21	Commissioners. I'm happy to be here tonight, and I,
22	you know, just commend the municipality and the Board
23	of Education for working together and coming up with a
24	solution that is going to have a lasting effect on
25	Nutley for many years to come. You know, as a former

Mayor and now an Assemblyman, I understand how municipal government and Board of Educations have sometimes find it difficult to work together, but this is an example that is going to be, you know, rectified statewide. So I just want to commend each and every one of you. This is an absolutely wonderful thing to be doing, and as the, you know, just for the residents, your Commissioner Board, especially Commissioner Evans, has been harping on me, and I plan on fighting for more money down in Trenton this coming budget season. we're committed to -- myself and Assemblywoman Morales -- are committed to making sure that we help assist this to the finish line and make it possible. Thank you.

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ASSEMBLYWOMAN MORALES: Good evening,
everyone. My name is Assemblywoman Carmen Morales. I
live in Belleville, right next door to Nutley. But as
your representative down in the State House, myself and
Assemblyman Michael Venezia, are here this evening to
congratulate you on this -- I don't have the bill
number, he has it on his agenda. But I just want to
say that, as a former preschool teacher, a former
kindergarten teacher, a lifeline educator, knowing that
this town of Nutley -- thank you Mayor, Commissioners,
and I see the representatives here from the Board of

Education, our Superintendent, as well as the Board Members that are all here today -- knowing that you're putting children first because when we invest in our young people, our babies, our children, we know that we are doing good work: good work for our community, good work for the town, and good work for our future. Because the foundation -- and I know first-hand what that is -- education is the great equalizer. And when we invest in our children and in education, we know that we are getting a great return on investment. for all of you, congratulations this evening for putting the work in, for ensuring that we continue to invest in our children, in our future, and in our And like the Assemblyman Venezia said, we communities. will continue to fight for any monies to bring it back home to District 34, which includes Nutley. Thank you so much for allowing us to speak.

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MAYOR KELLY: Thank you. It's always a pleasure to hear from you guys. Always a pleasure to have you here. You're welcome to come to more meetings and sing our praises. But like you said, this was a team effort and did it -- do we want to say some comments now do we want to wait until we actually roll in --

COMMISSIONER EVANS: We have a public hearing

coming up so we could probably do it part of the public 1 hearing before we -- because we have to vote as well. 2 So I do want to MAYOR KELLY: Okay. Yeah. 3 thank you for coming and appreciate it and, like I 4 said, you're always welcome here. 5 COMMISSIONER SCARPELLLI: Just one thing, 6 Assemblywoman Morales and Assemblyman Venezia, 7 I'm sure Commissioner Evans has, but that funding 8 formula has to be looked at. We are not getting our 9 fair share here in Nutley. So, anything you can do to 10 look at that and bring the bacon home to us, we 11 appreciate. 12 COMMISSIONER EVANS: What he's saying is 13 we're going to be relentless. 14 MAYOR KELLY: And not just us, but all the 15 Board of Education members here as well. 16 Anyone else wishing to be heard on agenda 17 items only tonight? 18 Seeing none, we'll move on to ordinance 19 introductions, which we have none, and we'll move on to 20 ordinances on -- oh, wait. I skipped Board of 21 Commissioner Evans? Commissioner Announcements. 22 COMMISSIONER EVANS: Nothing for me this 23 evening. 24 COMMISSIONER TUCCI: It's just one, Mayor. Some of

you may have noticed that there's some silk tents up

around the Mudhole Memorial Park I. That's because the hole raking project is underway. They've begun some preliminary work and that should go on for anywhere from 3 to 6 weeks, weather permitting. So there's nothing wrong, we're just raking it, hopefully to alleviate some flooding and to improve the fishing and mudding. Thank you.

MAYOR KELLY: Thanks.

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Commissioner Scarpelli.

COMMISSIONER SCARPELLI: Press release went out today detailing a pilot program that we're going to have this Saturday on recycling some of the old trash We just want to get a little preliminary containers. game plan on how -- what it's going to take to get these off. So we're going to do that this Saturday and then we'll go from there. We're envisioning a 9-week program dividing the town into 9 sections and going and picking them up, and we'll be recycling those So, it's a pretty monumental task when you containers. look at what it took to deliver the new trash containers. It took over 3 weeks at 12 hours a day, 7 days a week. So, trying to pick those up and now these are all different sizes, we think that's going to be a big undertaking. So, we need to do a little preliminary investigation to see what it's going to

take; what equipment is the best. So just be patient with us and, hopefully, by the end of January we can begin to roll that out throughout the whole town.

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COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: Yes, Mayor. Tonight, I think I'm going to make history for the first time. It's good to have our assemblypeople here to hear it, too. When you think of public safety, you think of always thanking the police, fireman, EMTs, and deservingly so, right? But today as I was driving around, in this 17 years we're up here, I've never thanked the crossing guards. And I have to tell you, it is bitter cold out there. They are friends to our children -- that the Board of Ed is here -- most of them hand out Christmas gifts and birthday presents and, you know, they are seniors for the most part. I have to tell you, a lot of, like, today, if anybody is listening out there, I did put my head down when I was driving by yous because it is so cold, I didn't even know what to say. But I want to give the crossing guards a shout-out because they really have a tough job and earn all kinds of weather. Thank you, Mayor.

MAYOR KELLY: Thank you, and as Commissioner Scarpelli alluded to, we have our new garbage collection system in effect now. It's a new system. As with any new system and any change, there's going to

be some growing pains. If you have any comments or suggestions on how we can better improve it, we are more than willing to listen and feel free to call the Health Department, and thank you Commissioner Scarpelli for assisting in the recycling of the old cans. certainly a team effort.

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We also recently announced we are continuing our second year of the Hometown Hero banners. Any veteran or family of a veteran who's interested in showcasing your loved one who sacrificed -- you have sacrificed with them -- they will be on display throughout the town. And that's open to any Nutley residents, any former Nutley residents who were Nutley residents when they served, if you're a member of any Nutley veteran organization. And, most people don't know this, but going back prior to 1902, Nutley was part of Belleville. So if you are a Spanish-American war veteran or earlier and you're from Belleville, we will honor you as well.

I think that's all the announcements I have for this evening. So, without further ado, I'll turn it back over to Commissioner Evans for ordinances on second reading and public hearings.

COMMISSIONER EVANS: Thank you, Mayor. I'd like to do 3574

Ordinance Number 3574.

and 75 together because they relate to the same piece.

2 Both of these ordinances -- the first is a bond

3 ordinance adoption for \$9.8 million, and the second

5 acquire property in Nutley. Before we have comments,

6 I'm going to share some thoughts about how this all

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came about. So, Al, please bear with me for a moment.

COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: Listen, I'm glad you're picking on the assemblypeople and not me for a change, so thank you guys.

COMMISSIONER EVANS: Yeah. So, and I want -before I start, I want to give a special shout-out. I see Joe Battaglia sitting in the audience. Joe, thank you for being here. Everything that we are talking about tonight, you were instrumental in making sure that it happened. And working with you has been a pleasure, and I can't imagine anyone who has advocated more for the school system to get this deal done than you did, and making sure we addressed all of these Your commitment and involvement was tireless: points. Saturday, Sunday conversations, you know, during the day conversations, the amount of time you gave up from work to do that over the course of this last year is very noteworthy. So, I wanted to say -- you know, you're here, you know, so you deserve some recognition

for the work that you did.

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Tonight, we are taking steps into the future for the benefit of our children and our community. The adoption of the ordinance for \$9.8 million, along with the ordinance to authorize the acquisition of property and ultimately the resolution that we'll read authorizing the mayor to sign the purchase agreement, actually creates a catalyst opportunity for the town that we haven't had before. And, I think, if we didn't take advantage of it, we wouldn't have it again. alternative to not taking a step forward would be something that's completely unacceptable and that would actually result in stagnation. We would not be able to do the things that this purchase allows us to do in cooperation with the school board. And thinking about the principles that we all put in place that we've all worked on under One Nutley to allow us to figure this out, especially given all of the statutory rules that prevent both the municipality and the school board from easily working together. But, you know, where there's a will, there's a way, and you've got to kind of research and go find out what you can do with that. And Justin, you've been helpful in helping us with that as well.

So, by voting on this tonight and adopting

this, we're going to do a few things. We're going to purchase a building at 777 Bloomfield Avenue along with the adjacent parking lot. We're going to add 10 much needed classrooms to the district, which will for now be used for the expansion of the pre-K program which will provide for an additional 90-100 students to enroll in the program by September of '25. But it doesn't stop there. By doing this, it'll enable the reallocation of classroom space in the John Walker Middle School which will ultimately enable the transfer of these students to the middle school by September of So, in the next, roughly, 24 months, the school district will actually leap forward in some things that we've wanted to get done for a long time, one of which has been turning the middle school into a true middle school by having 6, 7, and 8 as part of that program versus just 7 and 8 because of the academic benefits that accrue by making that change in that model.

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What we're doing also, it says, we don't have to spend 80 -- \$70-\$80 million to do it. Right? We're going to do it for about \$10 million in rounded numbers, and not 80, which the Town itself has told us repeatedly that a referendum for that kind of money is unacceptable in this town because it's not affordable. So we listened to that and working together as a team,

we worked through how we can make this thing work in a fashion that works well.

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We also get the Board offices relocated to a permanent space, so they don't have to worry about where they're going to be. We know where exactly they're going to be. They're going to be on the 3rd floor of this building for the foreseeable future.

Everybody, when you talk about this, it's all great, the question is, "Well, how do you pay for it? What's the impact on the taxpayers?" Well, the important part about this is that starting in '26, the school district will pay the municipality the equivalent of \$220,000, which is about the amount of the interest cost on the debt which will be part of our debt service on the municipality's books. So, for the amount of the debt service and using what we call bond anticipation notes versus bonds, right, we'll be able to roll the debt and therefore not incur an increase in our budget on the municipal side, nor an increase on the school side because the money that they we're paying for the lease space on Franklin Avenue, we're accepting that as the money that they would pay us which, when you think about it, a 20,000 square foot building, that comes to about \$11 a square foot. when you think about the economics associated with that

and the value, it's a tremendous new deal.

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In addition to that, you know, in looking out into the future, this note will stay on the municipal books probably until sometime around 2031 through 2032. Once the school board finishes paying off significant debt on their books, and then it will be able to be transferred from our books to their books. The value of that, it says until that time, it's only going to cost the school \$220,000 which isn't any more than what they're paying now. They will be able to eliminate that cost in their budget, operating budget in 2031 because this will become a capital program, and with the pay off of the debt, their capital requirements will be a lot less than what they are right now. overall, it actually results in borrowing the future what might be. It actually reduces the overall cost, the operation of the school district -- which we all know -- school districts, like municipalities, will increase in cost. Well, this is actually creating an opportunity that says, we're going to be meeting our need for pre-K, we're going to advance the middle school, and yet, we're going to actually look at in the future what we create. This creates space to manage the school district better, and then it will come off of the municipality's books and go forward.

If we pay principle down between now and 2031, we will do that by utilizing a pilot funds that were negotiated in 2018 on a building on the Hoffman-La Roche site, right, which included -- when we did the pilot agreement -- it included local taxation for the schools. So we're going to use some of that money for that paydown, right, as we go through this. So the idea is the school doesn't pay any more, the municipality doesn't pay anything, any paydown in debt is actually coming from a commercial taxpayer. not come from a residential taxpayer. So we're keeping it out of the residential tax bill, which is another aspect of this that makes it work.

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But we're not finished because once you move the 6th grade out, that actually opens up space at the elementary level which then allows the school the flexibility to figure out their trailers, but also to expand the rest of the pre-K program and meet the demands that we're -- that's in front of us. Pre-K demand -- we're taking advantage of it because, again, it's not local taxpayer dollars, it's all under state grant. So the quicker we can move on that and secure that grant fund, the safer we are because the state -- you never know when they're going to change a program, so we should take that money as quickly as we can. So

when you think about it, we're not spending \$70-80 million, but we're getting all the benefits that we were looking for if we were to do the referendum, and we're doing that for roughly \$10 million, and we're not taxing the local residential taxpayer any more than what they are right now.

So, overall, I think it's very clear. I think when you come to the end, and you think about what we're doing, and, Carmen, you mentioned it earlier; we're able to invest in our children's future by providing more early development education; we're making the middle school the three-year curricula program a reality which is an intention that's been part of the district for many, many years; and we're doing that without burdening our residential taxpayers. So, it took a lot of work, a lot of negotiation, but it's the right thing to do.

So, with that, we can open it up.

MAYOR KELLY: Before we open it up,

Commissioner, \$10 million is -- or \$9.8 million is a

big price tag. What's going into that \$9.8 million

besides just the acquisition cost?

COMMISSIONER EVANS: Sure. So, when you think about it, we're doing it as an installment purchase agreement. So, we're not going to buy the

building tomorrow, we will buy the building once it's 1 2 fully renovated; however, we're advancing the costs to do the renovations. But if you look at the base 3 acquisition, the parking lot on the corner with the 4 white rocks on it, that's valued at about \$600,000, and 5 the building is valued in the 2.2 range from our 6 7 appraisal. So we're doing -- we're actually buying the asset -- the initial asset -- for about \$2.8 million. 8 9 That's the initial piece. The remaining amount, \$7 million, is what it's going to take to gut the building 10 11 and completely renovate it. It will be internally a brand new building with brand new HVAC systems, and 12 we'll have an improved parking lot, there will be a 13 stop-and-go drop-off for the children, the outside 14 15 playground, all of those improvements that are necessary in order to qualify for state grant funds for 16 the program, that's where that \$7 million go. 17 So we 18 will purchase it once it's done.

We also looked at the fact that the seller has the ability to do these renovations and do it much quicker than if we were to do it through public contracting law which we don't have to do. And the reality is, while we still need to comply with prevailing wage, they're actually moving faster, and they can actually negotiate materials in a faster way

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We're actually saving money. 1 than we can. It was estimated that we're saving on this whole thing if we 2 were to do it ourselves, we're picking up at least a 3 year, and we're saving about a million and a half to do 4 5 it this way. When you think about the \$9.8, that's what we're getting for that. 6 7 MAYOR KELLY: So to put it in simple terms, 8 we're getting -- we're paying for the building, land, 9 and the finished product, and also time. COMMISSIONER EVANS: 10 Yeah. MAYOR KELLY: But we're getting a discount --11 I don't do simple well. 12 COMMISSIONER EVANS: 13 MR. BRUNO: If I can -- just as one point of clarity, I know there was a lot there --14 15 it's an installment contract and the payments will be made upon benchmarks being completed. We're not 16 actually financing the renovation. 17 It will be work 18 that's completed and then payments that are made. 19 MAYOR KELLY: Excellent. So, I think we've laid it all out. I think at this time, we will --20 21 Mr. Bruno, do we need to open the public comments for 22 each one separately, or can we open them together. 23 MR. BRUNO: Open them separately. 24 MAYOR KELLY: Separately? All right. Anyone

Thank you for your work, and we look forward to the 14 15 next two years of making this happen. Thank you. DR. D'ELIA: 16 I did have, also, words prepared, but I have to be honest with you, for the 17 18 sake of sounding redundant, I am coming up here now as not only a Vice-President of the Board of Education, 19 20 but as a father and a community member to really just 21 take a moment to pause and really capture this moment 22 in this community. Our assemblypeople are here, our 23 Board of Commissioners, our Board of Education. 24 is going to change the face of this school district for 25 generations to come, and I think that this moment is

something that we will all be proud of and talk about for the rest of our lives, and hopefully get to pass on to our children and our grandchildren as a moment of inspiration of what a community can do when it comes together. This is something that does not happen. I'm an educator by trade and a Board of Ed member by election, and I will tell you that this is unique, and what we are doing here tonight, I hope, is a shining example to other communities of what can be done when you actually don't just talk about care, but demonstrate care. Come together. Many, many hours of time away from our families, away from our, sometimes -- I don't want to say it too loud -- away from our work, to make this happen. Countless hours.
