about the Girls Competition Cheer Team because six times, it is an unbelievable feat. And I wish you guys nothing but the best. We're moving on, and I will want to see the rest of you come back here next year.

Remember to thank not only your teammates, but thank your coaches and your families as well, because they sacrificed to get you here. And I'm looking forward to what you girls can do in the future. Congratulations again.

MS. ARDIZZONE: This is my favorite part of the night. Okay. I'm going to make this quick. Thank you for taking the time to recognize the phenomenal group of young ladies sitting here tonight. A big thank you to Commissioner Tucci and Frank DeMaio for your unwavering support of this program for allowing me to coach this amazing group of young ladies, giving us a safe place to call our home three nights a week at the annex. Without your support we would not be here this evening.

Five months ago, 44 young ladies showed up at the annex fighting for a spot on this team. The 26 ladies that sit before you tonight made that cut. They showed up week after week in countless hours working on fast, difficult choreography, harder tumbling passes,

and even harder sun sequences supporting one another, both on and off the mat, preparing for a very competitive season.

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Unfortunately, at our very first competition of the season, two of our athletes collided on the mat halting the entire (break in audio) -- I don't know why this keeps going off -- halting the entire competition, resulting in two athletes being taken to the hospital with head injuries. Our team was devastated over this accident, and I honestly thought it was going to be impossible to get them back on the mat. In the true spirit of this team, these ladies rallied around one another offering love, support, and encouragement, enabling us to get back on the mat just six days later, two athletes short, but we competed at another competition and took home first place. That continued for the next four competitions.

Then came the last team standing competition at American Dream. This was a competition like no other. It was an All Star competition completely out of our wheelhouse, and what I thought to be way out of our league. I did not think we even belonged at a competition of this caliber, but I wanted nothing more than to give these girls the incredible experience to perform on such a huge platform in the middle of the

American Dream Mall. My advice to the girls that morning was to simply take in the experience, be together as a team and go out and have fun. And they did just that. They set the mat on fire and walked away with the first -- with first place and the title of last team standing. It truly was an incredible end to the season.

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This team has been my light, my support, and my happy place during some of the darkest and most uncertain times. Last week at our end-of-season dinner some of these ladies got up and spoke warm heartfelt words about what this team meant to them and the impact it has had on their lives. While I was touched to hear their words, I don't think they will ever realize the impact that they have had on me and my life, and how I could have never gotten through this health journey without them. Their constant support, their strength, their love and laughter has made my days brighter and has kept me fighting a good fight. This is worth more than any trophy or first place banner in my book.

This season, I have to say goodbye to 18 of these young ladies as they will be graduating and moving on to high school. I would like to recognize a few young ladies who have been on this team with me since I took over coaching four years ago, Dylan

Jasnowitz, Charlotte Romonowski and Grace Williams. I would also like to shout out to our high school helper, Caitlin, who will be leaving us to go to Rutgers this fall.

Thank you, ladies, for your commitment and dedication and congratulations on such an amazing recreation career. Between us there are 21 first place division championship titles, as well as a title of grand champion, and now the title of last team I truly couldn't be more proud of these girls and this team. Our first place awards are hung and trophies are displayed proudly in the annex, and tomorrow we will hang our new banner in the gymnasium at parks and recreation naming you all undefeated sixtime division champions and the last team standing for Congratulations to all of you. I look forward to seeing great things from you in the years to come. Thank you.

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COMMISSIONER TUCCI: Okay. (Audio interference) celebrating this evening (indiscernible) Jr. Raider wrestlers. Now, if any of you know, anything about wrestling, you do know that there's not a lot of smiling in wrestling, all right? There's a lot of hard work. There's a lot of physical training.

There's a lot of technique training, all right, but the one thing that stands out to me time and time again with wrestling, is the fact that you can't blame anybody else, because when you're on that mat, it's you and your opponent. It's not the first baseman who dropped the ball. It's not the guard or tackle that didn't block, all right, or the quarterback that threw the bad pass. All right. Or who -- the goalie that didn't block the ball coming in, all right, it's you and your opponent. This is one of the ultimate competitive sports that I can think of, all right, and it's growing more and more every day.

We have a wrestling room that is second to none. We have coaches that are the very, very best of the best. We have parents that are always there for our children. And we have children who are committed, all right. This is not a fly-by-night sport. This is a sport that you commit to, you dedicate yourself to, and you just continue going day and night. Wrestling never stops, okay? Wrestling is a continuous process, and it's a process that as you continue on, you get better and better until you reach the heights of the sport.

I still have one of my high school jackets that I'm very proud of, so the energy never goes away. Years ago when my oldest son was in high school, he was really a baseball player, but they had an opening end on the team and the coach was like, you're a pretty tough kid. Why don't you come play with us -- come wrestle with us? So they -- he did. My son knew every ceiling -- what the ceilings looked like in every gym in Essex County. However, a couple of times he's like, Dad, do you want me to quit? I'm like, well, you're kind of embarrassing our family name. But at the last match for some tournament that they were in, he went out there and he worked hard and he winded up

pinning the kid and they won this tournament. They carried him off the mat. So hard work does pay off.

Don't ever get discouraged. And like I said, you're a Raider, we bleed maroon. Good luck guys. Thank you.

MADAM CLERK: Mayor Kelly.

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MAYOR KELLY: Thank you. Yes. And I'm voting, aye, as well, and I'd like to welcome the returners back and those who are going to continue on, I challenge you to come back here next year, because I want to see you all back here next year. If you've been here before, you've heard me say that, you know, I didn't -- I never wrestled before, but I played rugby in college, and my rugby coach liked to recruit from no other source but from wrestlers, because pound for pound you can't beat a wrestler's fitness level and strength. Your fitness is going to carry you through life.

A saying I like to say is, you know, you got to work out, you got to stay in shape because you got to pay rent to live in your body. And you guys are paying excellent rent to live in your bodies for the rest of your life. This is going to set you up -- carry your fitness level through the rest of your life. And good luck to you with whatever you're doing. And, like, again, I -- I'd like to see you all back here

1 next year. Congratulations again, and I vote, aye.

And I'll say it one more time, once a 9 Raider always a Raider. 10 MADAM CLERK: Mayor Kelly. 11 MAYOR KELLY: Thank you. I'm voting, aye. 12 And 41 and 1, that's incredible. You guys should be very proud of yourselves. And I didn't mention it last 13 time, but I have -- luckily there's two teams, so I got 14 15 to mention it, but remember to thank your teammates, 16 your coaches and your families because they all sacrificed to get you where you are. Forty-one and one 17 18 is incredibly impressive, and they all had a part in 19 that. So remember to thank them and again, 20 congratulations. 21 Good evening, everyone. MR. CRESPO: First, I would like to thank all the commissioners, especially 22 23 Mr. Tucci and DeMaio. We -- you guys expanded the 24 wrestling room, nearly doubled in size. I think it

expanded 1,300 square feet. And -- don't worry that

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it -- that gift was definitely used. A lot of blood, sweat, and tears on those mats. And we had a total of 66 wrestlers on the older division of both teams combined, and we averaged over 50 wrestlers per practice. So I don't even know how we would've done it if the room wasn't double in size. There's no way we would have that success we've been having without that room. And I think Christmas Eve, we announced last minute optional practice and we had like 52 kids show up at ten o'clock in the morning, you know, for two hours and the parents just, you know, drop them off.

And another thing what -- there was a couple things I was thinking. That one loss you mentioned, 41 and 1, we lost last year in the championship finals to Fair Lawn, and we had beat them earlier that year. And Mike asked me if I wanted to speak to the kids before that match, for -- before the rematch of the championship finals, and I said, there's nothing to say. You know, we showed up to win, and there's nothing else to say to the kids. They had unfinished business.

I don't want to keep talking. I get a little emotional. I had a big speech a couple of weeks ago at the wrestling there and I got -- my defense, I was running on no sleep from work, so I got a little

emotional. But these kids are tough. You know, I talked to them that they win -- it's not just about winning. It's about the fight they have. Like, why do they fight so hard? Like he was saying, like, if you have a big enough why, you find the how, and what is the why? I ask them all the time, like, why.

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And why do these kids fight and not give up? Is it the way they're being raised? Is it the camaraderie between the team? Is it the respect for Is it -- is it for the town? the coaches? Is it for the commissioners, for the banner? And it -- it's a combination of all of them, you know, and this is part You know, I brought them outside the room a few of it. times. I pointed to the banner. Actually, I pointed to a specific banner. In 2006, Nutley were champions, they had one loss, and that was to the Bloomfield team me and my brother were coaching. But Nutley ended up getting them back later on.

So I told them I'm part of that banner for my 2006. Who wants to be part of these banners? And they all looked at it. Jamil had them out there in the gym when it was empty running sprints and they would all look at the banners. It's special to them. It's special for them to be here.

And I always tell them, like, there's more

good in the world -- more good in the world than bad. And the same thing as people. There's more people rooting for you than against you. You know, more people want to see you succeed than lose. And people have been following them at the state tournaments, qualifiers. We have -- every bleacher's full. There's standing room only for the matches. How many pizza

pies do we sell?

UNIDENTIFIED AUDIENCE MEMBERS: A lot.

MR. CRESPO: You know, a couple years ago, they used to have like extra pie and give them out for free. Now there's no pizza left over for me at the end, like what the heck's going on, you know?

But, you know, it -- it's great to have all your support. And next year we're just going keep setting the bar higher and higher. They're going to be tested next year even more. You know, we might be entering a third league. So we might have three teams up here -- or need to win three divisions. And I think we had 13 people go to states last year. Let's try and bring that to 20. We set the bar high. And that's it.

MAYOR KELLY: I'll set the bar even higher.

Let's see 20 state champions. You guys are more than

welcome to stay and hear us talk about the budget, but

if you guys want to get out of here, we'll give you an

opportunity to get out of here.

One of 23 our -- one of my resolutions that I'm reading is going 24 to be about distracting driving, and all of us are 25 aware that we had a pedestrian hit in a crosswalk up

the street from here, ironically, and was killed last I believe it was Thursday or Thursday night. And, you know, my heart goes out to his family, Mr. Gilbert. 3 Fortunately, or unfortunately, I know both parties. 4 Ιt was a young woman that hit him making a left-hand turn on that street. And I just wanted to talk a little bit 7 about, if I can, just so I won't talk to on my

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resolution.

You know, Nutley is getting busier. Traffic is what it is. You know, our population is up and a lot of people walk. Even though the pedestrians have the right of way in a crosswalk, I'm just urging you, please stop and look and make sure it's clear before you cross the street. And please, on the pedestrian's behalf as well, at night try to wear bright clothing, you know, even reflectors or light something because it is difficult on some of the darker streets where there are pedestrian crosswalks to, you know, see them. It's actually happened to me, and I'm on high alert and, you know, thank God I haven't hit anybody, you know.

Today we have motorized bicycles. You know, I was going down Franklin Avenue just the other day, kid on a motorcycle bike cuts right in front of me making a left-hand turn. So you know, please help us help you, you know. Whatever you could do as far as

1 the right clothing, being careful, looking both ways.

2 Yes, you do have the right to cross the crosswalk and

3 you're in the right, but when a life is taken, you

4 know, be -- and, you know, because either the driver or

5 the pedestrian made a mistake, you know, it's

6 heartbreaking to us at public safety and I'm sure the

7 board of commissioners.

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Also, a good friend of mine brought attention to a post that was on Instagram today. A woman criticizing the Nutley Police Department, myself, and our chief that, you know, now we're doing distracting driver tonight and that we are, you know, doing So you know, I don't usually respond to enforcement. posts -- probably since 2009, I got over that, but we are doing the same exact thing in Nutley that we always This is the time that we do do year after year. distracting driver. This is the time that we, you know, enforce heavily because of the warmer weather coming and, you know, more people are out, and so forth.

So it's not that -- it's not out of the ordinary and, you know, we have thick skin up here, but to take a shot at our police department or a chief and even myself at that matter, especially when somebody just lost their life.

You know, we wish we could have a cop on every corner. We wish that we could, you know, be our little green bubble that we want to be. But, you know, unfortunately accidents happen and it's really heartfelt. And at this time, Mayor, just out of respect for Mr. Gilbert -- Gilberti that is, if we could have a moment of silence, I would appreciate it.

MAYOR KELLY: Yes.

MAYOR KELLY: Thank you, Commissioner. And I would like to say that your police -- or our police department does enforcement year round. And I can attest that the day before that accident, I saw a car not yield to a pedestrian and within seconds a police officer pulled that vehicle over. So it's not just one month or it's not intermittent, it's year round and the police force is vigilant all the time, and they do enforce our rules, and it is a tragic situation.

As Commissioner Evans pointed out, we are having the rabies clinic. It's a free vaccine. It's a three-year vaccine. So if you've gotten it within -- if your animal has gotten it within the last three years -- well, the last two years, you're due for renewal. If you haven't gotten it in three years,

you're overdue for renewal. 1 If you got it last year, you don't need another vaccine. And that's all I have 2 on for this evening. 3 Moving on to ordinance introductions. 4 5 Commissioner Evans, you want to start? 13	business is the introduction of the 2025 municipal
14	budget. Tonight represents the statutory deadline for
15	introducing our budget. We will have a public hearing
16	on the budget, potentially around May 6th. There are a
17	couple of things that are in play that may delay that,
18	which hopefully would be beneficial to us in reducing
19	the budget increase for this year.
20	But what I can say about the introduction is
21	first that this year completes the transferring of the
22	setup of the sewer utility. So that part is complete.
23	There was a two-step process, and it's complete now for
24	2025. Overall, our appropriations for the for all
25	five of the municipal departments, including in all

five departments is \$64,799,792. which is an increase of \$2,224,838 over the prior year. Additionally, we had revenues, which from other sources other than taxes of \$18,771,571, which has -- is a net increase of

\$734,902.

So as a result, the municipal tax levy is
increasing to \$44,000,176 and 408 -- \$408, which is a
total increase of \$1,347,991 or roughly 3.1 percent
increase. That equates to the average household, which
in today's dollar is assessed at 491,000 and change to

a \$123 increase for that average household.

Part of the reason why that increase is as high as it is, is that state aid was reduced this year by \$547. If we didn't receive that reduction in state aid, our municipal increase would be right now at about -- at around \$68. So unfortunately the State in their new budget introduction eliminated a category of municipal aid, which affected us to the tune of over a half a million dollars.

The additional increase that we face is that our assessed values in town overall went up \$10,345,000, which enables by statute, the library to get an increase in their funding automatically to \$1,851,813 or an additional \$141,000, which is about \$18 increase. So in total we're -- with the library

the increase on the introduction of this budget is \$141 per the average household or about 3.44 percent. My hope is that we will continue to look at opportunities to reduce this budget increase to something that's hopefully less than \$100 on the municipal side, but time will tell.

The budget itself will be available online tomorrow morning for review, and hard copies will be available at the municipal clerk's office and at the public library for review. You won't take those copies, it's just for -- available for review. So with that -- I got a piece of paper I got to find. Give me a second. It's in here. Give me a second. There it is. I found it.

COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: We were hoping you wouldn't.

COMMISSIONER EVANS: Yeah. Okay. So I read as follows: The municipal budget of the Township of Nutley, County of Essex, for fiscal year of 2025 to be resolved that it is the following -- that the following statements of revenue and calculations does shall constitute the municipal budget for the year 2025.

Be it further resolved that said budget is to be published in the Nutley Sun in the April 10th issue of that newspaper, which is the first available date.

Whereas, according to the most current 2023
National Survey on Drug Use and Health, 61.4 million
people ages 12 and older reported binge drinking in the
past month. U.S. children ages 17 and younger lived
with a parent who had an alcohol use disorder;

Whereas, we're experiencing what some are calling a mental health crisis with rising rates of

anxiety and depression across the lifespan leading to 1 increased use of alcohol with some individuals engaged 2 in alcohol misuse, some subsequently developing AUD; 3 Now, therefore, be it resolved that the Board 4 5 of Commissioners, Township of Nutley, County of Essex, State of New Jersey recognizes the month of April 2025 6 7 as Alcohol Awareness Month and urge all citizens of 8 Nutley to support efforts and activities that increase 9 community awareness and support for the individuals and families coping with alcoholism in our community. 10 11 So moved. 12 COMMISSIONER TUCCI: Second.
