19	executive session minutes. We do have a couple
20	proclamations on for this evening, and I think it would
21	be appropriate to take them now at this time.
22	The first one we have on for this evening is
23	jointly proclaimed by not only all the board, but
24	especially by myself and Commissioner Petracco is Black
25	Balloon Day. And I guess what I'll do is I'll read the

1	Proclamation because it kind of explains what Black
2	Balloon Day is. And then I'll say some comments and
3	I'll let anyone else on the Board say some comments and
4	I'll turn it over to Sharon Bozza, who's our
5	director of our Addiction Resource and Recovery Center.
6	Do you want to read any part of this?
7	COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: No, you can do it and
8	I'll second.
9	MAYOR KELLY: Whereas, March 6th is Black
10	Balloon Day, an annual event dedicated to recognizing
11	and celebrating those who have lost their lives to
12	substance overdoses; and
13	Whereas, substance use disorder affects many
14	millions of people and affects all social groups with
15	no discrimination; and
16	Whereas, according to the National Center for
17	Health Statistics (the NCHS), at the Centers for
18	Disease Control and Prevention (the CDC), over 90,000
19	Americans died from substance overdoses in 2024.
20	Whereas, it is proven that the more we talk
21	about substance use disorder, the more we help remove
22	the stigma around seeking out help.
23	Whereas, the Township of Nutley asks
24	residents to recognize this day to not only display
25	black balloon in memory of a lost relative or friend,

but also use the day to open conversations about drug abuse;

And therefore, be it proclaimed by the Board of Commissioners, Township of Nutley, County of Essex, State of New Jersey, that March 6th be declared Black Balloon Day in the Township of Nutley, and we pay solemn tribute to those lost to addiction and also encourage open conversation to support those suffering from addiction.

Be it further proclaimed that the Nutley
Department of Public Affairs and Health offers a free
substance use disorder resource center for individuals
seeking information regarding counseling,
rehabilitation centers, emergency, non-emergency,
inpatient, outpatient, self-help hotlines, mental
health assistance, et cetera, will be able to obtain
this collection of materials both digitally and in
print.

So that's the proclamation. I want to add personally that, you know, one more life is too many to lose based on addiction. Commissioner Petracco and I are working together on this. It's not just a policing issue, but it's a health issue. It's a mental health issue. We have mental health services in the Health Department. We have addiction resource services in the

Health Department. If you need help, there is no shame. This is a stigma-free town. Come and ask for it. If you don't feel comfortable going to the cops, come to the Health Department. If you don't feel comfortable going to the Health Department, you feel more comfortable going to the cops, go to the Police Department. There is no shame in asking for help. Please, if you need help, come get it. It's there, it's available, please seek out the help.

I'll turn it over to Commissioner Petracco and then I'll turn it over to the --

applaud everybody in this room for coming out tonight and, you know, celebrating the people who have lost their life. And I could ask or make a statement of, whose family does an addiction affect, right? It's in every single family, including mine. And, you know, you see that poor soul struggling through it on the corner, in the alleyway, in mansions and in poor areas, wherever that person is, because we all know that drugs and alcohol and any type of mental illness and addiction, that's the one thing that doesn't discriminate for sure.

And I just like to say that, you know, those people that people see, it's easy to pass judgment on

I know firsthand. They do definitely not want to be that way. So instead of people judging them, maybe you reach out and you find it in your heart or somebody else's heart to help them because, I could tell you firsthand, it is really hard to put that addiction away, you know, for people who use.

So I just like to say, God bless. My mother used to say this to me all the time. You know, people don't leave you ever on this Earth. Look for them.

You know where they'll be? Right in your heart. Thank you.

COMMISSIONER EVANS: Thank you, Mayor.

Just a couple thoughts. One is that I think the Board collectively is very proud that we actually designated Nutley as a stigma-free town initially. It's wonderful that the Public Affairs Department has taken a step forward in this very serious area. I know the police department not only has been active on the frontline with this, but also on the early side by, you know, school intervention, you know, having relationships with kids to actually make sure that we try and cut it off. And I think, probably, you know, aside from those that are addicted, today there are more and more influences out there where it's readily

available to actually to get exposed to and, I'll use the word experimentation, give it a try, you know, see what it feels like which then leads to other things that are more --much more serious.

I can, you know, relate that specifically in my own family, where my nephew is away at school as a freshman and actually spent a week at home because he went to a party, a college party, and thought it was the right thing to do because everybody was doing it and wound up getting very sick and had to come home. And it related to being exposed to something that was inside of a drink that he didn't know what was in it and it actually had a very negative reaction.

So I think not only should we be looking at, you know, overdose and addiction, but anything that we can do to put out -- to put a brighter light on experimentation on the early side of intervention. And I know, Al, you've been after this, you know, God knows how -- I don't know how many years for this, but the more we can stay focused on that, I think the better our children are going to be.

I'm saddened every time I hear about, you know, a radio call where somebody has to go out and they've had to, you know, Narcan, you know, somebody.

I lost my niece from one of these incidents and my

cousin from one of the -- from one of these incidents,
and I think it's ever present in everybody's lives. So
always, we need to stay focused on this.

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COMMISSIONER TUCCI: I'd just like to commend both the Health Department and the Public Safety Department for taking this initiative and raising awareness. No one wants to be addicted to any substance, all right? It's a sickness. It's an illness. It's something that needs to be talked about. It's something that needs to -- that our children need to be made aware of at a very young age, so they know to stay away from, all right? And like Al said, no one wants to be an addict. No one wants to be addicted to anything. So I just commend you on all your hard work and however any of us can help, we always stand ready to jump in.

COMMISSIONER SCARPELLI: Yeah. For those of us who have lost a loved one to drugs and abuse, any kind of raising awareness is certainly something that we should do and glad you guys are taking the lead on this. Thank you.

MAYOR KELLY: At this time, I'd like to bring up Sharon Bozza, who is our director of our Addiction Resource and Recovery Center here in town.

MS. BOZZA: Excuse my back to you while I

speak to the audience.

Hi, everybody. My name is Sharon and I'd like to welcome you here tonight. Black Balloon Day is a time where people come together to pay tribute to those who have been lost to an overdose. It involves uniting and advocating for overdose prevention. It's a powerful reminder of the importance of supporting an individual struggle with addiction and working toward a future free from the devastation of overdose deaths.

Addiction does not define a person; it just describes what a person has. A person's addiction represents only a very small part of that person's life. Addiction recovery is not easy, but it helps when a community understands and becomes actively involved.

As the opioid epidemic in the US has grown, the need for increased awareness and education around substance use disorder is so very important. Harm reduction is a set of practical strategies and ideas aimed at reducing negative consequences associated with drug use. The Department of Public Affairs and Health is always available to assist with harm reduction methods. We have a resource recovery center, as our mayor said, and all are welcome to stop by, pick up some literature along with lifesaving supplies to help

in an overdose crisis

For all of those who have lost a loved one to this disease, please know in your heart that we stand with you, we support you, and we pray with you and we pray for you as you travel your journey. May you always have hope and know in your heart that one day you will meet again.

The white balloons behind me do represent the hope we must all keep in our hearts. Everyone with a black balloon or would like to stand and join us, would you please come to the center aisle and kind of make a line. All the white balloons who want to join us as well.

MAYOR KELLY: Okay. I -- we have another proclamation on for this evening, and it's one to celebrate the 100 years and it's 100 years to the day of the founding of Mount Carmel Church. And we want to recognize them for their service to this community for a hundred years now.

This proclamation declares March 4th, 1925
the 100th anniversary of the founding of Our Lady of
Mount Carmel Church. We declare this day of
remembrance to honor the 100 years of service and
faithful witnesses to the Nutley community and beyond.

Whereas, originally, the church was built to serve the small Polish community and was located on Franklin Avenue.

Whereas, a new church as constructed at the corner of Prospect Street and Harrison Street in 1949, known as the "Little Church on the Hill".

Whereas, the current church mission statement is as follows, "Our mission as a holy parish is to communicate and celebrate the life and spirit of Jesus by our words and actions in order to build a dynamic, loving, caring and outreaching community of faith."

Whereas, the Centennial theme is "Century of

1	Faith, Love and community Through Mary".
2	And therefore, be it proclaimed that the
3	Board of Commissioners, in the Township of Nutley,
4	County of Essex, State of New Jersey declare March 4th,
5	2025, the 100th Year Anniversary of Our Lady of Mount
6	Carmel. So proclaimed,
7	I just want to add, you know, Father Alex is
8	the pastor there now. I know he was originally
9	previously at Holy Family. He hasn't been there the
10	full 100 years, but I do want to congratulate him and
11	his community, and I wish him another a hundred years
12	of continuing to success. And I hope he's here in a
13	hundred years to get the 200-year anniversary
14	proclamation. Anyone else want to say any?

on agenda items only. If you wish to be heard on agenda items only, please approach the microphone and state your name for the record.

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MR. PEABODY: Evening. My name's Kyle Peabody. I'm a resident taxpayer and rate payer in Nutley of the Sewer and Water Commission. I see on tonight's agenda, there's a motion to move back almost \$600,000 that was not expended in the Water and Sewer Commission from the last year. I live at the Gateway Condominiums in Nutley down River Road. We've been in contact with the Board on numerous occasions. I sent an email to the Water and Sewer Commission and the entire Board on January 9th. I did receive a response from Sal Ferraro, who I understand is one of the directors there. It was very kind response on January 10th saying it was under review. I followed up via phone on January 30th. I sent letters via certified US Mail January 24th and January 31st. I had sent additional emails January 24th, February 19th, and February 21st to all of you. I use read receipts, so I know at least some of you got them. I haven't received any response to any of those.

Gateway is billed at the commercial rate.

It's a residential structure. You all have my emails, which highlight all of this, so I won't waste all our

time, but it's an entirely residential structure. The entire community is paying double the residential rate because we're being billed at the commercial rate. As far as I can tell, there's no other municipality in the entire tri-state region that bills commercial rates at twice the residential rates for water and sewer. I don't know why they made that -- you guys made that decision, that's your prerogative, but it did seem interesting to me that there's some municipalities where there's a slight upcharge for commercial. I can see where that would be, but double seems a bit excessive.

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We're also clearly not a commercial property. We're entirely residential. Many of our residents are senior, fixed income, lower income. We're definitely one of the more affordable areas in town. This is RHOA, which manages the entire facility and property. Our total budget's about \$400,000 a year. Just these bill increases this past July increases our annual budget by about \$120,000. So for the average unit there, it's about a \$3,000 a year increase for water and sewer that we were already receiving and paying for, and that the town advertised as a way to be more fair. So I don't see how there's any fairness in this deal. I don't understand why we're unable to get a

response. I know I'm not the only one who's reached out. I'm disappointed we have to come to a public meeting to be able to address you directly to have this brought up. I think it's embarrassing for the town and, frankly, I think it -- it's a sideway to continue to push away affordable units like ours.

We're not regulated affordable housing.

We're not any of those Section 8 or anything like that.

We're it's all privately owned. And it's not a co-op,

it's not owned by some corporation apartments. They're

all individual units. It's just because they were

built in the '60s, the town only put in three water

mains to it instead of 94 or however many units we

have. It's completely unreasonable. I won't believe

to be put in 94 meters now. So the only ask is town

respond and be reasonable in this situation.

And based off of the fact that, apparently, there's \$600,000 extra, I'm guessing there's other units -- other groups in town that are similarly situated to ours and I don't think that's fair for them either. So I hope that the Board will really take a look at this with the Water and Sewer Commission and address this in an appropriate way so that -- the bottom line is we're going to have people moving out of their units probably at short sales because they can't

afford these bills; \$3,000 just for water and sewer you're already using. So hope you can bring this to your attention. Thank you.

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MAYOR KELLY: Thank you. And we certainly don't want anyone moving out of their properties. I will turn this over to Commissioner Scarpelli for comment.

COMMISSIONER SCARPELLI: Mr. Peabody, thank you for your comments. And as Mr. Ferraro works for me, he did respond as far as it's under review. is under review. We're looking at the ordinance. I can say that anything over five families and above is being billed at that tiered rate. So it's not just your complex; it's any multi-family complex that's over five families. Some of the issues that we found is, without individual meters, it's very difficult to even see if there's leaks in -- I don't know how many units are down at Gateway, but we won't know if there's any leaks because there's not individual meters there. So it's hard to tell how much of that water is being used. A multifamily dwelling also puts in more waste, more chemicals than a one, two, or three, four-family home. So I want you to look at all -- you know, we're looking It's under review, but that's some of the at it. reasons that there's that tiered rate.

1	COMMISSIONER EVANS: And I just would add the
2	resolution tonight is not to is not a refund. It's
3	actually canceling balances that were unnecessary
4	because if we didn't cancel them, we'd actually be
5	have a deficit in the utility and we'd have to, through
6	the operating budget, contribute that \$590,000 that
7	we're canceling tonight. So in the transition, it was
8	a bit of over budgeting that we needed to cancel. And
9	so it's not that we have money that we collected; it's
10	just expenses that we didn't have to pay. If we had to
11	pay, we would actually have a deficit.

So if you think about it 1 very simply is that if you had collected a hundred 2 dollars -- if you had budgeted a hundred dollars and 3 you collected \$60, right, we would have to add in \$40 4 However, it wasn't a correct 5 for a real budget. budget, so I'm able to cancel those balances out, which 6 7 avoids the deficit. If I don't do that, then we have to contribute that \$590,000 out of the operating 8 9 budget, which is the equivalent of \$59 per household. So I'm canceling it out to basically bring the utility 10 11 back into balance because it has to equal. So it's just basically an accounting 12 Mr. Peabody, I heard you. 13 mechanism. It's not the money we collect that's being refunded. 14 It's just 15 basically a budgeting error that needs to be corrected because the rates did not accommodate that --16 collecting that amount of money. So that's all I was 17 18 trying to explain. 19 We are looking at changes to the ordinance. I know this is -- our draft change is coming. 20 21

I know this is -- our draft change is coming. I don't
know what all those changes will be, but I would think,
in the next couple weeks, there'll be a revised
ordinance coming out. Everything and I -- and one of
the things that's really clear, the sewer bill, which
was \$4.2 million last year in total, we received a new

bill for 25, which was 4,700,000 and some thousand dollars, so it went up. You know, quite a bit of money.

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So while we have those sewer increases, one of the challenges we have is how do we figure out the -- and I agree with you, fairness and equity, trying to figure that out and get as close as we can to However, it does run the risk that once you get done making all of the adjustments because people have said, oh, I use a garden hose, right? But I don't even get a credit for a garden hose. Well, my sprinkler doesn't give me enough of a credit. There's everything that people are raising to try and lower that bill. We make all those corrections, which all of them, as we identify them, will be made. The net result will be in an increase in the rate. The rate will have to go up because we have to pay that bill. And so make -- we have to make sure that the rates will make sure that over the course of the year, we collect the sewer bill, which that one item alone went up quite a bit.

COMMISSIONER SCARPELLI: And that's not under our control.

COMMISSIONER EVANS: No, we get a bill. We get a bill. It says it's just a bill in the mail. And what does it relate to? The processing of the sewage

for the town, the chemical treatments that are 1 required, the EPA requirements that are associated with 2 that, but also people -- you know, today, we're all 3 suffering with this. Way back when we could look at 4 5 9/11, right? And then how terrible that was, but many of our utilities, you know, the electric utilities, 6 7 water utilities, gas utilities, sewer utilities, 8 everybody had to increase their bonding to reinforce 9 their facilities against a threat, right? Whether or not that threat has materialized or could materialize, 10 that's what they did. All that bonding is being paid 11 for by us taxpayers, and it comes to us in the form of 12 a bill. We don't set the rate. 13 The rate is set by the Public Utility Commission and we just get a bill for 14 15 So it's just a function of the reality of the 16 life. BOZZA: redundant, but this is about the water and sewerage as 4 5 well because it's difficult to hear you people up here, honestly. But I had somebody, we went through these 6 water bills. And from what we can ascertain, we were 7 paying \$4.04 a unit before, and now we're paying \$4.59 8 9 a unit, or whatever you call it, for water. And that's -- that's 55 cents an addition. 10 Also, we were paying \$9 for insurance on piping, and now we're paying 11 It was very nice to sneak that in when you 12 \$10.50. raised the bill. 13 Also, I have some bills where I'm paying more 14 15 for sewerage than I'm paying for water. How is that possible? 16 And where on my tax bill can you show me --17 since I'm paying sewerage on these bills, where can you 18 show me that it was deducted from my taxes since we were paying it before? 19 So we certainly didn't sneak 20 MAYOR KELLY: 21 And I'll turn it over to both -anything in. Well, nobody --22 MS. BOZZA: 23 MAYOR KELLY: -- commissioner --

you were raising anything, that you were, you know,

We never got a letter saying

MS. BOZZA:

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1 going to raise the tax -- not the tax, but the insurance on the piping or whatever it's called. 2 MAYOR KELLY: Well, I'll let Commissioner 3 Evans and Commissioner Scarpelli speak on that --4 MRS. BOZZA: You know, it's really --5 MAYOR KELLY: -- point real fast. 6 7 MRS. BOZZA: -- I have hearing aids and 8 can't even hear you. 9 MAYOR KELLY: I'll speak louder. Sure. I'11 10 let --11 MRS. BOZZA: Yeah. -- Commissioner Evans or 12 MAYOR KELLY: 13 Commissioner Scarpelli speak on that, whoever wishes to go first. 14 15 COMMISSIONER SCARPELLI: I'll go first. 16 Ms. Bozza, I do want to express my condolences to you on the loss of your husband. 17 18 Oh, thank you. MRS. Bozza: 19 COMMISSIONER SCARPELLI: You know, as the Mayor said, we didn't sneak anything in. You know, we 20 21 had public hearings on this. The ordinance was It was taken out of tax bill. 22 changed. I'll let 23 Commissioner Evans explain that. The water and sewer

are two different bills based on what we get charged

for water through our purveyors, Passaic Valley Water,

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Newark Water, and North Jersey Water, in addition to our employees that are working in the Water Department.

The sewer, as Commissioner Evans explained before, we get a bill from Passaic Valley for \$4.6 million. We have to pay that and we divided that up. Not us, but our auditors on the initial -- we've only been doing this for six months, you know, so we took educated guess at what the rate should be to pay those bills. And it looks like, you know, we fell a little short last year because some things we didn't consider. And so that rate may have to be adjusted, especially as we change the ordinance going forward. But certainly, it was to make it more equitable based on usage rather than based on property values. And that was the reason that -- one of the big reasons that we changed it.

MRS. BOZZA: So are you saying that you're -whatever bill you get, you're dividing it or however
you do it, it -- it's not how much I use, it's how much
you just determined we should --

COMMISSIONER SCARPELLI: No, no. It's how much you use based on your water consumption. But that's also -- we have to look at what we have to Passaic Valley Sewage to treat that sewage. So, basically, water in water out to determine what you're

So somebody who has a house that has a 1 using, right? big family of five, they're going to use more water and 2 produce more sewage, so they're going to pay more. 3 Somebody with a house that has, you know, two empty 4 5 nesters in it, they're going to pay less because they're using less water. But at the end of the day, 6 7 whatever we collect, we have to Passaic -- we have to 8 pay Passaic Valley Sewage Commission the \$4.6 million. 9 MRS. BOZZA: Well, how was it possible that 10 before when we were paying it in our taxes, you were able to meet the bill and now you have to charge us 11 12 extra? COMMISSIONER SCARPELLI: 13 Because it was taken out -- I'll let Commissioner Evans explain it. 14 15 taken out of -- it was taken out of your tax bill. 16 MRS. BOZZA: I'm sorry? COMMISSIONER SCARPELLI: It was taken out 17 18 of --19 MRS. BOZZA: Of our tax bill. 20 COMMISSIONER SCARPELLI: -- your tax bill. 21 MRS. BOZZA: Yeah. 22 COMMISSIONER SCARPELLI: You're not paying 23 for sewage. You're not paying that 4.6 million out of 24 your --Oh, really? Where does it shows MRS. BOZZA: 25 that we

1 get a rebate on that --COMMISSIONER SCARPELLI: Well --2 MRS. BOZZA: 3 -- or that we get a (indiscernible) --4 5 COMMISSIONER SCARPELLI: Again, maybe not a rebate, but your taxes didn't go up as much as they 6 7 could have. 8 COMMISSIONER EVANS: So, Mrs. Bozza, just to 9 echo what Commissioner Scarpelli has said -- and I'm 10 trying to speak louder because I tend to speak softer, but just raise up your head if you can't hear me. 11 did remove half the cost of what the sewer utility 12 13 would have to operate with, both the sewer bill as well as the operating costs, which would include the salary 14 15 and wages of the people that work in that area, the 16 insurance costs associated with that, the pension All those costs have to go into there. 17 costs. What we 18 did last year was we estimated what that half of that bill would be and transferred that to the utility. 19 Because I was concerned that we would not collect all 20 21 the revenue that we needed to collect because it was a startup, I reduced the benefit -- they have the -- part 22 23 of the benefit coming out by \$513,000 to cover our

revenue billing shortfall, which I'm grateful that we

did because we actually did have a transitional issue

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with billings because, as Commissioner Scarpelli said, we're only operating six months.

There is a presentation of the budget presented last year online, which lays out and shows what our total expenditures were for the year and how much was transferred out of the budget for the sewer utility. Unfortunately, last year, we had an increase in the taxes to everybody because other costs went up far greater than the transfer out of the money to the sewer utility. So you would think that the budget would go down, which it did. Half the cost went down last year for the transfer out to the sewer utility. However, other costs went up quite a bit and completely offset that.

And as Joe mentioned, that while we had an increase last year of -- I think it was around 83 or \$87, I don't remember off the top of my head, but it was below a hundred dollars. If we didn't transfer out what we would've transferred out, that increase would've been well over \$250. So we -- by the transfer out, the property tax increase was lower last year, but it was an increase. It did not go down.

MRS. BOZZA: But in essence, you really raised our taxes.

25 COMMISSIONER EVANS: Didn't raise your --

1	MRS. BOZZA: Well, this it's not called
2	tax, but it's a tax because we have to pay it, so
3	COMMISSIONER EVANS: Well but yeah. So
4	all of those costs were in the regular operating
5	budget. So if we left them in there, then your
6	taxes the a your tax increase would've been up
7	for the average house paying about \$12,500 in taxes,
8	that average the municipal increase would've been
9	over \$250 on that one house. It would by taking
10	this out, it was only 87.
11	MRS. BOZZA: You're chasing us out of this
12	town, I'll tell you. Little by little I don't mean
13	you personally, but, little by little, you're chasing
14	us out of this town because we can't afford to live
15	here anymore. And I was born and raised in this town,
16	but I'm I I just can't afford to live here.
17	COMMISSIONER EVANS: Mrs. Bozza, I
18	understand that. I appreciate that.
19	MRS. BOZZA: And the older you get, the
20	harder it gets.
21	
22	COMMISSIONER EVANS: It is hard. I agree with you.
23	
24	MRS. BOZZA: Yeah. COMMISSIONER EVANS: But please go online
25	and also

1 MRS. BOZZA: We don't need to put those Christmas trees in front of the town hall, all this 2 nonsense and, you know, change -- everything has to 3 Why can't things just stay as they are? 4 change. As 5 long as they're useful and they're -- they're -they're okay, leave it the way it is. 6 7 COMMISSIONER EVANS: Yeah, I would love 8 and --9 I mean, you know, people like MRS. BOZZA: myself on a fixed budget, it's really difficult to live 10 11 here. 12 COMMISSIONER EVANS: I truly appreciate that, 13 Mrs. Bozza, more than you know. I've worked very hard --14 15 MRS. BOZZA: I'm not the only one. Lots of 16 people complain --17 COMMISSIONER EVANS: I --18 MS. ABAZA: -- but they don't come here to complain. 19 20 COMMISSIONER EVANS: Are you part of the 21 Property Tax Freeze Program? 22 MRS. BOZZA: Pardon? 23 COMMISSIONER EVANS: Are you part of the 24 New Jersey Property Tax Freeze Program? MRS. BOZZA: Well, how come other towns in in 25

1 New Jersey have much lower tax rates? COMMISSIONER EVANS: 2 Nutley's not high by 3 comparison. 4 MRS. BOZZA: Not high? COMMISSIONER EVANS: 5 No. In Essex County, Absolutely not. 6 no. MRS. BOZZA: You could've had me fooled. 7 COMMISSIONER EVANS: Yeah. But sometimes I 8 9 get fooled too, but it's certainly seriously not. But I do --10 MRS. BOZZA: (Indiscernible) thousand in 11 12 You think that's -- that's not -- that's -taxes. that's easy to pay? 13 No, it's not because I 14 COMMISSIONER EVANS: 15 pay more than that. But Mrs. Bozza, my -- I want -it's an important question, please. 16 If you are not a 17 member of the New Jersey Property Tax Freeze Program 18 and you're over 65 years old, which you may be, I'm not 19 sure. Right? 20 MS. ABAZA: I am old . 21 Well, 65-years-old. COMMISSIONER EVANS: 22 MS. ABAZA: (Indiscernible). Yeah, you're older. 23 COMMISSIONER EVANS: And

you earn less than \$163,000 a year, you are eligible to

have your taxes frozen. But there's a new program this

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year that says, if you are already in the freeze program, there's a new program that's called the Stay in New Jersey Program, which actually is a new benefit that will be paid in '26.

MRS. BOZZA: (Indiscernible) --

COMMISSIONER EVANS: Yeah. If I could yeah. --

COMMISSIONER EVANS: If I could answer that question, I would've accepted the job as the New Jersey State Treasurer. But unfortunately, you can't fix what's broken. But the answer is, there is a new program for seniors that increases the benefit. It says, if you're collecting through the anchor program and the freeze program less than \$6,500, and you make less than a half a million dollars a year, this year there's a new application which maybe might be a benefit for you. And if that is a benefit for you, please stop by and see my tax collector. She'll help you through it.

MRS. BOZZA: Going to need a lawyer to fill out the paper work.

COMMISSIONER EVANS: It's -- well, we'll help you do that. You don't need to do that.

MS. RABINO: With the tax freeze, what's the amount of money that you are allowed to earn.

1 COMMISSIONER EVANS: \$163,000 from all 2 sources. (Indiscernible). 3 MS. RABINO: COMMISSIONER EVANS: Ms. Rabino (phonetic), 4 5 today we have over 200 -- excuse me, I mean, 2,000 homes and remotely are part of the freeze program. 6 And 7 because of the new program, more seniors will 8 participate; more, many more. 9 MAYOR KELLY: And I just would like to add that a lot of those costs increases that 10 Commissioner Evans spoke about are costs well beyond 11 12 our control. They're costs set by the State. Commissioner Evans mentioned earlier this evening, the 13 bill from PVSC went up from four to 4.6 million. 14 15 these are costs that we can control. it's just the nature of living in New Jersey. These costs are 16 arising, especially with the inflation going on. 17 18 Anyone else wishing to be heard on public comment? Thank you. 19 COMMUNITY MEMBER MATT: Hi there. I live up on Highfield Lane. 20 My name is Matt. 21 stopped by late last year just as a volunteer with 22 Voter Choice New Jersey. We're a advocacy organization 23 looking to spread awareness of rank choice voting in 24 municipalities around the State. Last year, Maplewood, 25 South Orange, and Montclair all adopted resolutions

1	supporting rank choice voting. And this is important
2	because we want to show the State government that they
3	should empower municipalities to adopt rank choice
4	voting. It's used in New York City. We'll see it in
5	the oral elections. It's used in the Oscars. It
6	proves to be broadly popular across the political
7	spectrum. It helps reduce toxic partisanship in
8	elections because constituents can rank their choices
9	and it produces the need for costly runoffs. I have
10	several little cards with QR codes, more information.
11	I hope to be at the Farmer's market this spring and
12	spreading some more information. I'd be happy to leave
13	some of these with each of you and hopefully have the
14	chance to maybe work on a resolution for Nutley.

14 you know, like, you know, someone -- some individuals

15 up here, are they really coming after me? It makes me

16 wonder.

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17 I invited once again Carl Lordi, Louie

18 Ritacco. If Dave Gosel (phonetic) was alive, he would

19 be here as well, just to once again reiterate to all of

20 you how this nightmare that I'm living started. All

21 these men, you all know well. I know Carl gave the

22 congregation or, you know, one or two of you a -- you

23 know, your fundraisers. Everyone knows Dave Gosel. I

24 believe you all know Louie Ritacco. I don't think any

of them have any hard feelings towards you or me. I

- don't think anyone of them would lie for me, especially
 -- especially Carl, who's a pastor, okay? I cannot
 emphasize again -- and this will be the last time I
 come here, okay? I can't emphasize, you know, again,
 this nightmare I'm living, okay?
 - So I got a few questions to start with, if you don't mind, or a -- a few things I want to bring to light again. Ordinance Number 3439, introduced by Mayor Scarpelli. If you're not -- if you don't remember this ordinance, okay, it was the Chapter 349, flood damage prevention. Page 11, Section A, 4.3, it clearly states that the responsibility of the flood administrator is to inform anyone who's going for permit whether or not a piece of property is in a floodway. It's clear as day.
- Mr. Scarpelli, do you recall this ordinance?

 COMMISSIONER SCARPELLI: I do not, Mr.
- 18 Auriemma.

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- MR. AURIEMMA: Okay. Well, it was
 introduced by you with probably, you know, all good,
 you know, intentions. It was approved by most of you.
 Mr. Kelly -- Mayor Kelly, I don't think you were here
 during that time.
- It's clear as day that this order says that
 the flood administrator was to inform me whether or not

this land was in a floodway. Unfortunately, and I 1 don't believe purposely, he made a mistake. 2 I'm going to reiterate again that your township engineer that you 3 guys paid for wrote a report regarding this property. 4 5 In this report, he too never mentioned floodway, but just was clear that this property was in a flood zone 6 7 and approved for one-family house. 8 I want to -- I want to turn my attention to 9 Commissioner Evans. Commissioner Evans, why -- why did you run for office? Can you just elaborate shortly 10 or -- what was your purpose of serving the people in 11 Why -- what made you run for office? 12 Nutley? 13 MAYOR KELLY: I'm just going to -- all questions should be addressed to me as the --14 15 MR. AURIEMMA: Okay. MAYOR KELLY: -- Chair of the Board. 16 And if appropriate, I'll refer to the appropriate 17 18 commissioner. 19 No, I just want to know what MR. AURIEMMA: was the -- I'm -- I mean, I'm not attacking you, but 20 21 what was your purpose of running for office? COMMISSIONER EVANS: If you pick up any of my 22 23 campaign literature, it lays well all out. I -- my 24 expertise is in financial areas and I thought that I

can contribute to the town in a positive way.

1 MR. AURIEMMA: Okay. And -- and I believe that that was your purpose. In your department, okay, 2 you are in charge of the building, the construction 3 department, correct? 4 5 COMMISSIONER EVANS: Yes. MR. AURIEMMA: 6 Are you -- are you aware of 7 the process of getting a permit -- a building permit to build a home? 8 9 COMMISSIONER EVANS: Mr. Auriemma, I'm -- I am going to caution you on your line of questioning. 10 11 You're allowed to make a comment. 12 MR. AURIEMMA: Okay. COMMISSIONER EVANS: You're not allowed to 13 interrogate the commissioner --14 15 MR. AURIEMMA: Well, I'm -- I'm not interrogating you. 16 I'm --17 COMMISSIONER EVANS: And I'm also --18 MR. AURIEMMA: Okay. 19 COMMISSIONER EVANS: I'm doing it not as a 20 request; it's a warning. 21 I want to jump in because we're MR. BRUNO: 22 happy to have anyone come up --23 MR. AURIEMMA: Okay. 24 MR. BRUNO: -- during the public comment

- 2 MR. AURIEMMA: Okay.

- 13 have not been disrespectful at all.
- 14 MR. BRUNO: You are. (Indiscernible).
- MR. AURIEMMA: I'm not disrespecting you.
- 16 I'm just trying to lead to a point.
- 17 MR. BRUNO: But I just want to save you the
- 18 | time --
- MR. AURIEMMA: Okay.
- 20 MR. BRUNO: -- because I have instructed all
- 21 of the commissioners not to discuss
- 22 this matter --
- MR. AURIEMMA: Okay.
- MR. BRUNO: -- because (indiscernible).
- MR. AURIEMMA: Okay.

So I don't want you to have to 1 MR. BRUNO: ask questions (indiscernible). 2 MR. AURIEMMA: Well, I -- I'm going to ask 3 you anyway because I have the right to do so, okay? 4 5 And if you refuse not to answer, then shame on you, then you shouldn't be sitting up there because you're 6 7 not brave enough to answer questions. So anyway, I 8 wasn't trying to be disrespectful. I don't know. 9 Maybe you're taking it personally. Maybe you have something to hide. Who knows? But let me just explain 10 to you the process, okay? When you go for a building 11 12 permit in the Township of Nutley, you have to submit 13 plans, okay? The plans are reviewed, okay? You know, are you familiar with the code fees in Nutley? 14 15 is he allowed to answer that? No. 16 COMMISSIONER EVANS: Yeah, I know what the 17 fees are. 18 MS. AURIEMMA: Okay. Code fees, Hudson Soil

MS. AURIEMMA: Okay. Code fees, Hudson Soil
(phonetic), are you familiar with all that?

COMMISSIONER EVANS: Hudson Soil, no. But the code fee, yes.

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MS. AURIEMMA: Well, these are things that you need to get when you build a house in this township, okay? These things will never ever be requested if a property is unbuildable. There's no

need to do it. There's no need to submit plans, 1 there's no need to get engineering reports, okay? 2 I have canceled checks. I got checks made out to the 3 township; code fee, Hudson fee, permit fee that the 4 5 township made me pay because they thought that this property was buildable. I just can't see how you guys 6 7 don't see this. How the township -- you know, I believe the township is -- is really extremely liable. 8 9 The negligence that happened, not purposely, has destroyed me, okay? And I -- I don't understand why 10 you're taking it personally. I'm just trying to tell 11 12 you, you know, like -- I mean, do you not recognize --13 do you not recognize this? That the township made me do A to Z when I didn't have to do anything because the 14 15 lot was supposedly unbuildable. That the township made 16 me revise my -- my permits. That the township made me hire an engineer. That the township paid a township 17 18 engineer to review my plans, to give me the okay, only 19 to tell me two months later, no. I mean, is this not like -- I -- I don't get it. Does no -- does no one 20 21 not recognize this? MAYOR KELLY: Mr. Auriemma, you're out of 22 23 time. But I do want to say that, you know, I've worked 24 with Commissioner Evans for a number of years now. 25 While we may not always see eye to eye, I don't think

1	it's appropriate to insinuate that he has something to
2	hide. You know, you're in litigation with the town.
3	The town is free to take its position. You're free to
4	take your position. And Mr. Bruno can correct me if
5	I'm wrong, but I believe we've offered you to come to
6	mediation. And we're happy to sit at the table and
7	talk about what would make this situation right. And
8	if there's any faults, to make it right.
9	MR. AURIEMMA: And I believe that we met a
10	month ago.
11	MAYOR KELLY: Well, that was just a meeting
12	with your attorney, with our attorney, but I believe
13	we've offered to come to mediation, have a neutral
14	arbiter to take a look at this, and say if and where
15	there's fault.
16	MR. AURIEMMA: Well, it like, I again,
17	you guys are the leaders of this township, okay? You
18	took an oath to do the right thing. I just can't see
19	like again, it takes one of you to make a motion,
20	two of you to agree to settlement and I'm done. The
21	nightmare with this township is done.
22	COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: If I may,
23	Mayor, I
24	MAYOR KELLY: Go ahead.
25	COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: I think
-	that's what the

a step, going through an exercise, and maybe that there could be some kind of resolution on this, you know.

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MAYOR KELLY: Right. And especially having it come from a neutral person because you've come here several times and you talked about your history with many of these commissioners. Well, when I say these commissioners, many of us. And it looks like there could be some sort of untoward dealing going on. Where if we go to a neutral arbiter, it -- and the neutral arbiter says, this would be a fair settlement for this matter, it gives us the appropriate, I guess, backdrop to say, you know, there's -- and to prove to the tenant there is no unfair dealing going on.

You know, I respectfully MR. AURIEMMA: You guys are the leaders of this township. disagree. Like I told all of you, every time you cast a vote, whether you say yes, you're going to upset the no; whether you say no, you're going to upset the people that want yes. I'm just asking you, as elected officials to -- you know, to recognize this and make a decision what you think is right, okay? I can't -again, if this was your son and daughter up here, this would never have gone two-and-a-half years, okay? Never. This would've been done already. I mean, if I could have just two more minutes of your time and then 1 I'll stop.

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MAYOR KELLY: Can you wrap it up in one?
Well, you've already twice exceeded the limit. Just
get to the point and --

MR. AURIEMMA: Well, I'm going to feel pressured, but, you know what, I just like -- like I said, I have a -- a -- a lot of things that I've done and able to build in this township, to build a home. And again, the process of building a home is A to Z. Nutley made me do almost A to Z. I -- I stopped at Z, only to tell me, you know, two-and-a-half months, three months later, oops, we made a mistake. You can't build It's in the floodway. Again, I cannot, again here. reiterate three people that all of you know well came to this township to inquire about this land for me to purchase. All these people were told the same thing. It's a buildable lot. Yes, you could build here. It's Zone R -- R -- it's Zone R1.

I mean, you guys at the township, Mr. Evans, you know, went to to buy something, you get a CO. The township gave me a CO that clearly says it's Zone R1 building. I mean, why -- why did the township give me the CO if I couldn't build on it? And I guess, you know, let me close -- in closure, this way I could just stop talking.

I mean, I hope this is a -- a -- a teachable 1 moment for you, Mr. Evans, as the leader of this 2 department to say, listen guys, we made a mistake here, 3 We -- you know, I -- you know, not everyone that 4 okay? works for your department lives in Nutley. 5 Nutley guy, okay? My brothers live here. 6 My children 7 live here. We have a business in town. This is a 8 teachable moment for you to say, let's sit down. Where 9 did we mess up here? This should never happen to I don't know. 10 anyone ever again. Have you done that yet? Or it's just -- it doesn't -- like, I don't get 11 I mean, it just -- I don't know. 12 I ran for council 13 Again, I sat in that seat. I don't know, maybe I'm different. 14 years ago. But if 15 this ever happened on my watch, I would be sitting down in my department saying, listen, we need to fix what's 16 We put this poor guy and his family through 17 wrong. 18 hell. And I can assure you, I'm pretty sure that 19 nothing has been done about this since this happened to 20 Just -- any comments? I don't know. me. 21 Well, like I said, we all feel MAYOR KELLY: 22 We all -for you. 23 MR. AURIEMMA: I don't know about that; two-24 and-a-half years. 25 MAYOR KELLY: -- it's an unfortunate

- 1 situation.
- 2 MR. AURIEMMA: I can't even talk right now.
- 3 My lips are getting chapped.
- 4 MAYOR KELLY: Okay.
- 5 MR. AURIEMMA: I mean, two-and-a-half years
- 6 to do the right thing.
- 7 MAYOR KELLY: This is -- like I said, this is
- 8 an unfortunate situation. And as our attorney has
- 9 said, the quickest resolution is to go to mediation.
- 10 Otherwise, we're going to -- it's going to take a lot
- 11 longer process to draw this out through discovery and
- 12 depositions and the whole nine yards.
- MR. AURIEMMA: And -- and if I could show you
- 14 | my phone right now, I'm going off on my attorney. I'm
- 15 like, let's go to mediation. It costs money. It costs
- 16 10,000. I don't care. I pay 1700 a month. I could
- 17 pay for mediation ten times over already, okay? And
- 18 like I said, I feel trapped with this guy, okay? But
- 19 you -- I don't need to go to mediation. Here -- here
- 20 are my mediators right here, I think. Mauro, anything?

- 22 COMMISSIONER TUCCI: No, I can't talk about
- 23 this.
- 24 MR. AURIEMMA: You can do anything you want,
- 25 Mauro. And you know my character.

We have

1 COMMISSIONER TUCCI: I do. MR. AURIEMMA: Al? 2 COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: I said what I said 3 I mean, I think it's a good first step. 4 5 MR. AURIEMMA: Oh, first step. first steps am I going to take? 6 COMMISSIONER PETRACCO: 7 Well, I mean, No. 8 this could -- I -- in my opinion, and I'm not a lawyer, 9 but I think it could resolve an issue. So, I mean, you know what, I think, move it along. 10 11 MR. AURIEMMA: I'm trying. The benefit of a mediator is 12 MAYOR KELLY: 13 that they'll be able to independently tell us if we're wrong or they'll independently tell you if we're wrong 14 or they'll independently tell us we're both wrong, 15 16 we're both right, and try and beat us up to get to an 17 agreement. 18 Mr. Scarpelli, any comment? MR. AURIEMMA: I 19 mean --COMMISSIONER SCARPELLI: It doesn't matter. 20 21 They just gave you some good advice. 22 MR. AURIEMMA: I know, but two-and-a-half 23 years of advice and I'm still on Step 1. And I hope 24 when you -- when you leave here, Doc, that you review

your ordinance and say, oh, this kid's right.

1	an ordinance here. And it clearly says the flood
2	administrator is responsible for telling me whether or
3	not it's in the floodway. It wasn't my responsibility.
4	And he dropped the ball. And I I respectfully ask
5	you just to look over it tonight. And maybe when you
