#### Regular Session March 27, 2017 Benton Municipal Complex

The Benton City Council was called to order for a regular session at 7:00 pm.

#### LEASE AGREEMENT

This Lease is entered into this \_\_\_\_\_ day of April, 2017, by and between Henry Brown Realty hereinafter "Lessor," and, the City of Benton, Arkansas hereinafter "Lessee."

1. <u>LEASED PREMISES</u>: For and in consideration of the covenants and agreements herein entered into and subject to the terms and conditions contained herein, Lessor hereby leases to Lessee the following described property situated in the City of Benton, Saline County, Arkansas, to wit:

#### LEGAL DESCRIPTION

- 2. <u>TERM</u>: The term of this Lease shall be for one hundred four (104) months, commencing on May 1, 2017, and ending on December 31, 2025. This lease agreement shall automatically renew for a five (5) year term unless the Lessor or the Lessee gives at least thirty (30) days written notice to the other of the intent to not renew the lease agreement at the conclusion of the lease term.
- 3. <u>RENT</u>: Lessee hereby agrees and promises to pay to Lessor one dollar (\$1.00) per calendar year.
- 4. <u>USE</u>: The leased premises will be used by Lessee for the creation of a public parking lot for use in the downtown area.
- 5. <u>CLEANING AND MAINTENANCE</u>: Lessee agrees to keep the premises free of trash or debris during and at the conclusion of the lease term. The Lessee also agrees to maintain the property during the lease term.
- 6. <u>IMPROVEMENTS</u>: Any permanent improvements made to the real property during the term of the lease shall become the property of the Lessor. Any temporary or removable structures or equipment which are placed on the real property shall remain the property of the Lessee and shall be removed within thirty (30) days of the conclusion of the lease term.
- 7. <u>BINDING EFFECT</u>: This Lease shall inure to the benefit of and be binding upon the parties hereto, their respective successors, legal representative, heirs, and assigns.
- 8. <u>REIMBURSMENTS</u>: The Lessee shall reimburse the cost of any real estate improvements taxes which the Lessor incurs as a result of the improvements made to the property. This amount shall be determined by multiplying the applicable tax rate by the difference between the assessed value each year during the lease term and the assessed value in 2015. (Tax Rate \* (Assessed Value 2015 Assessed Value). In addition thereto, the

Lessee shall reimburse the Lessor for the cost of premises liability insurance which provides up to \$1,000.000.00 in coverage per occurrence.

8. <u>RIGHT OF FIRST REFUSAL</u>: The Lessee shall have the right of first refusal for any offer to purchase the leased property from the Lessor. This right however does not apply to any offer to purchase or otherwise acquire the property which occurs between the existing co-tenant owners of the property.
