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The Health Department will be doing its annual baby's vaccine clinic on April 22nd, which is this Tuesday from 4 to 7:30. And as always, we're doing this in conjunction with the Revenue and Finance Department, so you can bring your pet to get vaccinated and then register them with the Revenue and Finance The vaccine is good for three years, so if Department. you previously got your pet vaccinated last year, you don't need to come again this year. If you're within one year, you're more than welcome to come and have the vaccine administered to your pet. If you're more than a year out, the veterinarian is going to say to come back next year.

We also have the monthly children's health clinic on April 17th at 8:30 at the Nutley Health Department. On April 24th from 10 a.m. to 12 p.m., we have a depression screening at the health department. And on May 6th from 2 p.m. to 4 p.m. at the health department, we have melanoma screening. 6	an increase in the annual cost of the licensing fee. I

9	required by law and that further consideration of said
10	ordinance for final passage by the Board of
11	Commissioners be held at its second reading on May 6th,
12	2025.

COMMISSIONER EVANS: My next two ordinances relate actually to the same thing.

We did have a sewer main break between

Conover Avenue and Florence Street requiring emergency repairs. When emergencies occur under NJSA 40A:11-16, we can enter into contracts to get that done immediately without having to go through the public bidding process. We have engaged and received a proposal from Montana Construction Corporation at 80 Contant Avenue in Lodi for an amount not to exceed \$60,000.

Because we're in an in between the introduction of our budget and the adoption of our budget, it will require an amendment to our budget before we adopt the 2025 budget. However, funds are available in Account 5-05-710-256 for this Capital Outlay.

Now, therefore, be it resolved by the Board of Commissioners of the Township of Nutley, County of Essex that does hereby authorize the Commissioner of Public Works and the Municipal Clerk to enter into an emergency contract with Montana Construction for an amount not to exceed \$60,000.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Qualified Purchasing Agent and Chief Financial Officer are

1	authorized to take all necessary steps to comply with
2	the resolution, and that two copies of this authorizing
3	resolution be filed with the Division of Local
4	Governmental Services along with an affidavit of the
5	Chief Financial Officer pursuant to NJSA 40A:4-52.

25	Essex, State of New Jersey that in accordance with

1	NJSA 40A:4-48, an emergency appropriation is hereby
2	made for capital improvements, capital outlay \$60,000,
3	that said emergency appropriation shall be provided for
4	in full for the 2025 budget and the water sewer utility
5	and two copies of this resolution will be filed with
6	the Director of the Division of Local Governmental
7	Services.
8	So move.

23	Still some work to be done to get it totally fixed, but
24	hopefully, by the end of this week, we'll have that all
25	done. And I thank you, Commissioner.

21	Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964;
22	Whereas the Township has drafted a revised
23	Title VI policy to ensure continued compliance with the
24	Act, which was subsequently revised reviewed,
25	rather, by the New Jersey Department of Transportation

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1	and found to be fully compliant with federal
2	requirements; and
3	Whereas, the Township of Nutley accepts the
4	attached revised Title VI Non-Discrimination Policy as
5	approved by the New Jersey DOT;
6	Now, therefore, be it resolved by the Board
7	of Commissioners of the Township of Nutley, and the
8	County of Essex, State of New Jersey that the Mayor and
9	Board of Commissioners and Town Clerk are hereby

Day to promote the planting of trees and to encourage 1 the protection of our forests from fires and pests that 2 destroy the beauty and usefulness of our woodlands; 3 Whereas, half of New Jersey's total land area 4 is forest under tree cover; 5 Whereas, trees play an important role in the 6 7 ecosystem in which we live, and trees reduce the erosion of our precious topsoil caused by wind and 8 9 water, clean the air we breathe and the water we drink, produce oxygen, provide habitat for birds and wildlife 10 11 and reduce heating and cooling costs by moderating 12 temperatures; 13 Whereas, trees are a renewable resource giving us paper for fine literature, wood for homes, 14 15 fuel for fires, and countless other wood products; and Whereas, trees provide increased property 16 value, enhanced economic viability, and pleasing 17 18 aesthetic qualities along streets and properties and 19 municipalities; and Whereas, tree planting in yards and farms, in 20 21 school yards and parks, and along streets and highways creates an enduring heritage for generations that 22 23 follow; and 24 Whereas, the Township of Nutley has completed 25 its 36th year as a member of Tree City USA; and

1	Whereas I, Commissioner Mauro Tucci, Director
2	of Parks and Public Property of Township of Nutley, do
3	hereby proclaim April 22nd, 2025 as Arbor Day in the
4	community of Nutley and urge all citizens to support
5	efforts to protect our trees and woodlands and to
6	support our town's urban forestry program, and further,
7	I urge all citizens to plant trees to gladden hearts
8	and promote the well-being of present and future

Stafford 11 Disaster Relief and Emergency Assistance Act, as 12 amended; the National Flood Insurance Act of 1968, as 13 amended; and the National Dam Safety Program Act, as 14 15 amended; and Whereas, in 2025 Essex County Hazard 16 Mitigation Plan identifies mitigation goals and actions 17 18 to reduce or eliminate long-term risks to people and property in the Township of Nutley from the impacts of 19 20 future hazards and disasters; and 21 Whereas, the adoption of the Board of Commissioners, Township of Nutley demonstrates its 22 23 commitment to hazard mitigation and achieving the goals 24 outlined in the 2025 Essex County Hazard Mitigation 25 Plan; and

3	State of New Jersey, that the 2025 Essex County Hazard
4	Mitigation Plan is hereby adopted and that while
5	content related to the Township of Nutley may require

Melanoma/Skin Cancer Detection and Prevention Month.

And as I said earlier, there's a lot of recognition in the month of May. We'll have more on at the next meeting. We just wanted to split it up. This is Resolution Number 103-25.

Whereas, more people are diagnosed with skin cancer each year in the United States than all other cancers combined;

Whereas, current estimates that one in five Americans will develop skin cancer by the age of 70;

Whereas, the American Academy of Dermatology encourages everyone to perform regular skin self-exams to check for signs of skin cancer as a half of all melanomas are self-detected;

Whereas, when detected early, the five-year survival rate for melanoma is 99 percent;

Whereas, melanoma is most commonly associated with skin cancer, but can be detected in other places

1	on your body, such as hair, the lining of our internal
2	organs, our eyes. When it forms in the eye, it's known
3	as ocular melanoma or, more specifically, uveal
4	melanoma because it forms in the uveal tract of the
5	eye;
6	Now, therefore, be it resolved by the Board
7	of Commissioners in the Township of Nutley, County of
8	Essex, State of New Jersey to recognize May 2025 as
9	Melanoma/Skin Cancer Detection and Prevention Month and
10	encourage all residents to take necessary precautions

MAYOR KELLY: So the default is for everyone to get 95 gallons. We do have 64-gallon containers available, and we'll -- if you just call the Health Department, we'll swap that out for you as soon as we are able.

MS. BOZZA: Oh, and I can get a smaller one?

MAYOR KELLY: Right. At no cost.

MS. BOZZA: Well, that would be good to know. But they all -- they don't even take the garbage -- all the garbage that's in it. They only reach in, and what they can reach, they put in the garbage. They work with (indiscernible).

MAYOR KELLY: Yes, and so that's a concern we have, and it's an issue we're dealing with, with the Town Attorney, to get compliance with our contract.

And this -- we've had a number of ongoing conversations with the garbage contractor; however, it hasn't borne any fruit, so we're looking at escalating it through the Town Attorney.

MS. BOZZA: And so I guess this question, why does your name have to be on it?

MAYOR KELLY: So the language on the trash cart was -- because we capitalized it, and the language was approved by the Town Attorney because we had to

designate that the ownership of the can belongs to the 1 township. 2 3 MS. BOZZA: Why does your name have to be on 4 it? Like I said, the language was 5 MAYOR KELLY: approved by the Town Attorney. 6 7 MS. BOZZA: (Indiscernible) they told me they 8 don't know of any other town that has a councilman or 9 the mayor -- all right? So what we're doing is we're advertising for you. So are you willing to pay the 10 taxpayers for advertising for you? 11 MAYOR KELLY: I don't believe it's 12 13 advertising. And as I said, the --MS. BOZZA: What about at election time? 14 Is 15 that where you're advertising? MAYOR KELLY: Well, as I said, the language 16 was approved by the Township Attorney. 17 18 MS. BOZZA: So why don't you pass an 14 15 ordinance saying that if a tree reaches a certain age, then its homeowner -- if you passed an ordinance 16 17 saying --18 COMMISSIONER TUCCI: Well, because it varies. 19 They're all different. They all decline at a different 20 So to just, you know, try and broad brush every 21 different species of trees wouldn't be a correct thing 22 But we are constantly evaluating the trees that to do. 23 are out there. Our shade tree 3 people are out every single day, all right, along with all of our supervisors, and if there's a tree that 4 5 looks like it's going to pose a danger to anyone, we act on that immediately. 6 7 MS. BOZZA: Yeah. In addition to the fact 8 that it's dangerous --9 COMMISSIONER TUCCI: Mm-hmm. MS. BOZZA: -- the tree that's -- that has 10 all that hang and falls, it costs me \$600 just to have 11 12 it cleaned up, and I have a pool in my yard. Do you 13 understand what it means to have a pool in your yard? COMMISSIONER TUCCI: Yes, I do understand 14 15 what it means to have a pool in your yard. Yeah. I 16 know. Well, you know --17 MS. BOZZA: 18 COMMISSIONER TUCCI: I have the same issue. I have the same issue, but, you know, fortunately, you 19 know, the trees in Nutley were here before the homes 20 21 As the town developed and more homes were built, 22 they didn't eliminate many of the trees because that 23 adds to the character and the charm of the town. I 24 mean, we're constantly replanting. We replant 25 different species, all right, that aren't as large and

fit in the planting strips and don't present the same 1 types of dangers. But you have to remember, going back 2 when, you know, this was farmland, there were many 3 large trees and, you know, many of them are aging out, 4 5 all right, and there's a balance that we have to strike, all right, because people love trees. 6 If you 7 read the information, put it --8 MS. BOZZA: Well, what about the people who 9 don't love trees. What about them? COMMISSIONER TUCCI: Well, maybe you live in 10 the wrong town if you don't love trees because we've 11 12 been a tree city for 36 years. MS. BOZZA: (Indiscernible) I'd like to have 13 a number of trees. 14 15 COMMISSIONER TUCCI: I know you do, yes. 16 MS. BOZZA: But the point is that there's -there's a -- a -- a limit, you know, of what people --17 18 COMMISSIONER TUCCI: Yeah. You're correct, and the arborist does, in fact, zero in on them. 19 20 have many, many trees. Unfortunately, he can't get all 21 of them all of the time, but he does the best that he 22 can, you know, with the personnel that we have in the 23 Parks Department. 24 And they shouldn't be allowed to
