- (d) No portion of the boat or sailboat or trailer on which they sit may encroach upon any public right-of-way, including sidewalks;
- (e) If boat covers or custom made canvas covers are used they must be tightly secured to the boat or sailboat;
- (f) Except for a single period of one week or less duration a boat or sailboat may be parked in these areas only during the period September 15th to May 15th.
- e. Setbacks for Driveways and Parking Areas. [Amended 12-12-2019 by Ord. No. 19-15; 10-26-2023 by Ord. No. 23-24]
 - 1. Except as otherwise noted, off-street parking spaces for commercial, multifamily and mixed uses shall not be less than four feet (4') from the established property line or within four feet of any structure.
 - 2. On lots up to thirty feet (30') in width off-street parking spaces for commercial, multifamily and mixed-use shall not be less than one foot from the established property line.
 - 3. Off-street parking spaces for residential uses (single-family and duplex) shall not be less than one foot (1') from the established property line or any structure.
 - 4. Except for the driveway, said parking setbacks are buffer areas and shall be landscaped to provide permeable surfaces. No aisles or parking spaces shall be permitted within these buffer areas. Entrance and exit drives, however, may traverse said buffer areas.
 - 5. A street-facing garage door shall be located at least eighteen feet (18') from the public right-of-way, except on existing homes that do not meet this setback requirement, and where such homes are elevated to comply with BFE requirements.
 - 6. The minimum distance between a driveway or parking space and a swimming pool is four feet (4').
- f. Shade and Shrubbery Requirements. Off-street parking areas which provide parking for ten (10) or more vehicles shall be provided with shade trees or shrubs of a type and size approved by the Shade Tree Committee. The shade trees or shrubs shall be located in a planned manner within the parking lot area in quantity equal to not less than one (1) shade tree for every five (5) parking spaces and with shrubbery at the periphery of the parking lot to form a living wall not higher than two feet (2').
- g. Parking Requirements for Mixed Uses. In the case of mixed uses, the parking facilities required shall be the sum of the requirements for the various individual uses, computed separately in accordance with this Ordinance; parking facilities for one (1) use shall not be considered as providing the required parking facilities for any other use.
- h. (Reserved)¹
- i. Stacked Parking. Parking spaces for any residential unit may be placed in a "stacked" fashion, one behind the other, provided that each parking space is clearly designated and assigned to the dwelling unit it is intended to serve. "Stacked" parking shall be permitted for non-residential uses provided each parking space is clearly designated and the business owner/operator has established a vehicle management plan. [Amended 12-12-2019 by Ord. No. 19-15]
- j. Permeable Pavers. When approved as part of an Application for Development, or with approval by the City Engineer or his designee, permeable pavers may be installed in driveways and Parking Spaces. Acceptable permeable pavers include Techo Bloc Aquastone[®], Nicolock Checker Block[®], Nicolock Turfstone[®], Aqua-Bric[®], and Grasscrete[®] or approved equal. [Added 6-11-2020 by Ord. No. 20-08; amended 2-23-2023 by Ord. No. 23-02]
 - 1. Prior to issuance by the City of a permit or final approval of a development application involving permeable pavers, the paver block design prepared by a licensed New Jersey engineer shall be approved by the City Engineer or his designee.
 - 2. Grass block pavers shall be installed in accord with manufacturer's specifications and as

- approved by the City Engineer or his designee. Permeable interlocking concrete paver installation shall be in accordance with the U.S. Department of Transportation Federal Highway Administration guidelines.
- 3. Grass block pavers shall be grass filled with either sod plugs or a minimum two (2) inches of screened topsoil, fertilizer and grass seed.
- 4. The Grass Block Paver Detail below provides guidance regarding installation of grass block pavers that may be superseded by manufacturer's specifications, the City Engineer or his designee.
- 5. Prior to paver installation, the developer shall submit certification from a licensed New Jersey Engineer, Planner or Architect demonstrating that the sub-base has been installed in accord with applicable specifications.
- 6. Prior to acceptance of the completed paver installation, or issuance of a certificate of occupancy, the site shall be inspected and approved by the City Engineer or his designee.

- k. Motor Vehicles Signage to Apply. The provision of Title 39 of the Revised Statutes of New Jersey shall, pursuant to N.J.S.A. 39:5A-1, et seq., be made applicable to all street-level parking areas, if provision is made for over fifty (50) vehicles.
- 1. Truck Berths. In addition to the parking lot requirements in the preceding section, truck berths for loading and unloading of goods and materials shall be provided. Any building or outdoor area used for business, industry, storage, hospital or other nonresidential purposes which needs to be serviced regularly by trucks shall have truck berth facilities on the premises in accordance with the following:

Gross Floor Area and Outdoor Area Used (square feet)	Required Number of Truck Berths
Up to 20,000	1
Greater than 20,000 and up to 40,000	2
Greater than 40,000 and up to 100,000	3
Each additional 60,000	1 additional

Two (2) or more establishments which are adjacent to each other may combine their gross floor area and outdoor areas for the purpose of determining the minimum number of truck berths required when adjacent establishments utilize truck berths jointly. The size of a truck berth shall be a minimum of forty-five feet (45') long and twelve feet (12') wide

Driveways, aisles, loading platforms and other areas required to make a truck berth usable shall not be included in the minimum area required for a truck berth itself.

A clear height equal to a minimum of fourteen feet (14') shall be provided for each truck berth and for each truck access way between public streets.

m. Loading and unloading space, with proper access from a street or alley, shall be provided on any lot on which a building for trade or business is hereafter erected or substantially altered.

SECTION 4.

§ 25-300.12.6. Access to Parking Areas, Loading and Unloading Spaces. [Ord. #02-19]

Vehicular access to off-street parking areas, loading and unloading spaces shall be provided via the public alley only, wherever such public alley adjoins the subject lot and is accessible by a motor vehicle. Curb cuts on a public street intended to provide such access shall only be permitted when the subject lot does not adjoin a public alley. An exception to this requirement shall be for dwellings existing prior to the effective date of this ordinance where, although the lot adjoins a public alley, it is inaccessible by a motor vehicle due to the location of the principal building.

SECTION 5.

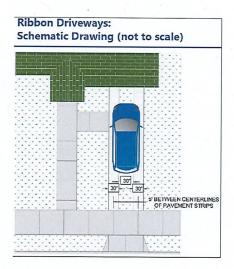
§ 25-1700.11.10. Access Drives for Single- and Two-Family Dwellings. [Ord. #09-28, § 11; Ord. #11-21, § 10; Ord. #2016-26 § 4; amended 6-11-2020 by Ord. No. 20-08]

Access drives for single- and two-family dwellings shall have a minimum width of nine feet (9') and utilize concrete aprons without curb returns regardless of size or location.

a. Alley Lots. Driveway access shall be from the alley for all lots adjoining an alley, except for dwellings existing prior to the effective date of this ordinance where, although the lot adjoins an alley, the rear yard is inaccessible due to the location of the principal

<u>building</u>. On lots up to 39.9 feet in width, such drives shall have a maximum width of thirty feet (30'); except on lots forty feet (40') or greater in width, the maximum permitted driveway width is thirty-six feet (36'). [Amended 10-26-2023 by Ord. No. 23-24]

- b. Non-Alley Lots. For lots having no rear yard access, such as lagoon lots, beach front lots and other lots not accessible from an alley <u>due to its configuration</u>, maximum driveway width shall be 24 feet.
- c. All such drives shall conform to the setback and impervious coverage requirements of this Ordinance.
- d. Paved driveways shall comply with Subsection 25-1700.9 of this Ordinance.
- e. Driveways designed with permeable pavers shall comply with Subsection 25-300.12.4j of this Ordinance. [Amended 2-23-2023 by Ord. No. 23-02]
- f. Ribbon/concrete strip driveways shall be constructed in accord with the following specifications.
 - 1. Each driveway strip shall be a minimum of 30 inches in width and oriented perpendicular to the public right-of-way.
 - 2. Spacing between driveway strips shall be five feet on-center.
 - 3. The area between driveway strips shall be permeable.
 - 4. Pavement shall be in accord with the standards in § 17-2.5b of the City Code.



SECTION 5.

All ordinances or portions thereof inconsistent with this Ordinance are repealed to the extent of such inconsistency.

SECTION 6.

If any portion of this Ordinance is declared to be invalid by a Court of competent jurisdiction, it shall not affect the remaining portions of the Ordinance which shall remain in full force and effect.

Section 7.

This Ordinance shall take effect in the time and manner prescribed by law.

ORDINANCE NO. 25-15

AN ORDINANCE ADOPTING A REDEVELOPMENT PLAN AND AMENDING THE ZONING MAP ACCORDINGLY

WHEREAS, in accordance with the Local Redevelopment and Housing Law, *N.J.S.A.* 40A:12A-1 *et seq.* (the "Redevelopment Law"), by Resolution 25-62-462, dated August 7, 2025, the Mayor and Council of the City of Ocean City previously requested the Ocean City Planning Board to undertake a preliminary investigation to determine whether certain property designated as Block 3306, Lot 1 on the Tax Map of the City of Ocean City and commonly known as 3313 Bay Avenue (the "Property") qualifies as an Area in Need of Rehabilitation as defined by *N.J.S.A.* 40A:12A-14; and,

WHEREAS, on September 10 2025, the Planning Board, after providing due notice, conducted a public hearing in accordance with the Redevelopment Law at which hearing it determined that the Property qualifies as an Area in Need of Rehabilitation and recommended it as such to the Governing Body for the City of Ocean City for further legal action in accordance with the Redevelopment Law; and,

WHEREAS, on October 1, 2025, the Ocean City Planning Board adopted a resolution memorializing its September 10, 2025 recommendation; and,

WHEREAS, on October 9, 2025, by Resolution 25-62-508, City Council found and declared the Property to be an area in Need of Rehabilitation under the Redevelopment Law; and,

WHEREAS, a redevelopment plan for the Property dated October 10, 2025 has been prepared by Hyland Design Group and Harman Deutsch Ohler Architecture (the "Redevelopment Plan"); and,

WHEREAS, City Council desires to have the Planning Board review and comment upon the Redevelopment Plan and advise as to whether the Redevelopment Plan is substantially consistent with the Ocean City Master Plan, pursuant to the Redevelopment Law; and,

WHEREAS, subject to the receipt of the Planning Board's recommendations concerning the Redevelopment Plan, City Council believes that the adoption of the Redevelopment Plan is in the best interests of the City and the redevelopment of the Property.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED by the Mayor and Council of the City of Ocean City, County of Cape May, State of New Jersey, as follows:

Section 1.

The recitals set forth above are incorporated herein and made a part hereof as if set forth at length.

Section 2.

Pursuant to *N.J.S.A.* 40A:12A-7(e), upon introduction of this ordinance on First Reading, City Council hereby refers the Redevelopment Plan to the Planning Board for review and recommendation. The Planning Board shall prepare a report regarding its recommendations and submit same to City Council within 45 days after referral, as required by the Redevelopment Law.

Section 3.

The Redevelopment Plan, which is on file with the City Clerk, is incorporated herein by reference and is contingent upon the receipt of the Planning Board's recommendations, is approved and adopted pursuant to *N.J.S.A.* 40A:12A-7.

Section 4.

The Ocean City zoning ordinances and zoning map are hereby amended to be consistent with the Redevelopment Plan and the provisions therein.

Section 5.

The Mayor or his designee is hereby authorized to enter into a Memorandum of Understanding with THE HOW GROUP, the contract-purchaser of the Property, or its assignee, to serve as the Redevelopment Entity for purposes of implementing the Redevelopment Plan and exercising the power granted to a Redevelopment Entity under the Redevelopment Law.

Section 6.

All ordinances or portions thereof inconsistent with this ordinance are repealed to the extent of such inconsistency.

Section 7.

If any portion of this ordinance is declared to be invalid by a court of competent jurisdiction, it shall not affect the remaining portions of the ordinance which shall remain in full force and effect.

Section 8.

This Ordinance shall take effect in the time and manner prescribed by law.

Redevelopment Plan for the Seaspray Rehabilitation Area, City of Ocean City Cape May County, New Jersey November 2025

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I. Introduction

This Redevelopment Plan is being adopted pursuant to the Local Redevelopment and Housing Law, ("LRHL") N.J.S.A 40A:12A-1 et seq, and provides the Governing Body of the City of Ocean City ("Governing Body") authority to proceed with the planning, development, rehabilitation and redevelopment of locations within the City of Ocean City declared to be an "Area In Need of Redevelopment."

On August 7, 2025, the Governing Body of the City of Ocean City ("City") by Resolution 25-62-462 directed the Planning Board to investigate whether certain locations within the City meet the criteria for designation as an "area in need of rehabilitation."

The Planning Board considered the City referral and presented its recommendation in the form of a Resolution. On October 9, 2025, based upon Planning Board's recommendation, the Governing Body adopted Resolution No. 25-62-508 designating Block 3306, Lot(s) 1, (the "Rehabilitation Area") as a Non-Condemnation Rehabilitation Area.

The City now wishes to adopt a Redevelopment Plan to facilitate the redevelopment or rehabilitation of the Rehabilitation Area. This Redevelopment Plan for the Seaspray Rehabilitation Area, City of Ocean City , Cape May County, New Jersey, November 2025 ("Redevelopment Plan") provides regulations while also providing broad opportunity to improve the economy, prevent further deterioration of distressed areas and promote the overall development of City.

II. <u>Designation of Area and Plan Development</u>

A. <u>Designation of the Rehabilitation Area</u>

Pursuant to N.J.S.A 40A:12A-1 et seq, by way of Resolution No. No. 25-62-508, adopted October 9, 2025, the Governing Body designated the following parcels, all within the City of Ocean City, an Area in Need of Rehabilitation:

Block 3306 Lot 1

B. Redevelopment Plan Preparation Process

A redevelopment plan must be prepared and adopted by ordinance prior to undertaking any project in all or a portion of the Rehabilitation Area. This process, which is consistent with applicable state statutes, was followed by the City's Governing Body in the preparation of this Redevelopment Plan.

III. Statutory Requirements of Redevelopment Plan

Pursuant to the LRHL, a redevelopment plan shall include an outline for the planning, development, redevelopment and/or rehabilitation of the designated area or portion thereof, including the proposed land uses and building requirements for the area. Specifically, <u>N.J.S.A.</u> 40A:12A-7 requires the following provisions:

- 1. Its relationship to definitive local objectives as to appropriate land uses, density of population and improved traffic and public transportation, public utilities, recreational and community facilities and other public improvements.
- 2. Proposed land uses and building requirements in the Rehabilitation Area.
- 3. An identification of any property within the Rehabilitation Area which is proposed to be acquired in accordance with this Redevelopment Plan.
- 4. Any significant relationship of this Redevelopment Plan to:
 - the Master Plans of contiguous municipalities;
 - the Master Plan of the County in which the municipality is located;
 - the State Development and Redevelopment Plan adopted pursuant to the "State Planning Act" PL 1985, C398 (C52:18A-196 et al.); and
 - the local ordinances and master plan.
- 5. A housing inventory of all affordable housing units to be removed as a result of implementation of this Redevelopment Plan; and
- 6. A plan for replacement of any affordable housing removed in accordance with this

Redevelopment Plan, which had been occupied at any time within the 18 months, which are subject to affordability controls and which are identified to be removed as a result of the implementation of this Redevelopment Plan.

7. Proposed locations for zero-emission vehicle fueling and charging infrastructure within the project area in a manner that appropriately connects with an essential public charging network.

IV. <u>Description of Project Area</u>

The Redevelopment Plan is applicable to the Rehabilitation Area identified as Block 3306 and Lot 1 as is listed in Section II above. This Rehabilitation Area is also known as the Seaspray Rehabilitation Area.

A. Redevelopment Area Context

On October 9, 2025, the Rehabilitation Area was declared an area in need of rehabilitation via Resolution No. 25-62-508.

B. Existing Land Use

The existing permitted uses for all parcels within the Rehabilitation Area are set forth in the City's Development Regulations and Zoning Ordinances. The Rehabilitation Area is currently improved.

V. Statement of Goals and Objectives

The City seeks to alleviate the conditions found in the Rehabilitation Area and support the use of property in a manner which will serve the public health, safety and welfare of the City and adjacent regions by eliminating those conditions that cause the area to be considered "in need of rehabilitation" To achieve these overall goals, the following goals and objectives have been established:

- 1. To eliminate those conditions that cause the area to be considered in need of rehabilitation," such as structures that are substandard, dilapidated, vacant, or exert an adverse influence on the area.
- 2. To stimulate private investment in the Rehabilitation Area by assembling sites and assisting as necessary and appropriate to support such rehabilitation and redevelopment.
- 3. To make available a full range of benefits and inducements for the redevelopment of the Rehabilitation Area, including, federal, state, county and local government funding.
- 4. To foster public-private partnerships to accomplish revitalization of the Rehabilitation Area in a manner that best serves the needs of the community, strengthens the local economy and attracts residents to the area and contributes to the continuing vitality of the City.

VI. Proposed Land Uses and Building Requirements

This Redevelopment Plan shall supersede the existing zoning for the Rehabilitation Area set forth in the City Regulations and Zoning Ordinances. It is intended and expressly understood that with respect to any issue of relevant land use and building requirements not specifically addressed in this Redevelopment Plan, those issues are subject to the City's Development Regulations and Zoning Ordinances and all other ordinances and regulations of the City not contravened in this Redevelopment Plan as permitted by N.J.S.A. 40A:12A-7(a)(2). The Property is located in the GW "34th Street Gateway" Zoning District.

Development of the Rehabilitation Area shall be governed by the following:

A. Permitted Uses.

Relief sought is a multi-family residential with no Commercial uses required as required by §25-205.10.3

B. Accessory uses proposed (see §25-205.10.4.)

- 1. Storage buildings.
- Private swimming pool and outside showers.
 Roof Recreational area and green roof.
- 4. Renewable energy systems.
- 5. Balconies on front, rear and side façade.
- 6. Roof top deck shall be permissible above the upper most habitable floor.

All development shall comply with the requirements of State law as set forth at N.J.S.A. 40:55D-66.20.

VII. Affordable Housing

The City does not anticipate the removal of any affordable housing units which are subject to affordability controls as a result of the implementation of this Redevelopment Plan. Because it is anticipated that no affordable housing units are to be removed due to the implementation of this Redevelopment Plan, no affordable housing units are anticipated to be replaced.

VIII. Property Acquisition

The Rehabilitation Area has been designated as a Rehabilitation Area. As a result, the LRHL does not authorize property acquisition by eminent domain. Therefore, no eminent domain is anticipated or enabled by this Redevelopment Plan.

IX. Relocation of Displaced Residents

This is a court ordered sale. The City shall be responsible for any relocation costs due to the City condemning the property from habitability.

X. Relationship of the Redevelopment Plan to Other Plans

A. Relationship to Master Plans of Contiguous Municipalities

The Rehabilitation Area subject to this Redevelopment Plan is not located near any borders of any contiguous municipalities. As a result, these proposed within this Redevelopment Plan will have no impact on the Master Plans of any contiguous municipality.

B. Relationship to Cape May County Master Plan

Cape May County recently adopted a Comprehensive Plan by way of Resolution #1-2022, adopted on January 20, 2022. The goals and objectives of this Redevelopment Plan are consistent with and support the following goals and objectives of the Cape May County Comprehensive Plan:

- Encourage municipalities to provide sufficient space for a variety of land uses, including but not limited to, space for commercial/residential development, public spaces and other community assets.
- Encourage municipalities to enact zoning that facilities the development of a variety of housing types that meet the needs of a broad spectrum of the population.
- Encourage compact development footprints through redevelopment, infill, development, adaptive reuse, and mixed-use development concepts.

C. Relationship to State Development and Redevelopment Plan

The State Development and Redevelopment Plan ("SDRP") was adopted in 2001. In 2012, the State of New Jersey proposed a Strategic Plan to update the 2001 SDRP; however, the updated plan was never adopted. Therefore, the 2001 SDRP is the most current version.

The SDRP designates the Rehabilitation Area as a Regional Center ("RC"). The purpose of the SDRP is to provide for much of the State's redevelopment of the RC area. One of the Policy Objectives for the RC area is the development of commercial, cultural, and civic centers, with multi-story and mixed-use buildings, shared parking, higher intensities, and a high proportion of internal trips on foot or by transit. This Redevelopment Plan furthers the foregoing goals of the RC designation by encouraging development of an underutilized parcel through strategic redevelopment and private investment.

Thus, this Redevelopment Plan furthers the State Development and Redevelopment Plan.

XI. Relationship of Redevelopment Plan to Municipal Development Regulations and City Master Plan

This Redevelopment Plan is compatible with the goals of the City of Ocean City 's Master Plan, and is designed to effectuate the same. This Redevelopment Plan furthers the goals set forth in the Master Plan by redeveloping and rehabilitating underutilized areas and by encouraging both economic development and preservation of the City's natural resources.

XII. Proposed Redevelopment Actions

A. Redevelopment Authority

The City's Governing Body shall act as the redevelopment entity pursuant to N.J.S.A. 40A:12A-4(c) for purposes of implementing and carrying out this Redevelopment Plan. In doing so, the City's Governing Body shall have the powers set forth in N.J.S.A. 40A:12A-15 and

40A:12A-22, and all other relevant statutes and regulations to effectuate all their duties and responsibilities in the execution and implementation of this Redevelopment Plan.

B. Redevelopment Agreement

Pursuant to <u>N.J.S.A.</u> 40A:12A-8, the City may select one or more redevelopers for the implementation of one or more redevelopment projects within the Rehabilitation Area as it deems necessary. All Redevelopment Agreements shall comport with the requirements of <u>N.J.S.A.</u> 40A:12A-9 and this Redevelopment Plan.

XIII. Obligations of the Redeveloper

All property within the Rehabilitation Area must be developed in accordance with the requirements of this Redevelopment Plan, the City's Zoning and Land Development Ordinances and the Municipal Land Use Law (N.J.S.A. 40:55D-1 et seq.). Any private Redeveloper(s) (an entity wishing to avail itself of the opportunities set forth in N.J.S.A. 40A:12A-1 et seq.) will be required to contact the Redevelopment Entity to present its proposal.

XIV. Deviations From Provisions Of Approved Redevelopment Plan

Pursuant to N.J.S.A. 40A:12A-13, all applications for development pursuant to this Plan shall be submitted to the municipal planning board for its review and approval in accordance with the requirements for review and approval of subdivisions and site plans as set forth by ordinance adopted pursuant to the Municipal Land Use Law.

All applications requiring relief for deviations from this Plan or other City development ordinances shall be governed by the Municipal Land Use Law, N.J.S.A. 40:55D-1 et seq., or any existing, or to be adopted, redevelopment plan for a specific site and/or project and/or project area. No deviations shall be granted that result in any of the following effects or conditions:

None.

XV. <u>Duration of Redevelopment Plan Restrictions</u>

This Redevelopment Plan and any modifications thereof shall be in force and effect for a period of thirty (30) years from the date of adoption.

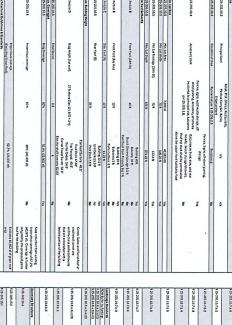

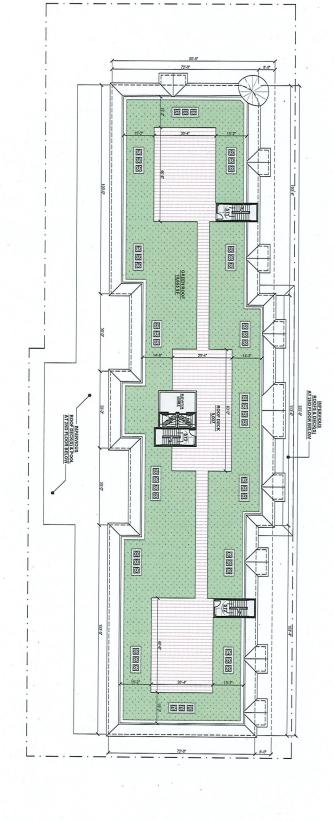
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SD1.0 SCHEMATIC PLANS
