21	me to relay a message in that he has been inspired by
22	the faith of the new pope and that come this time next
23	year, he will be revisiting the proclamation.
24	So without further ado, whereas, our nation
25	was founded on the principle of equal rights for all

people, the fulfillment of this nation's promise has been long in coming for many Americans. Some of the most inspiring moments in our history have risen from various civil rights movements that have brought one group after another from the margins to the mainstream of American society.

Whereas, Nutley Board of Commissioners welcomes and encourages diversity and inclusion within our community, everyone should be able to live without fear of prejudice, discrimination, violence, and hatred based on race, religion, gender identity, or sexual orientation.

Whereas, on June 28th, 2025, marks the 56th anniversary of the Stonewall uprising in New York City. It is the historic turning point where the lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender, queer/questioning, and plus (LGBTQ+) citizens rose up and fought against the discriminator which sparked the gay rights movement; and whereas, in the movement towards civil rights for LGBTQ+ people, celebrations have taken place around the country every June to commemorate Pride Month and to recognize the advancement of the LGBTQ+ community.

Whereas, celebrating Pride Month does raise awareness and provide support and advocacy for the LGBTQ+ community and is an opportunity to become

educated, engage in dialogue, strengthen alliances, and build understanding. While there has certainly been remarkable progress towards acceptance and equality, members of the LGBTQ+ community still continue to face insensitivity, discrimination, and intolerance.

Whereas, we must commit to support and accept LGBTQ+ individuals, in particular our youth, who compared to their peers are more likely to experience violence and bullying at school, suffer from depression, struggle with substance use, and have attempted suicide.

Now, therefore, be it proclaimed, by the Nutley Board of Commissioners in the Township of Nutley, County of Essex, State of New Jersey hereby proclaim and recognize the month of June as lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender, queer/questioning, and plus (LGBTQ+) Pride Month. And we urge all residents to actively promote the principles of equality and liberty, and we remind the LGBTQ+ community that they are loved and cherished and seen for who they are, deserving of dignity, respect, and support throughout our town.

At this time, I'll invite the commissioners to offer their comments on the proclamation, starting with Commissioner Evans.

COMMISSIONER EVANS: Sure. Since the beginning of doing this proclamation, I have gladly signed it, and I will continue to do so. It is my hope, truly my hope, that we can continue to grow in spirit and in mind and body with the expectation that you can look at people for who they are without actually having to label them.

Before we get to that, I do want to invite

Eugene Diaz from ON3 to speak on two of our agenda

items, two redevelopment plans that we're going to be
introducing this evening.

MR. DIAZ: Thank you, Mayor.

I'm Eugene Diaz with Prism Capital Partners.
We're the owners of the former Hoffmann-La Roche
campus, now known as ON3.

We purchased the campus almost nine years ago in October of '16, and I think we've accomplished some really, truly amazing things, rejuvenating the former campus, bringing in wonderful things like a medical school, Quest Diagnostics Laboratory, some NIH-funded research institutions in the campus, Eisai Pharmaceuticals headquarters, Ralph Lauren. And it's amazing what gets accomplished when, together, private capital investment and the public and local leaders work together for the common good.

Now, there's been an awful lot out there recently regarding a warehouse application for 275 Kingsland Street, which was adjourned several weeks ago at the planning board meeting. And I'm here to tell you today that that will be adjourned again tomorrow,

with the actions that your commissioners are taking tonight in approving two new redevelopment plans to help guide the remaining redevelopment of the ON3 campus in Nutley to a more amicable and mutually agreeable end of uses and densities in both standards. So my thanks and gratitude, quite frankly, to your -your commissioners and their consultants, who over the last two weeks I think worked way past midnight on many, many nights, resolving and resolving an awful lot of major issues and questions and concerns. And I feel at the end of the day, what we're going to end up here with ON3 and in Nutley is going to be the best of what can be accomplished with private capital and development and vision for a future of -- of this campus.

So the warehouse application will ultimately be dismissed and withdrawn, but there are several other actions that are following on from this that will happen over the next sort of 30- and 60-day period of time that I am fully in belief that your governing body will continue their efforts to move this along in the appropriate fashion.

So we look forward to withdrawing that application ultimately and proceeding with development of new uses for these sites. I'll let -- leave it up

to the commissioners to tell you what some of those uses would be, but they -- suffice it to say, they won't have that kind of truck and traffic impact that so frightened everybody. And likewise, we're happy to continue developing the campus in this smart growth fashion with appropriate uses that I think ultimately you, the public, are going to support because I believe your commissioners are fully and squarely behind it.

So Commissioners, again, thank you so much for you and your -- your consultants. You've worked really hard, tirelessly. We appreciate the effort. We appreciate the cooperation. We're happy to have worked side-by-side, again, for the common good, to see this great campus and great engine of productivity and -- and -- and -- and growth and -- and financial reward through (audio interference) move forward.

MAYOR KELLY: Thank you, Mr. Diaz.

And we have our redevelopment counsel here, Mr. Josh Zielinski. Do you want to expand on any of the proposed plans?

MR. ZIELINSKI: Sure. First of all, thank you to Mr. Diaz for coming in and providing that information for the commissioners and for the public.

With respect to the Kingsland site, the redevelopment plan contemplates a data center being

placed on that site. With respect to the innovation center, the redevelopment plan contemplates medical research facilities and offices on that site as well. So it is a -- a definite plus and benefit and bonus to the citizens in the community of Nutley.

MAYOR KELLY: Thank you, Mr. Zielinski.

Do the commissioners have any comments they want to add?

COMMISSIONER EVANS: Sure --

MAYOR KELLY: Do you want to start?

commissioner evans: so, you know, a couple of things. It hasn't been easy getting to this point, but it has been a process that we've had to go through to get to what we have desired, I believe, since we started this, is to have a future-oriented technology life science-based campus that will promote the economic growth of the community, restore the lost rateables that occurred with the divestiture of Hoffmann-La Roche, and do it in a way that makes sense for the community.

So I'm very pleased. I'm very excited about the fact that we will have a innovation center that will contribute to the brand, not only of the company that will be there, but also, I think, contribute to the brand of the campus, which, Gene, I know you've

been focused in on and we've been focused in on, is that whatever we do there needs to add to the brand of the community and create many opportunities, be it through jobs or accessibility.

You know, one of the first things that you can see on the campus in the design of the campus is that it's no longer gated. It's open. And you can see, and you can actually drive through it, and you can see what's going on. I think much has to be done. I'm fully committed to making sure that we achieve the potential that we have laid out. So I'm looking forward to this.

MAYOR KELLY: Thank you, Commissioner.

And that's where we are right now. So let's move forward and good times ahead.

I do want to say one thing to the public, though, because from my seat in the last planning board meeting, the public wanted to be able to have an opportunity to voice, you know, whether they have a concern, they approve the plan, or if they're indifferent to it. Those opportunities are coming. We're introducing these plans tonight for a public hearing on July 1st, at our July 1st board commission meetings here in this chamber and on -- at 7 p.m. There will be a consistency review before the planning board tomorrow evening -- Mr. Diaz alluded to that -here in this chamber at 7 p.m. as well. These are your opportunities so that you can voice your concerns or praise of the plan or indifference to it. Whatever you want, this -- that's your opportunity to come and voice what you need to say.

This isn't something that we're doing just completely behind closed doors, because we can't.

It -- by law, we have to allow you to have your say in everything, but that's going to be coming up in a very

fast-moving pace within the next two to three weeks.

So mark your calendars. There will be a number of opportunities for you to raise your concern.

COMMISSIONER SCARPELLI: Mayor, just one more. Just for the public's benefit, when we talk about redevelopment plan, these are not plans like some people think of, like blueprints. These are just the zoning for those sites and the possible uses on those sites. So I don't want anybody to think there's some plan that they can open up and look at. It's a Word document. So --

MAYOR KELLY: Yes, thank you. That's a very good distinction. It's -- yeah. It's just more like a plan of ideas of what can go there, and so we're going to make sure that it can be consistent with, yeah, the master plan of the town and consistent with the -- our values here in Nutley, which I believe it is.

So we -- as I said earlier, we do have public comment on agenda items only, so anyone else wishing to be heard on any other agenda items this evening, now is your opportunity to approach the microphone and state your name for the record.

I do have pending is requests from the state for some additional funding. And while that's still pending -- and I spoke to them today, that's still pending -- we won't know whether or not we'll be receiving anything out of the state budget until somewhere around the 29th of June, which is too late for us to hold our budget. So we have to adopt. The emergency authorizations have expired, so tonight we're required to adopt.

Whereas, pursuant to that agreement, the Township has agreed to, one, terminate the escrow agreements for Phase IIB, III, and IIA, refund PB Nutclif \$177,966.71 for the appeals, which it includes \$141,893 in disputed amounts, plus the remaining balance in all three escrow accounts of \$36,303 -- \$103.19. Funds are available in account 4-01-226-205,

- 1 4-01-02-205 [sic], T-15-909-918, T-15-912-921, T-15-
- 2 912-920, which has been certified by the Chief
- 3 Financial Officer. Said certification attached to this

It is designed not only for people like myself who use an electric scooter locally, but also for the growing number of high school students we see biking to school, to Clifton Commons, and to Franklin Avenue. By adding safe, dedicated bike lanes, we give people, especially our younger residents, safer ways to move around town without adding to traffic congestion.

It is also a way to modernize Nutley's infrastructure in a way that reflects how more people are already choosing to travel. The streets I have included here, like Franklin Avenue, Center Street, and Washington Avenue, were chosen because they are already popular routes. I believe with some proper maintenance

and a few smart upgrades, they can safely support both cars and cyclists and parking and all micromobility 3 devices.
